Recently,

we gathered to recognize employees for years of service and special achievements at our annual employee recognition and retirement dinner.

More than 115 individuals were recognized for various awards. Those receiving recognition were responsible for an impressive 1,115 total years of service to VCSU! The eight retirees, as a group, represented 209 years of service!

We also had the opportunity to celebrate another annual tradition on May 21, 2021 – the VCSU Scholarship Auction at the Eagles Club in Valley City. The success of the auction was tremendous, and

resulted in the largest amount in auction history raised for student scholarships! We extend our deepest thanks to all who attended, donated items or services, participated in the silent auction, or participated by bidding and purchasing items in the live auction.

Our campus celebrated this month as we welcomed a new Dean for our School of Education to continue our legacy of inspiring teachers for North Dakota and beyond. Dr. Allen Burgad, a former VCSU student-athlete and alumnus, assumed his role in early June after previously serving as assistant superintendent for West Fargo Public Schools. We are lucky to have his expertise and happy that he has returned to VCSU.

Dr. Burgad will inherit a topranked elementary education program, according to rankings released by Study.com.

At last count, we have 1,438 alumni serving as licensed teachers, administrators and education

"Cory is no stranger," Robinson said. "He grew up in McVille, N.D. and graduated from VCSU in 1989."




Cory, Kim and Loree, will be leading a strong and growing

The leading elementary education program in the nation has a new leader, but he is no stranger to Valley City State University.

Dr. Allen Burgad, '89, is taking the reigns of the education department to lead it into the future.

He is stepping into big shoes filled by many others, including his former college professor Dr. Larry "Buck" Grooters, '57.

"I knew him as a student before I knew him professionally; he is fantastic," Grooters said of Burgad.





"You can tell by the way he presents himself and what he knows about education; he is cut out of the same mold."

Grooters and Burgad met on campus to reminisce over the strides the education program has made and where it is headed.

DECADES OF PROGRESS

Grooters returned to VCSU in 1963 to teach Physical Education and coach under Bill Osmon. After 20 years he moved into the teacher education program and in 1982 was named chair of the Division of Education.

He led that department for a quarter of a century through numerous, visionary changes while remaining a force to be reckoned with in the classroom.

Dr. Allen Burgad remembers one of his first interactions with Dr. Grooters well. He and his fiancé happened to be taking the same class from Dr. Grooters in the late 1980s. One weekend, the couple had important plans.

"We actually got married over the weekend and came back on Monday," Burgad said. When Dr. Grooters asked the couple what they did over the weekend, they informed him of their nuptials.

"He couldn't believe we were back in class and we told him, 'That's how much we respect your class. We don't dare miss it," Burgad said laughing.

Since that time, Grooters has retired and Burgad has taught and served as an administrator in multiple schools including West Fargo, Stanley, Northern Cass, Napoleon, and Powder River County School District in Broadus, Montana.

When Burgad moved from Northern Cass, a smaller district, to one of the largest school districts in West Fargo as assistant superintendent, Dr. Grooter's son, Greg, was there to help him along. Dr. Greg Grooters '82, was the principal at Sheyenne High School, a large high school in the West Fargo school district.

Now, as the leader of VCSU's education department, he is poised to help educators prepare for the future.

VISION FOR THE FUTURE

"I'm honored and humbled to lead this department," Burgad said. "There were quite a few people that had a great impact on me. The impact professors and faculty members like Dr. Grooters had on me, I felt compelled to come back and help others to have the opportunity to become educators."

In the school setting, Burgad witnessed the ever expanding legacy of VCSU's education department first hand by witnessing alumni teach and mentor.

"Our classroom teachers in the field are great," he said. "They are always willing to take on new young individuals and take them for field experience."

Burgad also noted the ever changing dynamics in the field of education.



"Education is changing. There's no doubt about it and technology is one of the drivers and innovators of that," he said. "Students are learning differently now than they were a few decades ago."

Being aware of the changes in technology and in the classroom is important, but it all comes back to having strong faculty and strategic processes in place, Burgad explained.

"It's so important to involve the faculty in the design of a program," Burgad said.

Faculty in the education program have been recognized for leading the way locally, statewide and nationally. Earlier this year, VCSU was listed as having the top ranked elementary education program in the nation according to Study.com.

Although VCSU has a strong reputation, it is important that students going out into the field and working in school districts are prepared and excited to teach.

"People like Dr. Grooters and others built such a strong program," Burgad said. "Keeping the strong relationships that have been built with school districts is going to be a very important piece of our success."

Maintaining and building upon success is important, Burgad said, but at the end of the day it all boils down to relationships.

He knew that as a student, and even more so now as an administrator.

"I remember the kindness," Burgad said of his time as a student at VCSU. "Dr. Grooters made everyone feel comfortable and put you at ease in his classroom. You just enjoyed going to class."

"These donors have continued to show their commitment to our students and campus community. We could not succeed in our mission without their critical support. They epitomize the idea that we all row this ship."



NORTH DAKOTA CHALLENGE FUND MATCHING GRANT

The 2021 North Dakota legislature has again created a program to match funds donated to Valley City State University. VCSU has been allocated up to \$700,000 of matching dollars if the University can raise \$1,400,000 in private donations. The funds enhance more than 225 scholarship endowment funds.

Matching dollar pledges are allowed over a seven year period. Leveraging a portion of an estate to receive matching dollars is also available.

With a minimum \$5,000 endowment gift to VCSU through the VCSU Foundation, you may benefit from a North Dakota income tax credit equal to 40% of the charitable gift AND also qualify for your donation to be matched \$1 for every \$2 you give.

An individual may receive a 40% tax credit for contributions of \$5,000 or more (lump sum or aggregate in one year) to a qualified North Dakota endowment.



Sommerfeld Family Establish the Peggy Lee Music Scholarship

Myron '62 and Jenneice '67 Sommerfeld and their daughter Bonnie have established an endowment for student scholarships. The scholarship will be known as the Peggy Lee Music Scholarship.

Peggy Lee, one of North Dakota's treasures, was an American jazz and popular music singer, songwriter, composer, and actress over a career that spanned seven decades. She was born and raised in Wimbledon, N.D., and would have been 101 years old in May. Lee sang on Valley City's KOVC radio and had her first performance at the Valley City Eagles Club on New Year's Eve in 1936. The Barnes County Historical Museum is planning a fundraiser in September in her honor.

This scholarship will be awarded to students who are music majors and show an interest in jazz and the standards of the "Great American Song Book".

Center for the Arts Update

Building Set to Open by January 2022

Dry weather has helped construction efforts on the \$32 million Center for the Arts progress quickly throughout the summer.

Construction began in the summer of 2020 and is set to be completed by December 2021.

The building includes musical performance and practice spaces, a ceramics lab, studios for recording, producing, painting, printmaking, drawing, a digital photography studio, digital design lab and a woodshop. It will also include an art gallery.

Softball Wins 2nd Straight Conference Championship

The Vikings rolled through the 2021 North Star Athletic Association regular season with a dominating 25-2 conference record to claim the title.

The Vikings held a 17-game win streak heading into the postseason and were ranked as high as No. 26 in the NAIA Top 25 Coaches' Poll. VCSU fell to Dickinson State in the NSAA Tournament Championship and was not selected for an at-large bid to the NAIA National Tournament despite its 35-7 overall record.

Valley City State swept the major postseason conference awards as Mark Mattson was named Coach of the Year, senior Emily Smith was selected as Pitcher of the Year, and freshman Makenzee Stone was named Player of the Year and Newcomer of the Year.

Emily Smith was also named Honorable Mention All-American after going 21-3 in the circle with three no-hitters, nine shutouts and a 1.21 ERA. Smith set two new school records with 67 career wins and 601 career strikeouts. She finished the season with 228 strikeouts in 145 innings and averaged 11 strikeouts per game. Smith



also topped the national rankings after holding opponents to a .122 batting average.

Makenzee Stone was named NSAA Player of the Year and Newcomer of the Year after leading the North Star with a .444 batting average. She also held a .690 slugging percentage and a .500 on-base percentage. The freshman from Blaine, Minn. totaled 56 hits, 10 doubles, three triples and five home runs this season. She scored 40 runs and drove in 36 for the Vikings this season.

Valley City State totaled nine All-Conference selections and two NSAA Gold Glove recipients in 2021.

Two All-Americans for Viking Track & Field

Valley City State's Zachary Co and Kyle Odegard both finished Top 5 in the nation during the outdoor track and field season, earning NAIA All-American honors.

Odegard, a junior from Lisbon, N.D., placed third in men's javelin at the NAIA National Championships, recording a top throw of 61.97 meters (203 feet, 3 inches). It is the third straight season that Odegard has earned All-American after placing seventh, fourth and now third in the nation during his first three years at VCSU.

Co, a junior from El Paso, Texas, set a new school record in men's shot put as he placed fifth at the NAIA National Championships. His top throw of 17.54 meters (57 feet, 6.5 inches) broke the old school record (17.35 meters) held by Darien Moore.

The Viking track and field team won five individual conference championships during the outdoor season. Odegard and senior Peyton Halverson won the men's and women's javelin titles; Co won men's shot put; senior Allyssa Weitkum closed our her career with a conference title in the 3,000 meter steeplechase; and sophomore Brooke Malsom won the long jump title.

Malsom (100 meters, 200 meters) and Weitkum (3,000 steeplechase) also set new school records during the season.

Two Vikings earn All-Conference in golf

Jocelyn Braunberger and Rory Gentzkow both earned Honorable Mention All-Conference for the Viking golf teams this spring.

Braunberger placed 10th at the NSAA Women's Golf Championships, and Gentzkow placed 14th in the men's tournament.

Braunberger won four individual medalist honors during the 2020-21 season and had five Top 5 finishes. Gentzkow was runner-up at two tournaments this season and finished with seven Top 5 finishes.

As a team, VCSU's women won two events. Both the Viking men and women placed fifth out of six teams at the NSAA Championships.



Viking baseball team smashes home run record

Valley City State's baseball team went on a power barrage during the 2021 season, smashing the school record with 80 home runs over 49 games.

The Vikings finished the season with a 23-26 overall record and went 14-9 in conference play to finish third in the North Star Athletic Association standings. VCSU's season came to an end on day three of the NSAA Conference Tournament.

Valley City State's 80 total home runs broke the old school record of 56 home runs set back in 1988. This year's power surge was punctuated on Senior Day

when the Vikings hit 12 home runs in a doubleheader sweep of Presentation College. Senior Jorun Hamre broke the individual season home run record as well, going deep 18 times during the 2021 season. The old school record of 14 was held by Bryan Swaenepoel (2001) and Stacy Fitterer (1989).

Shortstop David Demeter (14 home runs) and outfielder Dustin Mertz (10) both reached doubledigit home runs this season as well, and 14 different players contributed to the record total.

Hamre was named NSAA Co-Player of the Year and earned Honorable Mention All-American



after his record-setting season. He batted .362 with 18 home runs and 51 RBIs. He ranked eighth in the nation in home runs per game.

Hamre, Mertz and outfielder JT Reed were named 1st Team All-Conference, while Demeter, outfielder Gedeon Ellis and pitcher Phillip Almanza were named 2nd Team All-Conference. Pitchers William Hlady and Tyler Kliniske earned Honorable Mention All-Conference.

First Team All-Conference selections include Emily Smith, Amber Stewart, Makenzee Stone, Riley Perryman, Jessica Husband, Autumn Perry, and Marissa Hawkins. Earning Second Team All-Conference were Joelle Aiello and Anne-Elise Gest, and Aiello and Stone each earned an NSAA Gold Glove award. Aiello also set a new school record, becoming the alltime hits leader with 238 career hits.

The Vikings finished the season ranking in the Top 10 in several categories nationally, including RBIs per game (7.024), runs per game (7.738), slugging percentage (.567), opponent batting average (.186), batting average (.360), home runs per game (1.048), doubles per game (1.976) and fielding percentage (.970).


















CLASS OF 1958




