McCarthy Hall Update

Greetings from VCSU!

It has been an exciting start to 2025 at Valley City State University! Our campus has continued to see growth and in February we announced a new record enrollment of 1,854 students. We have already celebrated numerous awards and achievements by our departments, alumni and students – many of which you can read about in this edition of The Bulletin.

One of the more exciting projects happening on campus is the renovation of McCarthy Hall, which will become the new home for our renowned School of Education and technology education department. I had an opportunity to tour the facility recently, and I'm excited to report that significant progress is being made on the renovation.

The offices, classrooms, labs, conference rooms, and student study and gathering spaces are all taking shape. The configuration

of these spaces was carefully considered in the design process to bring academic units together near each other for enhanced collaboration.

Progress has been consistent, and it's truly exciting to see the updates week after week.

Construction is scheduled to be completed this summer with the building open for classes during the fall semester. Below are some items that have been completed working from the top of the building down to the main floor.

- Third Floor – carpeting, flooring, and casework are complete. Ceiling cloud install is in progress.
- Second Floor – paint, flooring, tiles, and doors are being installed. Windows and casework are ongoing.
- First Floor – painting has started. Doors, windows, and casework installation is beginning.
- Foyer connection – cement floor is poured, and the measurements are complete for the curtain wall. One of the most striking elements

thus far is the vast increase in natural light throughout the facility. The new windows replicate the size of the original windows, brightening the spaces with additional light.

We are proud of our tradition and history in providing high quality educators for the North Dakota teacher workforce. The renovated McCarthy Hall gives VCSU another tool to prepare future educators and improve the on-campus experience of our students.

In other exciting news, Northern Cass second-grade educator and VCSU 2010 alum Jessica (Hintz) Stoen was recognized and honored as a 2025 recipient of the prestigious Milken Educator Award during a surprise ceremony on February 14. She was one of only 45 pioneering professionals recognized across the nation and the only educator in North Dakota to receive the award. You can read more about Jessica on page 17.

VCSU sets enrollment record with 1,854 students

Valley City State University announced a 6 percent growth in enrollment, setting another campus record with 1,854 students enrolled during the spring semester.

That shatters the previous spring enrollment record of 1,747 students set in 2024 and even breaks the overall enrollment record of 1,806 students set last fall. VCSU added 66 new full-time students during the spring semester, including 15 freshmen and 51 transfer students.

The record enrollment was fueled by growth in all major areas this spring. The number of full-time students is up 5 percent over last spring and is the second-highest number ever during the spring semester. The graduate programs saw a 23 percent increase in enrollment, growing to 146 students seeking a master's degree.

Overall undergraduate enrollment is up 5 percent; the number of part-time students increased by 7 percent; and the university's full-time equivalency grew by 7 percent to a record FTE of 1,223.

"We are thrilled to see growth in so many different areas of our university," said VCSU president Alan LaFave. "Students have always been our top priority, and the



continued growth and improved retention validates that we continue to put students first."

"Students attending VCSU find a friendly campus that truly cares about their success," LaFave continued. "To meet the changing needs of higher education, we continue to transform and adapt our course offerings, our degree options and the delivery modes by which students take their courses. Paired with our extremely affordable tuition rates, a VCSU education is a great fit for many types of students."

In 2010, VCSU's spring enrollment was 1,034 total students. In the 15 years since, Valley City State has seen steady growth. Since 2010, the number of full-time students has grown by 30 percent and the overall campus headcount has grown 79 percent.

U.S. News Ranks VCSU Among Best Online Programs

Valley City State University (VCSU) has been ranked among the 2025 Best Online Master's in Education Programs by U.S. News & World Report.

U.S. News also ranked VCSU in its 2025 Best Online Bachelor's Programs. VCSU is one of only two North Dakota schools to receive rankings in both online categories. U.S. News annually evaluates schools based on a variety of factors, such as student engagement, faculty credentials, services and technologies.

"These rankings again validate that VCSU is one of the best schools in our region for academic quality, support and student success," President Alan LaFave said. "Regardless of the course delivery mode they choose, our students are getting a great education to fit their individual situation."

About 25 percent of VCSU's enrolled students are classified as online students. That includes the master's degree programs in education, which are affordable online options for working teachers to further their education and career.

VCSU's online master's in education was ranked 150th in the nation by U.S. News and was second among the three North Dakota schools earning a ranking. VCSU ranked 28th in the "Services and Technologies" category, which reflects



an institution's ability to deliver strong support structures for online students that are commensurate with campus-based programs.

"Everyone at VCSU works to help our students succeed, whether they are on campus or online," said Larry Brooks, Vice President for Academic Affairs. "Rankings like this reinforce the quality of the educational experience we offer for online students."

VCSU finished 230th in the online bachelor's ranking and is one of just three North Dakota schools listed in that category. VCSU's online bachelor's programs ranked second among ND institutions.

VCSU Announces New Major in Data Analytics and Visualization

Valley City State University has developed a new major to meet growing workforce demands in the business industry.

VCSU will start offering a degree in Data Analytics and Visualization during Fall 2025. This degree prepares students for a career analyzing complex data, extracting insights from the data, and presenting data in a clear and compelling way.

The profession has a fast-growing job market with more than 19,000 openings in the past year. The advertised median salary is more than \$100,000 for jobs in this field.

The Data Analytics and Visualization major is offered through VCSU's Computer Systems and Software Engineering (CSSE) department. The degree can be earned on campus or online. Students will study elements of statistics, computer science, business and design to learn the skills needed to handle data-intensive tasks in various industries.

"This new major meets a growing need in many businesses," said Sue Pfeifer, chair of the CSSE department. "Students will take classes from a variety of departments on campus but will ultimately be equipped with a degree that can land a high-paying job in numerous industries such as healthcare, finance, technology, marketing, government or education."

At its core, the degree focuses on understanding data and presenting the information gathered from data in a clear and concise manner. Students will develop skills in data analysis, statistics, programming, critical thinking

and communication. They will also learn data visualization techniques using software such as Tableau or Microsoft Power BI.

"Students who are interested in problem-solving and creativity make a good fit for this major," said Pfeifer. "They should be detail-oriented, paying attention to the accuracy of data. Students should also be interested in technology and exploring new software."

Potential career paths include jobs as a data analyst, a business intelligence analyst or a visualization specialist.

Hornung qualifies for Speech Nationals

Valley City State University junior Grady Hornung has qualified for the American Forensics Association National Speech Tournament in North Carolina. Hornung earned his spot at nationals after placing 2nd in Dramatic Interpretation at a tournament this past weekend.

A native of Walhalla, N.D., Hornung now has the opportunity to compete at the national tournament running April 5-7 at the University of North Carolina in Charlotte.

Hornung is a member of the recently revived VCSU Speech Team which competed at the Valley Forensics League (VFL) tournament in Marshall, Minn., on Saturday, Jan. 25. Hornung, Tara Dahl and Alliana

Freund competed in three events: Dramatic Interpretation, Impromptu Speaking and Dramatic Duo.

Hornung placed 2nd in Dramatic Interpretation. This placement also qualified him for the national tournament. Dramatic Interpretation is a speech based on a cutting from a play or plays of literary merit. The event focuses on the development of a character and a manuscript is required.

Dahl placed 2nd in Impromptu Speaking. This event focuses on topics derived from quotations. Speakers have seven minutes to prepare and deliver a speech about a particular topic.

The Forge, Student Magazine at VCSU, Wins Highest Honor in REALM contest

Valley City State University's student literary magazine, The Forge, has been recognized as a REALM First Class magazine by the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE).

The distinction was awarded after NCTE reviewed Issue 21 of The Forge, which was produced by VCSU student editors Sierra Crocker, Abigail Dreher, Beth Mehus and LilyBeth Townsend, and advised by Dr. J. Gregory Brister. The Forge is annually produced by VCSU students taking English 213: Literary Publications.

"The Forge is honored to be the first campus publication in North Dakota to receive this award," stated Brister, professor of English 213: Literary Publications. "It recognizes the dedication of our student editors and the vibrancy and vitality of the literary, artistic, and scholarly work of the VCSU community."

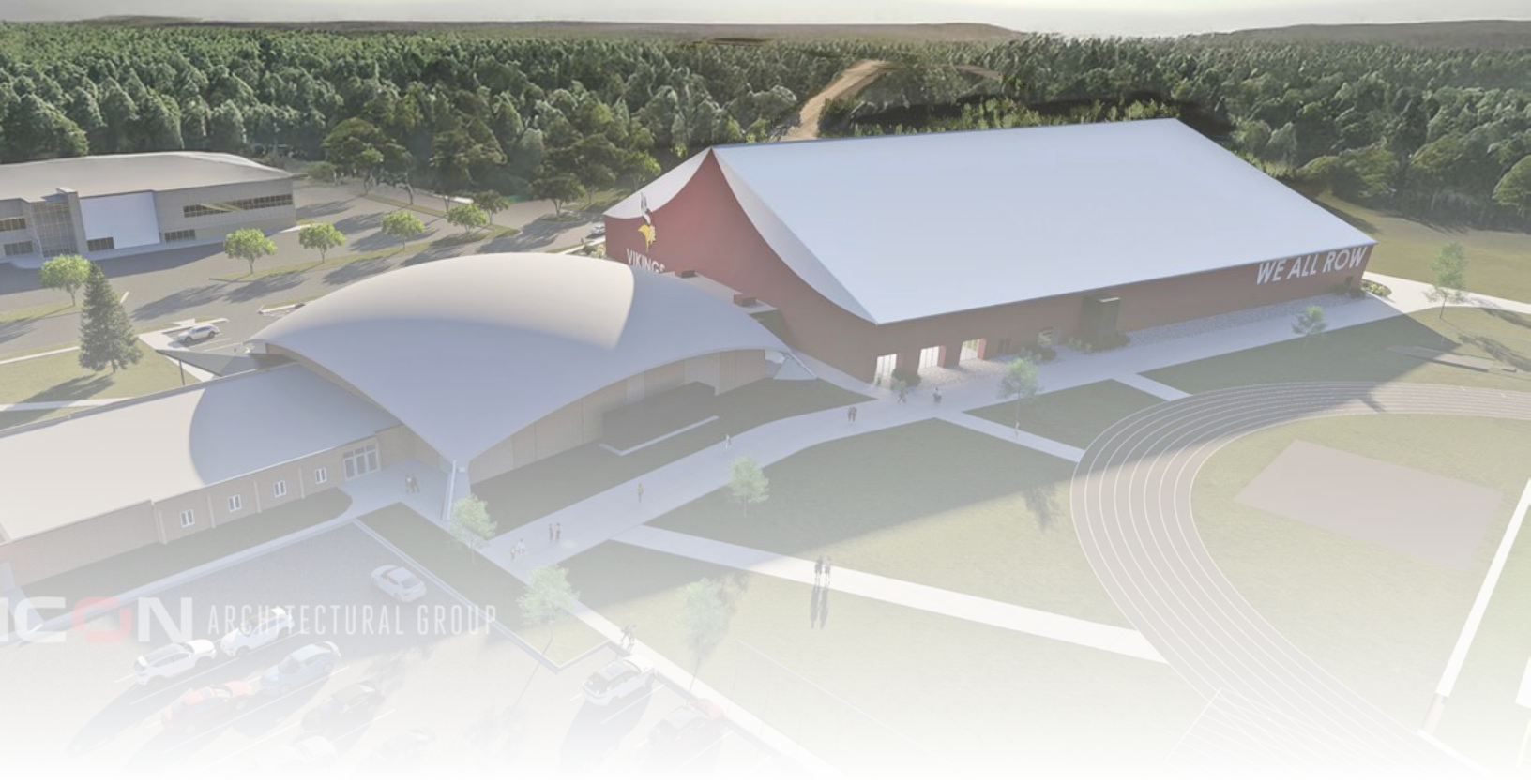
First Class is the highest honor in the Recognizing Excellence in Art and Literary Magazines (REALM) contest run by the NCTE. The REALM program publicly recognizes excellent literary magazines produced

by students with the support of their teachers. REALM is designed to encourage all schools to develop literary magazines that celebrate the art and craft of writing.

Schools in 46 states and five countries nominated 422 student magazines to be reviewed for the 2024 contest. Magazines from middle school, high school, and higher education were included. The Forge is one of 125 magazines to receive REALM First Class.



Progress and Projections

The renovation of McCarthy Hall continues to move forward with noticeable progress. Third floor spaces are nearing completion as construction moves from the top down. The renovation is scheduled to be completed this summer and open to students for the fall semester. Campus is also looking forward to an addition to the athletic complex at the W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse. As part of the Forward Together Capital Campaign, VCSU is preparing to break ground as soon as this year on a multi-purpose indoor athletics facility. VCSU named a STEM School of Excellence

Valley City State University has been named a 2024-2025 STEM School of Excellence in recognition of a wide range of STEM-related initiatives the university leads or collaborates on.

The award was announced by the International Technology and Engineering Educators Association (ITEEA) STEM Center for Teaching and Learning, which annually recognizes schools for their commitment to providing a robust integrative STEM education experience.

"This award is a result of the hard work, dedication, and forward-thinking of individuals who collaborated and contributed to deliver high-quality STEM education at VCSU," said Peder Gjovik, Chair of the Department of Technology and STEM Education. "It's a great honor to receive this designation from the ITEEA, an organization that sets and maintains the standards for technology and engineering education."

VCSU will officially receive the award in April at the ITEEA 2025 Conference in St. Louis, Missouri.

The ITEEA evaluated numerous VCSU STEM-related initiatives when awarding the School of Excellence honor, including the VCSU Planetarium – which is the only permanent planetarium in the state and regularly hosts free shows for area schools and community members to learn about astronomy and space.

The award also cited VCSU's technology education degrees, the Great Plains STEM Education Center, and the INSTEM program. INSTEM (Indians into STEM) annually brings Native American students to campus for week-long STEM academies in the summer.

VCSU offers a Bachelor of Science in technology education and has STEM certificates for both elementary and secondary educators. Other STEM-related initiatives mentioned by the ITEEA include the annual Marketplace for Kids event on campus and a statewide engineering design challenge hosted by the VCSU Department of Technology.

"VCSU is honored to be selected as an ITEEA 2024-25 STEM School of Excellence," said Larry Brooks, Vice President for Academic Affairs. "This is a testament of our commitment to numerous initiatives related to STEM education."

Nature's Gift

Private Donation will enhance VCSU Fisheries & Wildlife Program

The VCSU student experience for Fisheries and Wildlife majors is about to get even better. Already a respected and popular program because of its hands-on, in-the-field approach to learning, the Fisheries and Wildlife program has received an influx of money from a private donation designed to further enhance the program.

VCSU alum and long-time supporter Dick Monson has made a significant donation to the university which will directly support the Fisheries and Wildlife program with annual funds dedicated to scholarships and equipment upgrades.

Monson, a retired farmer from the Valley City area, has been a long-time supporter of VCSU and respects the work that conservation professionals do in North Dakota.

"This program is truly exceptional, and I am honored to contribute to its continued growth," said Monson. "I firmly believe in the value of education that prepares students for meaningful careers in natural resource management. Supporting their success is an investment in the future of our environment and our state."

Monson's gift will fund educational infrastructure, cutting-edge equipment, renewable scholarships, and innovative research initiatives, ensuring VCSU continues to lead the state in natural resources education and workforce development.

"This generous gift opens doors for our students, providing the tools and opportunities they need to succeed," said Dr. Bob Anderson, Professor in the

VCSU Fisheries and Wildlife Science Program. "From scholarships that attract top-tier talent to field experiences that prepare them for real-world challenges, this support is a gamechanger. This gift is an amazing testament to Dick's commitment to conservation and to training the next generation of natural resource professionals."

A 1974 graduate of Valley City State, Monson and his late wife Karen both earned elementary education degrees from VCSU. Karen taught kindergarten for 27 years at St. Catherine's Catholic School in Valley City. Dick eventually went into farming and the couple made their home on a farm west of Valley City.

Since then, Monson has seen native habitats disappearing across the North Dakota landscape. The wildlife that depends on those habitats are also going away. Monson says well known species such as the American Bumblebee and Monarch Butterfly may soon be listed as threatened or endangered due to loss of native habitat.

"I have spent many of the best days of my life in native prairie pastures and cattail wetlands," he said. "It is my hope that the students graduating from the Fisheries and Wildlife Department will carry the mission forward to preserve the natural world around us and not destroy it as was done in the past."

The VCSU Fisheries and Wildlife Science Program is the leading undergraduate program of its kind in North Dakota, offering three concentrations: Wildlife, Fisheries, and Conservation Law Enforcement. Graduates of the program are employed in every county across the state and beyond, addressing a significant demand for trained professionals in natural resource management. Since 2020, the program has consistently enrolled an average of 70 students, with a goal to expand

enrollment to 100 students in the coming years. The Fisheries and Wildlife Department plans to use Monson's gift to fund yearly scholarships for its students, upgrade old equipment used in field projects and labs, and purchase new educational tools or software. Rapidly evolving technologies—such as artificial intelligence (AI), geographic information systems (GIS), and drones— can now be more easily acquired and worked into VCSU's curriculum.

These advancements will allow students to stay at the forefront of natural resources management. Additionally, the funding will equip science labs with the latest equipment to deliver hands-on learning experiences.

"This gift will bolster our efforts to grow the program, attract students to North Dakota, and provide unparalleled educational opportunities," said Cory Anderson, Executive Director of the VCSU Foundation. "It demonstrates the commitment of donors like Dick Monson to supporting not only VCSU but the broader community and workforce of our state."

Monson's donation was part of a \$1.47 million dollar package from numerous donors that the VCSU Foundation submitted to receive a \$747,000 match from the ND Challenge Grant Fund. VCSU Professor Awarded Grant to Research Organic Carbon in Wetland and Lake Sediments



Valley City State University assistant professor Michelle Abshire has been awarded a grant for nearly \$15,000 to purchase equipment and lead a group of students in researching organic carbon in wetland and lake sediments.

Abshire received an Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program (UROP) equipment grant for \$14,988 awarded by the National Science Foundation – ND EPSCoR. The money will fund the purchase of new equipment for a project titled: “Organic Carbon in Wetland and Lake Sediments: Informing Agricultural Practices and Mitigating Climate Change.”

Abshire is an assistant professor in the VCSU Department of Science.

“With this research we’ll be able to qualitatively identify ways in which carbon storage in wetland and lake sediment may have changed with increasing agricultural development,” said Abshire. “Knowing how the carbon cycle has been impacted through time will provide a better understanding of the relationship between agricultural development in North Dakota and carbon cycling as well as highlight the importance of preserving our state’s natural water bodies as they serve a valuable carbon storage system.”

Abshire and a group of student researchers will collect lake and wetland sediment cores, measuring and sealing them onsite before evaluating the cores at the VCSU campus geology lab. Half of the core will be sampled for total carbon measurements with new instrumentation from this grant, and the other half will be preserved for future use in further research or classroom activities.

The grant money will purchase a sediment coring device, a benchtop muffle furnace, two analytical balances, and other lab supplies. Along with serving this research, the equipment will also be used in VCSU classrooms for multiple courses in the environmental science, fisheries and wildlife, and biology majors.

Dan Kaffar has been named the North Dakota Middle Level Principal of the Year by the North Dakota Association of Secondary School Principals (NDASSP).

He is currently the principal at Central Middle School in Devils Lake, N.D. Dan is a 2010 graduate of the VCSU-NDSU dual degree program, earning a degree in elementary education from VCSU and child development and family science from NDSU.

Kimberly Souba – Author and Thriver

Writing has always been a large part of Kimberly Souba's life. The 2008 VCSU graduate began by writing journals to help process her emotions and later found success in penning stories and publishing her own novels. After 15 years as a teacher, Souba is back at VCSU putting her writing skills to use while pursuing a degree in communications.

Souba's love for writing began at an early age. Eventually she started writing for her high school's newspaper to stay involved with different activities her friends were in.

By the time Souba reached the end of her freshman year, she was already the editor of the school paper, a job usually reserved for juniors and seniors. Entering her junior year, she was editor of the school yearbook and eventually landed a position as youth editor for a Catholic newspaper.

After graduating from LaMoille High School (Ill.), Souba enrolled at VCSU to major in elementary education. Soon, she felt her writing was "hit or miss" and she was no longer writing as frequently. Besides a few articles for a local school's paper or a poem for a friend, she started to fall away from something that had previously brought her joy.

It wasn't until she came back to VCSU a second time that she found her passion for writing once again.

"Part of returning to school was just because I love learning, but part of it was wanting to get help with my writing," Souba said. "I don't want to write the way people want me to. I want to write the way I want to write."

With her fire burning once again, Souba got to work publishing her first novel, "From Death to New Life, the Transformation of a Soul."

The assembly of her novel wasn't easy, and it's something Souba never envisioned doing. When looking through boxes, she discovered old journals from high school. Initially she considered burning them, but a therapist suggested she re-read the journals. With hesitation she started reading and found over 300 poems and prayers. She tore them out, wanting to make a book to give her friends and family as gifts.

"I woke up in the middle of the night, and I just had the phrase 'From death to new life, the transformation of a soul' and I couldn't get that off my mind," she said.

Souba decided to go through a self-publishing process and shortly after had her first set of published novels. After receiving a copy, a close friend and his wife suggested she sell the book. Right away, Souba denied the idea saying, "I don't want people to know about my life" but then her friend said something she will never forget. "He said to me, if you can help one person, wouldn't it be worth it?"

Souba took that comment to heart and decided to take the leap. With the help of two close friends and her editor, they ordered the book chronologically and split it into



chapters, giving people an idea of where to go to when they were feeling a certain emotion. Souba recalls struggling the most with writing descriptions about each section.

"I sat there for four hours and had nothing," she said. "But while I was doing dishes, all of these scripture passages came to me that described each section. They were perfect."

The cover of "From Death to New Life, the Transformation of a Soul" has a significant meaning to the book and to Souba's life. The butterfly represents the transformation of a caterpillar to a butterfly. The cover also features a teal ribbon that represents both a cocoon and symbolizes sexual assault awareness. This is something Souba was and still is dealing with, becoming a thriver, not just a survivor of sexual abuse.

"I think we all grow and change in our lives and that's what butterflies are," she said. "When reading some of the poems and prayers that are in there, my hope is that people will always know that there's hope."

"You can always change your situations. They might be forced upon you, but you can change and become the best version of yourself that you can be, whatever that looks like."

Souba also published two children's books, and she hopes to publish more. All the proceeds go to help children and families who have experienced some type of abuse.

Souba says VCSU professors like Shannon VanHorn, Cindy Zahn, Dave Bass, Al Olson and Lee Kruger have all helped her success and inspired her to keep writing.

"At VCSU you really are a person, not just a number," she said. "Professors support you in class, but also after you graduate. Even when I wasn't taking their classes, they were still in touch, supporting me, and buying my books. If you want to have that lifelong support and network, VCSU is the place to be."

Souba expects to graduate in May of 2025 with a degree in communications. She previously graduated with an elementary education degree in 2008 and taught for 15 years. Souba currently resides in Geneseo, Ill., where she is a full-time student.

VCSU alum Jessica (Hintz) Stoen '10 Receives Prestigious Milken Educator Award



HUNTER, N.D. – Northern Cass Elementary School second-grade educator and VCSU alum Jessica Stoen '10 thought ND State Superintendent of Public Instruction Kirsten Baesler was holding an all-school assembly to commend the school on its successful personalized learning pilot. Stoen quickly learned there was another treat in tow: a sweet Valentine's Day surprise in the form of a Milken Educator Award. The prestigious, national honor includes an unrestricted \$25,000 cash prize Stoen can use however she chooses.

Hailed as the "Oscar of Teaching," the Milken Educator Award was created by philanthropist and education visionary Lowell Milken in 1987 to further excellence in education and inspire educators. Stoen is the only recipient in North Dakota this 2024-25 season and the first-ever in the Northern Cass School District's history.

Stoen is a 2010 graduate of Valley City State University, earning a Bachelor of Science in elementary education. She later earned a Master of Education in educational administration in 2017 from NDSU.

"Jessica's creative and personalized approach to teaching creates a profound, positive impact on her students, their families and her colleagues in and beyond her school community," said Milken Educator Awards Vice President Jennifer Fuller.

"Jessica's unwavering dedication to education is evident in the enriching, engaging learning experiences she crafts for her students, as well as her relentless commitment to professional growth for both herself and her peers. Congratulations, Jessica, and welcome to the Milken Educator Network!"

Stoen was honored as part of the Milken Family Foundation's 2024-25 Milken Educator Awards season. The tour will honor up to 45 pioneering professionals coast to coast, marking the 3,000th Milken Educator in the Awards' ranks and celebrating a history of changing lives in communities across America.

"It's fitting that an educator at one of our state's most outstanding and innovative rural schools is able to win this prestigious award," said Baesler. "Jessica is a role model and example of teaching excellence for educators everywhere."

Embracing the Frontier Conference Move

Dennis McCulloch, Athletic Director

I'm in my 31st year of being a Viking and it has been a great ride for my family and me. I'm very proud to be the athletic director and head football coach of this program and appreciate the opportunity to work to continue the tradition of greatness in Viking Athletics.

It's three years into being the athletic director and I truly believe my most important job is to improve the resources to help them run a successful program. Resources doesn't just mean more scholarship dollars – which is important – but it is also staffing programs adequately to match or exceed our opponents, improving facilities/equipment, improving travel, providing opportunity for professional development, right-sizing salaries, supplying high-quality support staff (SIDs, athletic trainers, equipment manager, office manager, maintenance, custodial, game management, FAR).

When a program isn't successful, the first thing we blame is the head coach, but I would tell you we should look at all aspects of what it takes to be successful, and if they have the resources necessary to be successful within the conference we compete. If we want our programs to finish in the top half of the Frontier Conference each year, then we need to make sure our resources for that program are in the top half of the conference. If we want to win conference championships, we need our resources to be at the top of the league. I would be the first person to tell you I don't want to be average or below average and I will do everything I can to raise the levels of our programs. If our football program has the same resources as the best teams in our conference, then our expectations should be able to compete for a conference championship and be in the top half of our league.



McCulloch

I'm excited about the Frontier Conference and new competition. They are an established successful conference at the national level and that is where we need to compete. We need to embrace the change and understand we will face an increase in the operational cost of running our programs and need to increase our scholarship to match our opponents. Dr. LaFave has been very supportive in making this move and understands that it will take a larger commitment from the university to support our athletic programs. We need our alumni to help us move our scholarship program forward if we want to compete on the field.

I encourage you to "BE Viking." That means to be actively involved in the future of Viking Athletics – not just a fan. A fan is someone who cheers a team on and is a casual observer of what is happening but doesn't really have a true effect on the team's success.

SPORTS HIGHLIGHTS

Basketball - VCSU Men Fall in Conference Semifinals

The Valley City State University men's basketball team finished the 2024-25 season with an overall record of 15-14, ending the season in the semifinals of the NSAA Conference Tournament.

The Vikings went 5-10 in NSAA conference play, earning



the the No. 4 seed. They took down No. 5 Bellevue at home in round one of the NSAA Postseason Tournament with a 67-64 win. They later fell to top seed Dickinson State in the semifinals.

VCSU's Tyrel Creger was named NSAA Newcomer of the Year and 2nd Team All-Conference in the 2024-25 season. He averaged 13.1 points per game, made 44.1 percent from the field and 37.7 percent from beyond the arc. He had a team-leading 89 assists, ranked third in steals with 33, and third in rebounds with 103.

Lamar Grayson was named Honorable Mention All-Conference. He averaged 17.0 points per game shooting 53.4 percent from the field. Grayson led the team with 373 points and was second in steals with 39. Senior Shaheed Muhammad was also named Honorable Mention All-Conference. Muhammad averaged 9.3 points per game shooting 34.2 percent from the three-point line. He led the team in steals with 47 and averaged 1.7 per game. Donovan Tynes was named VCSU's Champion of Character.

Track - Robinson and Just set school records at T&F Nationals

VCSU's Tayshaun Robinson and Karly Just both qualified for the NAIA indoor track and field national championships where they both would set school records and personal bests.

Robinson qualified for the 60-meter hurdles with a school record 8.15 and then at nationals he broke his own school record by running 8.09 and placing 15th.

Karly Just nationally qualified for the 3000-meter running a 10:36.41. She also broke her own school record at nationals running a 10:34.94 and placing 18th.

At the NSAA Indoor Conference Championships the Vikings claimed five conference titles, and had 11 individuals and one relay team earn All-Conference Honors (Top 3).

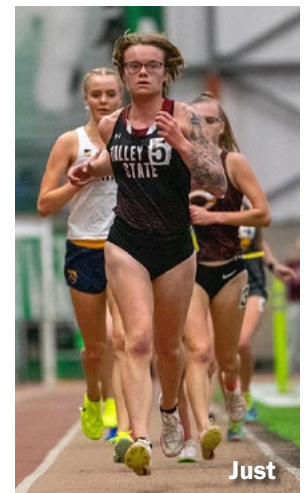
Just took the conference title in the 3,000 meters and 5,000 meters. Jasmine Barnes took second in the mile run earning All-Conference honors for the fifth time in her career. Emma Muggli finished the long jump in third place earning All-Conference for the third time in her career.

Cameron Champagnie also took a pair of conference titles in the long jump and triple jump. Jordan Mount took the conference title in the 400 meters running a 49.27. Tayshaun Robinson took second in the 60-meter hurdles. Zeke Barnick finished second in the high jump. Jordan Mount placed third in the 200 meters and Aaron Cutshall took third in the triple jump.



Viking Track and Field set school records in nine different events during the indoor season. Karly Just claimed three records in the mile run, 3,000 meters and 5,000 meters. Jasmine Barnes set a pair of school records in the 800 meters and 1,000 meters. Viking Emma Muggli set the record for overall Pentathlon score with 2,883 points. Jade Azure set the Viking record in weight throw with a mark of 15.26 meters at the NSAA Conference Championships.

Robinson now owns the top three fastest Vikings 60-meter hurdle times with his fastest coming at the NAIA National Championships. Jordan Mount clocked a 400-meter time of 49.27 during the NSAA Championships to set a record.

Women's Basketball finishes with 15-14 record

The Valley City State women's basketball team finished its season with a 15-14 overall record and a 6-9 mark in conference play. The Vikings earned a No. 5 seed for the NSAA Postseason and defeated No. 4 Bellevue to advance to the conference semifinals where VCSU fell to top-seed Dakota State.

VCSU started the season strong as head coach Vanessa Johnson earned her 100th career win on Nov. 6 with a 64-55 win over the University of Minnesota Morris. The Vikings gained momentum later in the season, highlighted by notable wins over teams receiving national attention including No. 24 Jamestown, (RV) Mayville State, and No. 6-ranked Dakota State.

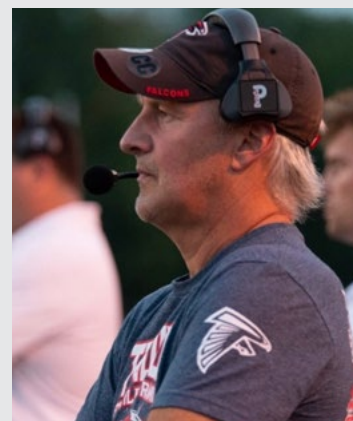
Senior guard Ashlyn Diemert set three school records in VCSU's win over Jamestown including points in a game (39), 3-pointers in a game (11) and became the only Viking to ever shoot 100 percent on 3-pointers in a game (11-for-11) while making at least six.

Five players earned NSAA Postseason awards including NSAA Freshman of the Year and Honorable Mention All-Conference by forward Abby Aslesen. Diemert earned 2nd Team All-Conference, and JayCee Richter was named Honorable Mention All-Conference. Sophomore point guard Ellie Braaten earned a spot on the NSAA All-Defense Team and Delaney Cotton was named VCSU's Champion of Character.

Brian Nelson '88

Brian Nelson won a 2024 9-man football state championship as the head coach of Fertile-Beltrami High School in Minnesota.

A 1988 graduate of VCSU, Brian has been teaching biology and science for 34 years at Fertile-Beltrami. He has been the head football coach for 30 years and the head track coach for 32 years. His football and track teams have combined to win 11 conference titles, including four straight titles in football.

Brian is a 10-time conference coach of the year between both sports. He was named State Coach of the Year in 9-man football for 2024, and he was the State Class A Boys Coach of the Year for track and field in 2023. Brian earned his 200th career football win this past season.

He is married to wife, Danielle, with three daughters: Kylie (24), Ellie (22) and Jacey (17).

> VCSU inducting 27 into Coaches Hall of Fame

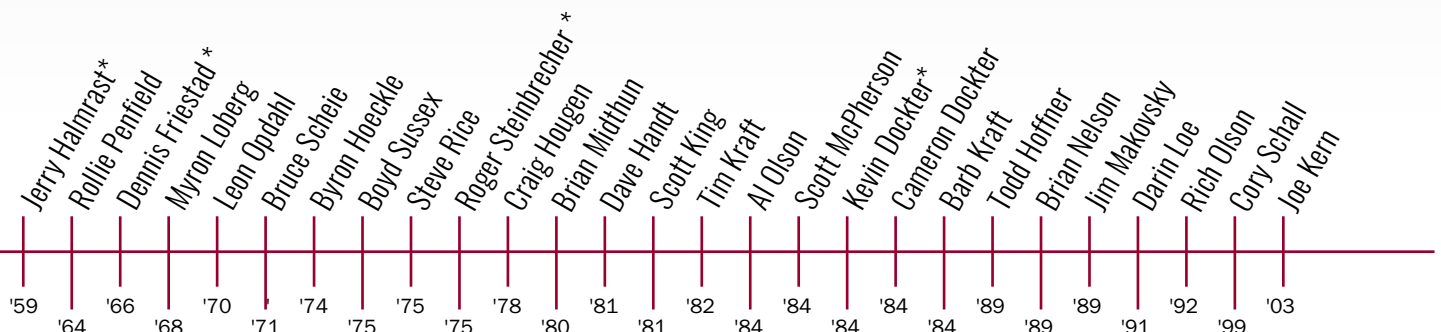
Valley City State University will induct 27 standout alumni into its Coaches Hall of Fame this summer.

They are the second class of inductees into the VCSU Coaches Hall of Fame, which was established in 2022 to honor Viking Alumni who have had successful and influential coaching careers. The induction ceremony takes place June 12, 2025, in Valley City.

Inductees into the VCSU Coaches Hall of Fame receive the Osmon Icon Award, which is named in honor of Viking icon coach Bill Osmon. Coach Osmon's teams won 24 conference championships in four different sports making him the all-time winningest coach in Valley City State history while providing dedication and influential service during his tenure.

The 2025 inductees include alumni from six different decades who achieved high levels of success as coaches at the high school or college level.

2012-13 Women's Basketball

The 2012-13 women's basketball team finished with a 24-8 overall record to finish third in the A.I.I. regular season. VCSU placed second in the A.I.I. Tournament to qualify for nationals, marking its third straight year as a national qualifier. At the time, VCSU set school-records with 24 wins on the season, 2207 total points scored, 489 assists and just 58.1 points allowed per game.



2011 Football

The 2011 Viking football team earned the Conference Championship Title and advanced to the NAIA Playoffs. The 2011 team finished with a 9-2 overall record and a 6-0 conference record. VCSU also had A.I.I. Most Valuable Senior in Jordan Maher and A.I.I. Most Valuable Player in LeTheo Proctor. Ken Eliacin, Cody Kilthau, Jordan Maher, Jake Thurston, Major Hopp, Tommy Zinke, LeTheo Proctor and A.J. Pfeifer each earned All-Conference honors.



Brittany (Lehner) Evans

Watertown, S.D.
Women's Basketball/Softball, 2010-14

Brittany Lehner was a decorated dual-sport athlete in women's basketball and softball from 2010-14. Lehner was a two-time 1st Team All-Conference selection and Honorable Mention All-American in women's basketball. She totaled 1390 points to rank sixth in VCSU history and 592 rebounds ranking seventh all-time. In 2014, Lehner averaged 18.4 points per game to rank second all-time. On the softball diamond, Lehner earned NSAA Player of the Year and All-Conference for her senior season in 2014. Lehner was also a two-time NAIA Scholar-Athlete.



Caitlyn (Wojahn) Graf

Milbank, S.D.
Women's Basketball, 2009-11

Caitlyn Wojahn was a standout point guard on the women's basketball team and was instrumental in helping the Vikings to their first NAIA National Tournament appearance as a senior. Wojahn set school records in career steals (283) and single-season steals (101). She also ranks second in career assists (324) and third in career 3-pointers made (145). Wojahn earned 2nd Team All-Conference as a junior and 3rd Team All-Conference as a senior. She was also a two-time NAIA Scholar-Athlete.



Jill DeVries

Head Coach, Women's Basketball, 1999-2013, 2014-17
Athletic Director, 2017-22

Jill DeVries served 17 seasons as head women's basketball coach and five years as athletic director at VCSU. Known for her passion for the game, DeVries is the winningest women's basketball coach in VCSU history with a 283-258 career record. She led the Viking women to the NAIA National Tournament four times and coached the 2010-11 team to a DAC Tournament Championship. She was named the North Star Athletic Association Athletic Director of the Year in 2019.



Steve Becher

West Fargo, N.D.
Football, 1981-84

Steve Becher was a four-year starting quarterback on the VCSU Football team from 1981-84. Becher was the only quarterback to win three conference championships in Viking Football history. At the end of his career, Becher still ranks in the Top 10 in 13 categories of the Viking football record book. When he graduated, Becher held records for passing attempts, pass completions, passing yards, passing touchdowns, total offense, interceptions, punt yards and punt attempts.



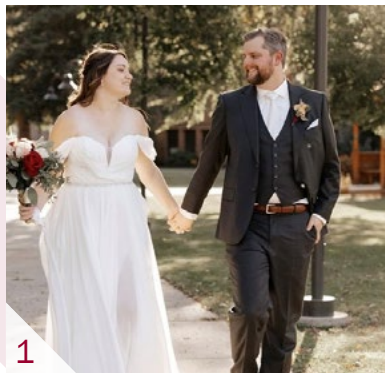
Jordan Maher

Bowman, N.D.
Football, 2008-11

Jordan Maher was a dominant defensive lineman who played for the Viking Football team from 2008-11. He helped the Vikings to a conference championship title and the NAIA Playoffs as a senior. Maher was named the A.I.I. Conference Senior of the Year and 1st Team All-Conference in 2011. Maher is tied for the school record with three sacks in a single game and totaled 17 sacks in his career.

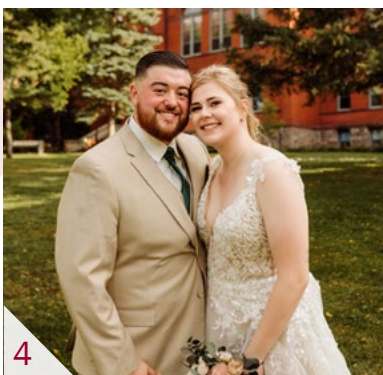

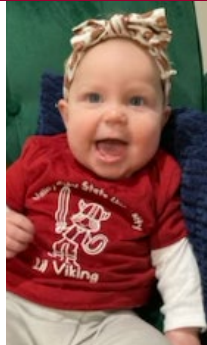

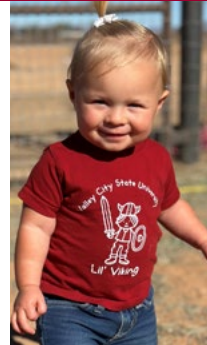
