A year after the State Board of Higher Education chose Alan LaFave as VCSU's 14th president, he was inaugurated in a formal installation ceremony in W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse on Friday, Sept. 27. The ceremony was sandwiched between two music events: a star-studded recital featuring President LaFave and friends on Thursday night, and a Friday night concert by Chicago tribute band Transit Authority.

Enrollment growth: Moving forward together

One of the most important measures and validations of a university's success is enrollment. We have seen our fall enrollment numbers increase every year for the past 10 years, and in the last 4 years, our efforts to continue that growth have been very purposeful and focused.

Our faculty, administration and staff have been diligent in this effort. This focus has been centered on the notion of continuous improvement, with specific attention to recruitment, retention, student engagement and success, and quality academic and cocurricular opportunities, as we aim to create a community of scholars and learners, offer excellent advising, and provide an affordable higher education option with abundant scholarship offerings. This list of our goals and efforts, while not exhaustive, has been a big part of the discussion and work with our enrollment management team here at VCSU.

This fall we set enrollment records with a 1,665 total headcount and an undergraduate headcount of 1,524, breaking the 2018 records of 1,547 and 1,404 respectively. Our FTE (full-time equivalent) also increased over last year; we're now at 1,164, compared to 1,096 in 2018. (You can read more about our enrollment records on p. 10.)

VCSU is one of only two North Dakota University System institutions that grew in both headcount and full-time equivalent categories this year.

Taking a bit of a deeper dive into the numbers, it's interesting to note that 54% of our students are face-to-face, on-campus students, while 26% are online only. The remaining 20% take a combination of face-to-face and online courses. While online is a preferred method of delivery for approximately a quarter of our students, 45% of our face-to-face students are not taking any online courses, and 47% of our online-only students are North Dakota residents.

We understand the importance of providing high quality in both face-

to-face and online delivery methods and have implemented measures to address quality assurance in content and consistency in the online courses. This assures an online student of receiving the same, high-quality experience as our face-to-face students.

Retention plays an important role in the success of our overall enrollment management plan. As you might imagine, many hours are spent in the recruiting process identifying prospects; making initial contacts with them; inviting them to campus to meet with faculty, staff and coaches (if they are being recruited as athletes); giving campus tours; and maintaining regular communication all the way through registration and orientation. With these extensive efforts invested in recruiting prospects, it becomes just as important for us to retain them once they become VCSU students.

Our retention rate for our first-time full-time students is also at a record high for VCSU. This rate, measured by the number of students retained from fall semester freshman year to fall semester sophomore year, was 72.85% this fall, nearly 5 percentage points over the 68.13% last year. A task force has been assembled to provide recommendations for actions and programs that will help our retention remain strong; this is a top priority.

These are very exciting times at VCSU! The record numbers represent the active choice that students make when they enroll. The numbers are also a positive indicator of the tremendous work being done by our faculty and staff, and the strong support we receive from alumni, donors and the Valley City community, along with the North Dakota University System and North Dakota Legislature. The personal attention that students receive both on campus and online makes for an outstanding education and tremendous value, and I'm so very proud of the people who make that happen.

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The Challenge Grant, Your IRA and Required Minimum Distribution

The VCSU Foundation has used

this exciting program to establish

over 200 endowed and memorial scholarships.

In my last Foundation Corner Report, I shared with you the excitement of the North Dakota Legislature's renewal of the Challenge Grant program. This program has been in existence for the past few years. VCSU has been allocated a total of \$700,000 to match on a 2:1 basis for the establishment of **endowed and memorial scholarships**. We therefore need to raise a total of \$1,400,000 in private money

by December 1, 2020, to fully realize this match. The matching funds are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

The Challenge Grant program has been very exciting for our donors. This program provides a golden opportunity

to memorialize a loved one, a coach, a former faculty member, or someone who has been special in your life. With a minimum \$5,000 endowment to the Valley City State University Foundation, you may benefit from a North Dakota income tax credit equal to 40% of the charitable gift, and also qualify for your donation to be matched by \$1 for every \$2 you give.

The VCSU Foundation has used this exciting program to establish over 200 endowed and memorial scholarships. Some folks have used this program to establish a family scholarship. Others have contributed to an

existing scholarship. Note that pledges can be made to make the match up to a period of seven years.

If you own an IRA and you are age 70 1/2, you are required to make a minimum distribution. Why not consider using your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) to make a scholarship contribution? By doing so, you can satisfy your IRA's RMD and help

us meet the Challenge Grant match. You may distribute up to \$100,000 to charity each year to make your RMD. For the IRA charitable rollover to work, it is important that you do not take the distribution. Ask your IRA administrator to make the distribution directly to the VCSU

Foundation. While you will not receive an income tax deduction for your gift, you avoid including your RMD in your taxable income and will receive the joy of knowing that the full amount will go to support our scholarship programs.

WHAT IS AN ENDOWMENT?

An endowment is a special fund in which the principal is invested in perpetuity and never used. The interest earnings support the annual scholarship allocation. Endowments are an excellent way to honor or memorialize a loved one, teacher, coach or your family.

The VCSU Foundation requires a minimum investment of \$10,500 to establish an endowment.

Donors can invest the funds all at one time, or make periodic contributions to the fund until such time that the \$10,500 minimum is met. Once the fund is established, contributions to the fund can continue into the future.

On Sept. 27, 2018, the State Board of Higher Education selected Alan LaFave, then provost of Northern State University, as the next president of Valley City State University. On exactly the same date a year later, Sept. 27, 2019, President LaFave was formally inaugurated as the 14th president of VCSU.

LaFave had begun his work on campus in mid-December 2018 but chose to have the inauguration coincide with the 2019 Homecoming celebration. An inauguration committee — co-chaired by Rhonda Fairfield, Kim Hesch, Kari Stricklin and Greg Vanney — organized the celebratory events.

The inauguration events kicked off with a student reception with President LaFave late Thursday afternoon, Sept. 26. An inaugural recital followed, with the president performing on his clarinet along with a host of talented musicians, including faculty members from VCSU and Northern State University, along with a couple Aberdeen musicians. James Gai, LaFave's clarinet teacher during his undergraduate days at Northern State, and Robert Spring, the president's graduate school teacher at Arizona State University, also played. A highlight of the recital was a performance of Bassi's "Fantasia from'l Puritani'" by Spring on clarinet and William Wieland '86, a VCSU alumnus now teaching at Northern State, on piano. A reception for inaugural guests at Sabir's in Valley City followed the recital; the Aberdeen Jazz Quintet provided music there.



Friday morning brought the inauguration ceremony itself in W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse. There President LaFave received the formal investiture of office from Nick Hacker, chair of the North Dakota State Board of Higher Education, and Mark Hagerott, chancellor of the North Dakota University System.

Robert Spring shared reminiscences and insights from LaFave's graduate school days, and James Smith, former Northern State president who now serves as president of Eastern Michigan University, spoke of the power and the need for public higher education.

In his address — centered on the inaugural theme, "Forward Together: Building on a Tradition of Excellence" — President LaFave highlighted recent VCSU accomplishments and successes and spoke of his drive to ensure a bright future for the university.

A reception at Epworth United Methodist Church followed the ceremony, and Friday evening the inauguration events were capped off by a concert by Transit Authority, a Chicago tribute band from Minneapolis, in the fieldhouse.

"The inauguration was truly remarkable," said President LaFave. "To have so many of the people who have made a difference in my life and career come together with our students, faculty, staff and community members for this special event gave me a feeling I'll never forget."

Homecoming 2019

The annual Bill Osmon Fun Run on the afternoon of Monday, Sept. 23, kicked off a week of spirited events for Homecoming 2019, and later that evening Denzel Kennedy and Edynn Glatt were crowned Homecoming King and Queen.

The student homecoming chairs, Brandi Aranda and Carter Buelow, riffed on the inauguration with their weeklong Homecoming activities, sharing "LaFave's faves," the president's favorite snack items, with students, and distributing Viking bandanas campus-wide in honor of the Harley-riding president. Aranda and Buelow emceed a pep rally Thursday morning in Vangstad Auditorium. The final events in the weeklong Viking Olympics were featured, which brought spirited participation from students and howls of laughter from all those assembled.

Alumni, students, faculty and staff gathered in Student Center lounge Friday afternoon for an ice cream social hosted by the Foundation Office and Alumni Association. Later that evening at the Eagles Club, individual athletes Dave Olson '79, Mike Jewett, Donna (Bader) Young '83, and Amy (Ottinger) Kitching '83 were inducted into the VCSU Viking Athletic Hall of Fame. The late Mark Nordeen '76 was inducted posthumously, with his wife and son accepting the award. Also inducted were the following teams: the 1971-72 and 1972-73 women's basketball team, the 1974-75 and 1975-76 men's basketball team, and the 1980-81 and 1981-82 gymnastics team.

Saturday morning, Sept. 28, featured the annual Alumni Honors Breakfast in the cafeteria with a host of alumni receiving awards (see pp. 8-9). Next up Saturday was the homecoming parade down Central Avenue, followed by the first annual Classic Car/Motorcycle Cruise, in which more than 20 entries traveled to Ashtabula Crossing, Dazey and Sanborn. Alumni and friends gathered to tailgate outside Lokken Stadium prior to the game, and the Viking football squad ground out a victory over Dakota State 10-6.

McNea recognized with Distinguished Alumni Award



The Distinguished Alumni Award was adopted by the VCSU Alumni Association to recognize alumni/alumnae who have achieved prominence in their chosen field of endeavor. The nominee must have received national or international recognition and must have been identified as an expert in the individual's chosen field.

Mel McNea has been selected by the Valley City State University Alumni Board of Directors to become the 61st recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award. The award was presented to McNea at the

annual Alumni Honors Breakfast at Homecoming, Sept. 28, 2019.

McNea earned a Bachelor's Degree in biology education from

VCSU in 1978. In 1980, he earned the American Society of Radiologic

Technologists certificate from St. Luke's School of Radiologic Technology,
and in 2009, McNea earned a Master's Degree in healthcare
administration from the University of Phoenix.

While McNea spent a few years teaching, he has spent over 40 years dedicated to creating access to safe and quality healthcare in rural America. McNea joined Great Plains Health in 1987 as the director of diagnostic imaging, leading that department through tremendous growth in volume and changes in technology and process improvement. He

was selected for the prestigious Caring Kind Award from the Nebraska Hospital Association in 1998. In 2004, he was promoted to vice president of operations. McNea is currently chief executive officer with Great Plains Health in North Platte, Neb., a position he has held since 2014.

McNea has led the Great Plains Health system through a period of unprecedented growth and expansion. His leadership has produced many successful projects, including the addition of a heart and vascular program, the \$100 million patient tower construction project, the development of the Great Plains Physician Network, a spine surgery center and the first mobile CT program in western Nebraska.

In 2018, McNea was presented with the Nebraska Hospital Association's Excellence of Service Award.

When asked what does being a graduate of VCSU mean to him, McNea responded, "The educators and advisors at Valley City State University provided me not only the knowledge to be a successful leader but provided me the courage to do great things. I grew up in the small rural community of Bottineau, North Dakota, and the transition to a large community and academic setting was difficult but successful because the faculty treated me as an individual not a number. There were many individuals who influenced my educational pursuit, but a few names stand out. Archie Moore, Dr. Lade, Dr. Rankin, and Dr. Dafoe not only shared their academic wisdom but were great role models. When I share with Nebraskans where I received my college education, I feel a sense of pride and gratitude for what the institution and staff did to help guide my development as a leader."

VCSU student Shane Hitch wins cybersecurity award

Shane Hitch, a VCSU sophomore from West Fargo, N.D., majoring in software engineering, was one of 100 students from across the nation — and the only student from North Dakota — named a Cyber FastTrack finalist.

Hitch competed over several months to solve more than 250 cybersecurity challenges. More than 13,000 students completed the first phase of this year's Cyber FastTrack. Over the course of several months, the competition was narrowed to 2,579 quarter-finalists, then 541 semi-finalists, and finally, 100 finalists, including Hitch, who were selected to receive a full scholarship for advanced cyber skills training through the SANS Technology Institute.

Hitch was recognized on the VCSU campus Friday, Oct. 4. Participating in a gathering in Hitch's honor were President Alan LaFave; Susan Pfeifer, associate professor and chair of the Computer Systems and Software Engineering Department; and three representatives from the North Dakota Information Technology Department: Tony Aukland, information systems security analyst, North Dakota State and Local Intelligence Center; Rosi Kloberdanz, EduTech director; and Tabitha Teel, EduTech professional learning and outreach manager. Aukland and Teel are both VCSU alumni.

Joining the group via video conference was Sean Wiese, chief information security officer for the State of North Dakota.

VCSU sets enrollment records


Valley City State University has set enrollment records with a total headcount of 1,665 students and an undergraduate headcount of 1,524, according to official fall term 2019 figures released by the university.

The 1,665 total headcount surpasses the previous record of 1,547 set in fall 2018, a 7.6% increase, and the undergraduate headcount of 1,524 surpasses the previous record of 1,404, also from fall

2018, an 8.5% increase.

The full-time equivalent (FTE) figure has also increased from 2018 to 2019, moving from 1,096 to 1,164, a 6.2% increase.

The headcount enrollment marks the fifth consecutive year of recordbreaking numbers for VCSU, beginning with a 2015 mark of 1,422 that surpassed the previous record of 1,384 set in 2011.

VCSU ranked No. 2 public regional college in Midwest by U.S. News

Valley City State University has been ranked the No. 2 public regional college in the Midwest in the 2020 U.S. News Best College Rankings. VCSU was ranked third in the 2019 rankings.

VCSU has now appeared in the U.S. News "Best College" rankings for 22 consecutive years, and the university has been ranked in the top three Midwest public regional colleges each year since 2010.

"Valley City State has maintained a record of academic excellence for decades," said President Alan LaFave, "and we're proud to see VCSU once again ranked among the top public schools in our region. The rankings speak to the good work done together by our students, faculty and staff, along with the strong support of our alumni, friends and the Valley City community."

The U.S. News rankings are based on data including retention and six-year graduation rates, graduation rates for low-income students (based on federal Pell Grant recipients), measures of student excellence (ACT/SAT scores and high school class standing), the alumni giving rate, and educational expenditure per student. A peer assessment by college and university officers also factors into the rankings.

The Midwest region comprises 12 states: North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri and Kansas.

VCSU recognized in Washington Monthly national college rankings

Valley City State University has been recognized in Washington Monthly's 2019 national college rankings in two categories.

VCSU is ranked 51st of 372 schools in the Midwest in Washington Monthly's Best Bang for the Buck Colleges (Midwest) listings. Among all U.S. bachelor's institutions — defined by Washington Monthly as "four-year institutions that award almost exclusively bachelor's degrees" — VCSU ranks 84th of 216 schools.

VCSU is the top-ranked North Dakota institution in both ranking categories.

As defined by Washington Monthly, the category "America's Best Bang for the Buck Colleges" is their "exclusive list of schools ranked according to how well they help non-wealthy students attain marketable degrees at affordable prices. The list is created by isolating the social mobility metrics from the main rankings of four-year institutions."

Factors in the rankings include eight-year graduation rates, percentage of first-generation college students, median earnings 10 years out, school loan repayment, and performance ratings based on differential between predicted and actual data in a number of categories. Also included is the net price of attendance for families below \$75,000 income level, a measure of "affordability for students from lower- to middle-income families" according to Washington Monthly.

"We're pleased to see Valley City State ranked highly," said VCSU President Alan LaFave. "We try to manage tuition and fees to keep VCSU affordable for our students and their families, and we've made strategic decisions to help students who fall into aid gaps. First-generation students face educational challenges that others don't, and we actively support them on campus with services and programming."

Washington Monthly describes the bachelor's institution rankings this way: "Since 2005, the Washington Monthly has ranked colleges based on what they do for the country....We rank baccalaureate colleges...based on their contribution to the public good in three broad categories: social mobility, research, and promoting public service."

In addition to the social mobility metrics used in the "Best Bang for the Buck" rankings, metrics associated with public service and research are used as ranking criteria in the bachelor's listings. These include research expenditures, the number of alumni with bachelor's degrees who earn Ph.D.s., and measures of military, national and community service, including participation in programs such as ROTC and the Peace Corps, along with the percentage of federal work-study funds directed toward community service programs.






Hills recognized for contributions to track rebuild

Baseball

The VCSU baseball team posted a 4-7 overall record during its fall season, playing countable games in September and early October for the seventh straight year. The Vikings picked up two wins against Viterbo University and then won two games in a three-game series against Morningside College to wrap up the fall season.

After losing 14 seniors from last year's team, the roster this fall looked extremely different with several new players taking on key roles. Transfer JT Reed led the Vikings during the fall season with a .421 batting average and 12 runs, while freshman Kyle Leapaldt impressed with a .364 batting average, a .636 slugging percentage and seven RBIs.

On the mound, transfer Chase Feller was 1-0 with a 3.38 ERA in 13.1 innings pitched, while Tyler Kliniske posted a 3.12 ERA in 8.2 innings, struck out a team-high 13 batters and picked up a save.

Valley City State is set to resume its season in early March. The

Vikings will play doubleheaders at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis on March 6 and 8, and then will travel to Tucson, Ariz., for their annual spring break trip from March 11-17.







Cross Country

The VCSU cross country teams competed in five meets this fall with a young roster.

The Vikings featured many new faces after graduating a large crop of seniors from last year's team. Between the men's and women's teams, Valley City State had 14 freshmen on the rosters for the 2019 season.

On the men's side, freshmen Govani Garza and Jayden Wheeling were the top two finishers for the Vikings each meet. On the women's side, freshman Kirsten Ranke and sophomore Angeline Gannon led the Vikings, each crossing the line as the top VCSU finisher twice during the season.

The Viking women placed fourth of six teams at the NSAA Championships, while the VCSU men placed sixth. Three Vikings – Grace Bachmeier Angeline Gannon and Govani Garza

Football

Valley City State's football team enjoyed a successful 2019 season, posting a 7-3 overall record and a 5-2 mark in conference play. VCSU had a chance to claim a share of the conference championship in its season finale, but a loss to Waldorf University dropped VCSU into second place in the final North Star Athletic Association standings.

Highlights of the season included a season-opening win against rival

season included a season-opening win against rival University of Jamestown and an upset victory of No. 13-ranked Dickinson State University.

The Vikings hosted Jamestown to start the season Aug. 29 in the second annual VCSU Ag Bowl, presented by First Community Credit Union. It was also the Paint Bucket Game with their archrivals, and the Vikings did not disappoint on the field. In front of a standing-room-only crowd of 2,500 people, VCSU picked up a 20-14 victory and reclaimed the Paint Bucket Trophy.

On Oct. 26, the Vikings hosted and upset No. 13 Dickinson State University. VCSU rallied from a 22-10 fourth-quarter deficit to earn a 23-22 win. Andrew Hanretty returned a blocked punt for a touchdown, and Louis Quinones capped the comeback with a 40-yard touchdown run. The VCSU defense held Dickinson State to just 24 yards rushing on 22 carries. The win vaulted the Vikings into a tie for first-place and put them in the receiving votes section of the NAIA Top 25 Coaches' Poll.

VCSU senior running back Louis Quinones left his mark on school history, setting a new record for career rushing yards in the season finale. Quinones finished with 3,530 career rushing yards and 36 career rushing touchdowns – breaking the yards previously record held by Derek Elliott and tying Elliott for the rushing touchdowns record.

The VCSU men's golf team earned two individual medalist honors and took home two team victories in five tournaments this fall. At the Minnesota State Invite (Fergus Falls, Minn.), the Vikings had a winning team score of 306 with senior Tanner Schnathorst shooting an even-par 72 to win medalist honors.

VCSU also earned a victory at its own invite hosted at Maple River Golf Course (Mapleton, N.D.), leading the way with a team score of 312. Schnathorst earned medalist honors again with a 73 (1 over par). Collin Hoss also recorded a season-low score of 71 (1 under par) on day two of the Dickinson State Invite at Bully Pulpit Golf Course (Medora, N.D.).

Individually, the men earned 13 Top 5 finishes and 24 Top 10 finishes this season. Cameron Rall had the best scoring average at 75.8, with Schnathorst next with an even 76 this fall.

"We're excited to see where we're at," said Montgomery. "We've worked really hard over the offseason. We've had a lot of dress rehearsals, and now it's time to put it all together for real and see where all this hard work has taken us."

The Vikings return their top three scorers from last year's squad – a team that battled close losses all season before finishing strong with three straight conference wins. Logan Nelson, a first-team all-conference guard headlines the returners after averaging 17.5 points per game and shooting 43 percent from 3-point range last year. Also back is versatile guard Michael Cornelious, who averaged 12.5 points and 7.2

rebounds per game and was named honorable mention all-conference. Back for his junior year, forward Connor Entzi averaged 11.1 points per game last season.

Also back from last year's squad are seniors Austin Lee and Denzel Kennedy, junior Hunter

McCalla, and sophomore Hunter Sand.

A total of eight players return from last year, and the Vikings have added eight new faces as well. Among the additions this season are three junior college transfers expected to play big roles: junior Jalen Addison, a 6-foot-2 guard who played at Madison Area

Tech; sophomore Chris Thompson, a 6-foot-5

guard from Bryant and Stratton College; and junior Kevin Schramm, a 6-foot-6 forward who played two seasons at Anoka-Ramsey Community College.

"I'd like to say we're going to be better than last year," Montgomery said. "But that's something we still have to go prove."

The VCSU women's basketball team was picked to finish third in the NSAA preseason coaches' poll. The Vikings went 14-14 last season and 7-7 in the conference for a third-place finish last season. Through the end of October, the Viking women were 0-2 to start the young season. Conference play opens Dec. 7, when the Vikings travel to Dickinson State.

After adding nine new players to their roster this season, preseason activities have been critical leading up to season play.

"Preseason training has been effective for us to get everyone on the same page, says head coach Vanessa Johnson. "Once we can get that to happen this is going to be a special group."

The Vikings return senior leaders Mackenzie Huber and Emily Schafer this season. Huber was an NAIA All-American Honorable Mention last season and was a first-team all-conference pick. She averaged 13.8 points per game and 7.1 rebounds per game last season. Schafer averaged 4.8 points per game and 2.2 rebounds per game. Additional returners include Gabby Martin, Zoie Breckheimer, Allison Bartholomay and Alexis Bentz.

Some of the new faces this season include Macey Kvilvang, a 6-5 center who joins the Vikings from North Dakota State, an NCAA Division I program. Guards Dani Schwanke and Maara Nelson both transferred from Lake Region State College to join the Vikings roster. The group of newcomers also includes six freshmen.

"I am very proud of this group for their work in the offseason," says Johnson, in her third season leading the Vikings. "With nine new faces in our program, it's critical to get them acclimated as soon as possible, and that takes buy-in and hard work during the off season. Adding this recruiting class to our core of returners is exciting, and I can't wait to see what they can accomplish together."

Whitney receives prize at International Mezzotint Festival



Linda Whitney, professor emerita of art, won the Prize for Originality and for Breaking Classical Boundaries at the Fifth International Mezzotint Festival held in Ekaterinburg, Russia, beginning Aug. 16. Her prize was one of four

major awards presented, which also included Grand Prize, Prize for Full Correspondence of Technique and Imagery, and Prize for Adhering to the Traditions and Skills of Graphical Work. The award comes with an invitation for a solo exhibition of her mezzotints during the Sixth International Mezzotint Festival in 2021.

About 1,000 mezzotints created by 113 artists from 31 countries were installed at three venues, and 19 workshops were held as part of a printing marathon.

The Open Competition category included 356 works. Whitney entered seven mezzotints, and all seven, including "Red Fancy Shawl Dancer" (pictured), were accepted for the exhibition. Whitney spent close to two weeks in Russia; a fellowship she received from the U.S. State Department helped defray travel expenses.


Whitney began teaching art at VCSU in 1994 and retired in 2014; she served as chair of the Art Department throughout her tenure





at the university. She holds a Bachelor of Arts in painting and printmaking, and a Master of Fine Arts degree in printmaking, both from the University of North Dakota.

He rounded up additional supplies from local businesses including paint, shop supplies, and the old newspaper racks that would be filled with books once the Little Free Libraries were completed and out in the community. What stood out about Devin was the way he fostered community involvement, bringing together the entire school, its stakeholders, and the wider community."

In an email to his VCSU mentor, Donna James, Hodgins said, "I am grateful to have had the opportunity to attend VCSU, to learn from you and its other instructors. Your teaching, leadership, and passion shall always resonate in my approach toward education and librarianship."

He then went on to graduate school at the University of North Dakota, earning a master's degree in 1962. Martin then taught school in Sheboygan, Wis., in 1962-63, before moving back to Valley City, where he taught and served as chair of the Art Department at Valley City State College from 1963-1977. In 1972, he took a year's sabbatical to pursue an MFA at Ohio State University, also teaching there as he finished his degree. In 1977 he moved his family to New Brighton, Minn., where he joined Northwestern University in Roseville, Minn., serving as professor and chair of the Art Department from 1977 until his 1994 retirement.

Martin and his wife, Mary, enjoyed collecting antiques and participating in antique shows after his retirement. His survivors include his wife; a sister, Carol (Milton) Scherf; three children, Carrie Kronebusch (and husband Paul), Jason Martin (and wife Sara), and Candace Reid; and eight grandchildren.



Harold Pedersen '48

Harold Leslie Pedersen died Sept. 7, 2019, at age 96. Born Feb. 19, 1923, in Valley City to Morris and Lura Pedersen, he graduated from College High School in Valley City, where he was an outstanding athlete in football, basketball and track and field. Pedersen continued his education at Valley City State Teachers College until World War II, when he enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps. He served with the USMC's 5th Division Raiders as a machine gunner, landing on Iwo Jima on his 22nd birthday. Pedersen served in Japan during the Allied Occupation, returning home in 1946 and returning to college at VCSTC, where

he resumed playing basketball and football. In 1948, he earned an education degree from Valley City State, where he majored in physical education and geography. He later earned a master's degree at Colorado State.

Pedersen's high school teaching and coaching career started in Williston, N.D. in 1950. In 1952, he started the sport of wrestling in North Dakota and was considered the "Father of North Dakota Wrestling." He transformed the winless Williston Coyotes football team into state champions in 1953 and was subsequently named North Dakota Football Coach of the Year. In 1962, Pedersen became the first president of the North Dakota High School Coaches Association. In 1963, he became head wrestling coach, assistant football coach and assistant athletic director at the University of North Dakota. In 1971, he was named the first athletic director for the 17 Fargo Public Schools and managed state tournaments in every sport.

He was inducted into the North Dakota Coaches Hall of Fame in 1973, the North Dakota Athletic Directors Hall of Fame in 1974 and the National High School Coaches Association (NHSCA) Hall of Fame in 1999. He received the VCSU Distinguished Alumni Award in 1981, and in 1985 he was the named NHSCA National Athletic Director of the Year.

Pedersen had married Genevieve Dieterich in 1947. They loved to travel and moved to Montana after his 1985 retirement. The Pedersens also had a winter home in Mesa, Ariz., for several years. They were married for almost 72 years before Genevieve's death in 2018. Pedersen is survived by his son, Tom Pedersen, and daughter, Diane Bailly, along with their partners, and three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.
