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A visit from the Higher Learning Commission

Greetings from VCSU! The Higher Learning Commission (HLC) was formed in 1895 as the North Central Association.



This is a voluntary association of diverse institutions with a common purpose: the continuing improvement of higher education. The HLC is one of six regional accreditors in the United States. Its mission is to “advance the common good through quality assurance of higher education as the leader in equitable, transformative and trusted accreditation in the service of students and member institutions.”

VCSU is part of the open pathway review process, which occurs in a ten-year cycle. The cycle includes an assurance review in year four, a quality initiative in years five

through nine and a comprehensive evaluation in year ten.

Our on-site evaluation as part of the comprehensive evaluation took place on campus Sept. 20–21. Before the visit, we submitted a comprehensive assurance argument addressing five different criteria. These criteria are the standards of quality by which HLC determines whether an institution merits accreditation or reaffirmation of accreditation.

- Criterion 1. Mission
- Criterion 2. Integrity: Ethical and Responsible Conduct
- Criterion 3. Teaching and Learning: Quality, Resources and Support
- Criterion 4. Teaching and Learning: Evaluation and Improvement
- Criterion 5. Institutional Effectiveness, Resources and Planning

VCSU prepared for this review in a thorough and thoughtful manner with input and guidance from the entire campus community. Faculty, staff and student participation

provided critically important details and information for the report. Our campus community also met with the HLC visit team during open forums on campus.

We had excellent participation in the open forums, and the writing team and criterion chairs for the assurance argument did a tremendous job in gathering data, preparing our documents, and leading the university through this process. Special thanks to Dr. Margaret Dahlberg, Dr. Katie Woehl, Dr. Anthony Dutton, Emily Dafoe, Dr. Kerry Gregoryk and Dr. Jamie Wirth.

During the exit interview, the HLC site visit team identified several strengths at VCSU. They noted our strong sense of community, reputation of the institution, strong state support, active engagement of the State Board of Higher Education, data-driven decision making, successful navigation of COVID-19, and strong shared governance. We will not receive our final written report for several weeks, but we are thankful to all for their participation and feedback.

Once we receive our written report, we will be providing another update on our path toward re-accreditation with the HLC.

I have always considered a college campus to be synonymous with hope. Often that hope is in full focus, other times it



is not as clear and just a feeling of expectation of a certain outcome.

It is awesome to have a front row seat at this amazing University and witness how hope helps define what we want for our future college students and then hear the narrative of how past alumni shaped their lives when they reunite with others on the campus.

Hope happened 40 years ago when a group of young Vikings became the first football team in history to win an NAIA playoff game. This past September they reunited again to reminisce and celebrate what the gift of hope has brought them.

To see the group pick up where they left off the last time they were

together speaks volumes to the power of what the VCSU campus and community can do.

Hope happened 25 years ago when VCSU took its boldest step to date, opting to become the second university in the country to issue laptop computers to students and faculty. The initiative has evolved over that time when our faculty began replacing some textbooks with free open educational resources (OERs) for general education classes. Those efforts have saved students countless out-of-pocket dollars and help provide opportunities for more dynamic learning.

Hope happened 10 years ago with an aggressive shift in strategy. This spurred a growth mindset and risk-taking to move our campus to the next level. A new science center was built, the first on-campus construction in 40 years.

A revitalized scholarship program became an important contributing factor of nine consecutive years of enrollment growth due to a major

donation. The first turf athletic field, a renovated running track and by the end of this year, a ribbon cutting on the Center for the Arts. We have become a state jewel, both attractive and significant to the state of North Dakota.

The people, initiatives and projects of the last 40 years all began with hope that came aboard different boats that raised the tide enough to lift our ship.

Today our ship has embarked again on a bold capital campaign to ensure continued service to our students by providing them again with hope, of updated campus buildings, athletic facilities, and scholarship enhancements. What VCSU can do in the next 40 years depends upon what we do right now.

Forward Together – VCSU's Capital Campaign Progressing

VCSU's first ever Capital Campaign is making good progress.

Every day, we are moving a bit closer to our goal. It is an exciting

time! Our team is fortunate to have George Gaukler '62 as the Capital Campaign Chairperson. Gaukler is a long-term supporter of the university, a member of the VCSU Foundation Board of Directors, and a Valley City businessman. Gaukler is joined on the Campaign Task Force by Ray Braun, Bob Bergan, Dennis McCulloch, Jill DeVries, Cory Anderson, Dave Bass, Dick Gulmon, Phil Mueller, and VCSU President Alan LaFave.

The Foundation Board of Directors announced in February of 2020 that the university would move forward with its first ever Capital Campaign. Later that year, the Campaign Task Force began their solicitation efforts, contacting Alumni and Friends of the university asking



for their support of this important effort.

The committee established priorities including: the renovation of the W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse (The Bubble) and a major addition to the facility. The Bubble was built in 1960. At the time, there were 111 athletes and seven coaches in the facility. Today, there are 28 coaches and 285 athletes. More than 100 VCSU athletes do not have a locker.

The campaign includes plans to renovate McCarthy Hall, the former College High School and Industrial Arts facility, into VCSU's School of Education.

It is only natural that the former Lab School become the home of VCSU's nationally recognized School of Education.

The campaign will also result in the update of VCSU's Memorial Student Center and growing the scholarship program to respond to growing enrollment and ongoing increases in the cost of education.

In total, the campaign hopes to raise \$25M to respond to the priorities identified by the capital campaign planning committee.

The committee encourages everyone to give serious consideration to supporting this effort. This campaign will position VCSU for the next 50 years. The priorities identified are actual needs and not wants. We are in fact, **Building the Future Today.**

"We invite you to join us in this exciting effort to enhance the educational opportunities at Valley City State University," Committee Chair Gaukler said. "The projects identified in this campaign are critical for the university to respond to the significant increase in enrollment and to compete in a globalized society. We need you to invest in our team so we can move Forward Together."



Building more than a Fisheries and Wildlife Program

Dr. Bob Anderson came to Valley City State University in 2005 to build a Fisheries and Wildlife Program. Now his students are researching, protecting and managing critical parts of our ecosystems and landscape.

When Bob Anderson was hired at Valley City State in 2005, he had a straightforward objective: build a Fisheries and Wildlife program.

“When I first came, there were zero students in the program,” he said. “It didn’t officially exist until the fall of 2006.”

Now, students across the nation come to VCSU to get a Bachelor’s degree in Fisheries and Wildlife Science with three concentrations available: Wildlife, Fisheries, and/or Conservation Law Enforcement.

Anderson built curriculum, marketed the program and had eleven students the next year.

“The program was designed to include many hands-on field experiences, resulting in the program growing fairly quickly,” Anderson said.

Dr. Casey Williams was hired in 2011 to specialize in fisheries and the program continued to grow, recently reaching 70 students. The goal is to grow to 100.

Anderson and Williams take pride in helping connect students with internships and ensuring their resumes

are strong.

“We work closely with students to help them find internships in the summer,” Anderson said. “Each summer we have 50 students in internships working for all sorts of natural resource agencies like the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, North Dakota Game and Fish, Natural Resource Conservation Services (NRCS), Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, Ducks Unlimited and Delta Waterfowl.”

There is a need for individuals to fill jobs related to conservation biology, but also jobs that are tied to law enforcement, environmental consulting related to wind farm and oil development and general natural resource management.

“When students first enter the major, most are not aware of the diversity of jobs available. When they graduate, they are prepared to become natural resource professionals. It is very rewarding for me to see our graduates become biologists, land managers, game wardens, environmental consultants, park rangers and

farm bill biologists, among other positions. By the time they graduate many have developed specialized interests in areas they didn't know existed just a few years earlier, and often continue their education in graduate school," said Anderson.

VCSU Fisheries and Wildlife graduates like Jim Job '10 are prepared for it all.

FOLLOWING HIS DREAM

From the age of 5, Job knew he wanted to be a game warden. That dream came true after he graduated from Valley City State and then the Law Enforcement Academy.

He viewed the job from a customer service perspective.

"I wanted to educate as much as I could, especially the kids," Job said. "I wanted their first game warden experience to be a positive one."

In 2016, he was honored as North Dakota's Wildlife Officer of the Year.

That dedication and willingness to teach has now landed him within North Dakota Game and Fish as an outreach biologist.

He teaches anyone who will listen about the wonders of nature in North Dakota.

Words from Bob Anderson continue to help him succeed professionally, especially when he is a radio show guest and a caller has a very specific question.

"One of the biggest things that Bob told us is that you don't remember everything from college but you learn where to look for that information in college," Job said. "There are times on the radio show, times when I don't know the answer, but I can go back and get the answer for them."

Job loves his work, and continues to see more people take an active interest in the natural environment.

"Most people in North Dakota enjoy the outdoors whether you know it or not," he said. "It could be as simple as planting flowers outside that help honeybees and many other things."

Although not everyone is cut out for doctorate level studies focusing on Fisheries and Wildlife, Job encourages everyone to learn a few small things about the world around them.

"Be more aware of your surroundings and ask questions," he said. "Questions like, 'What kind of bird is that,' go through your head and knowing the answer can make a walk or any outdoor activity more enjoyable."

Awareness and perseverance helped Job recently capture a ruffed grouse performing a unique "drum display" in 4K video in the state for North Dakota Game and Fish.

Job had already been to the spot where he knew a male ruffed grouse frequented. He had already set up blinds and cameras, but every time the little bird would jump out of sight of the lens before starting his performance.

Then one cold morning, Job got lucky.

As the sun broke through the trees overhead, the bird started to perform, and the video is magic.

FINDING HER WAY

Amy (Doll) Gebhard '14 always knew she wanted to go to VCSU.

"Isn't it every little girl's dream to be a doctor or a vet," she said laughing. "I knew I wanted to work with animals from a very young age."

As she started studying animals through the Fisheries and Wildlife Program and completing internships, she realized her passion was in fisheries.

She spent summer months working for North Dakota Game and Fish, Texas Parks and Wildlife and with the Prairie Waters Research Center. After graduation she landed a graduate position at Tennessee Tech University, researching banded sculpin, a freshwater fish.

Then she was hired as a resource biologist with South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks in 2017 and in 2019 was promoted to a fisheries biologist where she continues that work today.

"We have four reservoirs on the Missouri River in the state and I work with two of them," she explained. Gebhard said her time at VCSU prepared her well for her current position.

"Valley City does a very good job in the fisheries and wildlife program making sure kids have the hands on experience they need," she said. "That prepared me for internships and future jobs."

Kyle McLean '11 couldn't agree more.

"The focus is on mentoring and preparing students not only to have the academic knowledge base to be a professional, but to outline the steps needed to end up where you want to end up," McLean said of the Fisheries and Wildlife program. "You could become a scientist, or be on the ground managing a landscape."

McLean transferred to VCSU from Jamestown specifically for the program. As a kid, he was always interested in the outdoors and collected various field guides.

His schooling, along with his love of field guides landed him a very specific job. The Northern Prairie

Wildlife Research Center needed someone to survey how many frogs were present.

McLean had a pretty good handle on frog calls, as he would listen to old CDs connected to field guides about frog species. So he spent time in a truck, driving a 14-mile loop listening for frog calls to determine how many frogs were in the area.

That work led to years of management and research work. Last January he earned his doctorate from NDSU and is now a research ecologist with the Research Center.

"My goal is to conduct research that provides management and policy agencies with a scientific understanding of the climate or land use factors that help maintain biodiversity," McLean said. "It's a balancing act."

Finding that balance between stakeholders, the resources, development and other interests is important, and complex, and McLean enjoys it.

MAKING THE CONNECTION

John Lindstrom '11 knows that balancing act well. The Minnesota-grown football talent first came to VCSU to play football. But a broken foot left him focusing on his studies and getting very involved with the program.

During the summer months he was able to get seasonal internships like many other students studying under Anderson and Williams. His

first placement was with Fish and Wildlife in Minnesota, and the doors kept opening.

He spent time looking for birds near Kulm, North Dakota and meeting with landowners north of Medina about conservation easements.

But Lindstrom's love was always waterfowl, specifically ducks.

"I identified early on that ducks are my passion, they are still my passion," he said. His post-graduation path took him to graduate school researching ducks migrating just north of the Kentucky border. Now he is working to restore, preserve and improve habitat for waterfowl through Ducks Unlimited as a regional biologist in central Minnesota.

Every year, his heart brings him back to Valley City. For the past 12 years he and a group of friends and family have returned to North Dakota to enjoy duck hunting season.

He credits Anderson and Williams for turning VCSU into a hub for training individuals in conservation work or for graduate school.

FROM INTERN TO STOPPING INVASIVE SPECIES

It only took Ben Holen '18 a few conversations with Anderson and Williams to decide to become a VCSU Viking.

The Bismarck, North Dakota graduate always knew he wanted to go into conservation. He grew

up hunting and fishing, but was not totally certain what studying the topic meant.

“Right away Bob Anderson teaches Introduction to Fisheries and Wildlife Techniques,” Holen said. “I knew then it was the right profession for me.”

He worked as an intern for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department and for a similar agency in Idaho and then did trout restoration in Utah.

Eventually he applied to come back home and was picked up as a biologist for Game and Fish working with Aquatic Nuisance Species (ANS).

Now, as the statewide coordinator for this effort, he is one of the main individuals helping stop the spread of species like zebra mussels.

“The ANS fight is big. It’s important to have people out on the landscape to inspect watercraft, and to get the word out there,” Holen said. “We are a very small agency in general and we work to recruit other partners to help with this.”

The importance of building relationships and partnerships is one of the many takeaways he had as a VCSU student. Lindstrom

agreed. “It’s such a small, close and tight-knit campus,” Lindstrom said. “Everyone knows everyone and that is what conservation is too.”

The 2021 North Dakota legislature has again created a program to match funds donated to Valley City State University. VCSU has been allocated up to \$700,000 of matching dollars if the University can raise \$1,400,000 in private donations. The funds enhance more than 225 scholarship endowment funds.

VCSU Enrollment Grows for 9th Consecutive Year

Headcount has increased 24% in the past decade

Valley City State University (VCSU) enrolled 1,686 students this fall, registering the most students in the school's history in a fall semester. Fall enrollment has grown for nine consecutive years.

The 1,686 count of students includes a record-breaking 163 students in graduate studies. Graduate program enrollment increased by 20% this year.

"The continued growth of our student body is a testament to the quality of the educational experience we provide," VCSU President Dr. Alan LaFave said. "Our faculty and staff strive to offer the best possible experience. That dedication shows as more

individuals choose to become a part of our Viking family."

"We place student success at the heart of our mission and that, combined with our Forward Together capital campaign and rankings as a U.S. News Best College, continue to propel us forward," LaFave said.



Viking Basketball Starts New Season

Viking Women look to take step forward

The Valley City State women's basketball team has been selected to finish sixth in the North Star Athletic Association as voted on by the eight head coaches in the conference.

The Vikings tied for fifth place in the conference standings last season with a 6-8 conference record and finished with an 8-13 record overall. Head coach Vanessa Johnson begins her fifth season leading the VCSU women's basketball team and assistant Taylor Henningsgard is back for her second season.

Valley City State's Allie Critchley and Adriana Torres return as key contributors from last season. Critchley, a 5-foot-6 guard, averaged 28 minutes, 4.6 points and 3.7 rebounds last season while totaling 51 assists and 22 steals.

Torres, a 5-foot-10 guard, averaged 29 minutes, 10.4 points and 5.5 rebounds per game.

The Vikings also return senior Emma Nielsen and junior Taryn Dieterle who saw significant playing time last season. New faces joining the Vikings this year include transfers Hailey Roberts, Allie Negen and Bayli Heap, and freshmen Katie Johnson and Ashlyn Diemert.

The Vikings tip off the season in early November and begin conference play on Dec. 4 at Dickinson State. The remainder of conference play will be in January and February.



VCSU Men picked to win NSAA

The Valley City State men's basketball team enters the 2021-22 season as the favorite to win the North Star Athletic Association conference title.

After posting a 19-7 record last season, the Vikings are picked first in this year's NSAA Preseason Coaches' Poll. The Vikings return everyone that saw significant minutes on last year's team. VCSU featured a balanced attack with 11 different players averaging more than 12 minutes per game and seven players scoring at least seven points per game.

Kevin Schramm was named 1st Team All-Conference and Honorable Mention All-American last year, while Chris Thompson was named the NSAA Defensive Player of the Year. Jalen Addison is also back after being named 2nd Team All-Conference, along with Connor Entzi who earned Honorable Mention All-Conference. They highlight a Viking roster that has nine seniors for the 2021-22 season.

VCSU head coach Ryan Montgomery has also added a pair of transfers to the already deep roster. Junior transfers Duoth Gach and Uhana Ochan were previously teammates at North Dakota State College of Science. Ochan played last year at Francis Marion University, an NCAA Division II school.

Montgomery is in his sixth season as head coach of the Vikings. He is assisted this year by Tim Wagner, who is in his first season with the Vikings. The Vikings started the season in late October. The bulk of conference play will be in January and February.

Fall Sports Find Success

Football sets records during 2021 season

Valley City State's football team experienced the highs and lows of college football during the 2021 season. The Vikings won their first six games – including a 24-7 win over rival Jamestown – as they climbed as high as No. 15 in the NAIA Football Coaches' Top 25 Poll.

The season hit a speed bump though when the Vikings suffered an upset loss at Dakota State and then dropped a hard-fought 14-7 game against eventual conference champion Dickinson State. The Vikings regrouped with a win at Waldorf and had a 7-2 overall record entering the final game of the season in early November.

The win over Waldorf was the 150th of his career for VCSU head coach Dennis McCulloch, who is the all-time wins leader at VCSU and ranks sixth among active NAIA coaches. It's an accomplishment shared by assistant head coach Gregg Horner and linebackers coach Dave Rausch who have both coached with McCulloch for all 150 wins.

Individually, VCSU players set or tied several records during the season. Senior quarterback Jalen Pfeifer became the all-time passing leader in school history as he surpassed 9,000 career passing yards during the season. He also set school records for completions, total touchdowns accounted for (passing and rushing) and passing attempts.

Defensively, Jahidi West tied a school record with three interceptions in a single game, and Riley Gerhardt tied the single-game sacks record with three in a victory against Mayville State.

Team highlights of the season included a 24-7 win over Jamestown in the 3rd Annual VCSU Ag Bowl. The Vikings retained control of the Paint Bucket traveling trophy and are now 9-1 against the Jimmies over the last 10 games. The Vikings defeated Concordia College-Moorhead 35-32 on the road, tying the game with a touchdown in the final minute and then winning on a last-second field goal by kicker Nico Magana.

VCSU's defense had a shutout in a 49-0 Homecoming victory against Mayville State. The Viking defense ranked Top 10 nationally in several categories – including points allowed and interceptions.

Haugrud ace highlights Fall golf season

Valley City State golf teams had success on the course in the first season under head coach Clay Mannie. Junior Hayley Shanks led the Viking women and earned medalist honors at the Spartan Invite at Pebble Lake Golf Course in Fergus Falls, Minn. She carded a career-best 160 (82-80) to take first place by two strokes.

Shanks and senior Jocelyn Braunberger each finished in the Top 10 at the UMary Fall Invite hosted at Hawktree Golf Club in Bismarck, and VCSU junior Megan Haugrud also carded a hole-in-one at the UMary Fall Invite. It is believed to be the first hole-in-one in competition since reinstating the VCSU golf program in 2009. Haugrud scored the ace on the 113-yard hole 8 using a 9-iron.

On the men's side, sophomore Rory Gentzkow led the team with two Top-5 finishes this season. The LaMoure, N.D. native fired a one-under-par 71 during the UMary Fall Invite – his first career round under par.

The Vikings played four tournaments this fall and will resume the season in the spring.





Baseball posts 6-2 record during fall season

The Valley City State baseball team had its best fall season in recent history, posting a 6-2 record during eight countable games in September and October.

The Vikings defeated rival University of Jamestown twice during the fall, including a 24-4 blowout victory at Jamestown. The Vikings also split a pair of games with Mayville State and had a 3-1 record against Dickinson State.

Drew Nixon led the team with a .407 batting average and a .630 slugging percentage as he hit two home runs and drove in six RBIs. David Demeter and JT Reed also both homered twice, and Ryan Reynolds hit .385 with six RBIs.

On the mound, Demeter pitched four scoreless innings in the closer role as he posted a 0.00 ERA and picked up four saves. Reed Butz was 2-0 with a 2.66 ERA and 29 strikeouts in 21 innings. That included 13 strikeouts in six innings during a 4-3 win against Jamestown. Chase Feller also picked up two wins on the mound.

VCSU Baseball will resume its season in early March with its annual spring trip to Tucson, Ariz.

Cross Country competes at 5 meets

The VCSU cross country teams raced at five meets during its fall season, wrapping up with the NSAA Conference Championships in early November.

Jasmine Barnes led the Viking women at each meet, while Jayden Wheeling and Noah Rolfe each had top finishes for VCSU's men. The conference meet was upcoming when this issue of the Bulletin went to print.

Volleyball plays well down the stretch

Viking Volleyball has enjoyed a successful conference season under second-year head coach Brigitte Greywater, getting off to its best start in the North Star Athletic Association since the 2018-19 season.

After starting the year with a 2-9 overall record, the Vikings have turned it on in conference play with an 8-4 record entering the final weekend of conference play. VCSU's only conference losses have come against teams (Viterbo & Bellevue) that are ranked in the Top 10 nationally. VCSU will be the No. 3 or No. 4 seed for the postseason held in Watertown, S.D. on Nov. 12-13.

Senior libero Kallene Klever recorded her 1000th career dig on Oct. 12 in a five-set victory over Dickinson State. She was also named NSAA Defender of the Week twice this season, averaging 4.6 digs per set.

Freshman setter Sadie Hansen earned her first NAIA National Setter of the Week award on Oct. 12 after posting 14 assists per set in a pair of conference sweeps over Mayville State and Presentation College. She has averaged nine assists per set on the season and totaled 14 double-doubles.

Senior outside hitter Katie Juarez has solidified herself as one of the Top 10 Viking attackers in VCSU history. She reached 972 career kills on Oct. 30 at Viterbo to rank 9th all-time in the Viking record book.



3 - Michaela Scherr '16 and Chris Lemna were married July 24, 2021. Michaela gained a daughter, Audrey.



Willis Wagar '71 - Buildings and Grounds Supervisor 1971-1995

Willis Wagar, Valley City, ND passed away Monday, Sept. 13, 2021 at Sanford Health Fargo, N.D.



Willis Franklin Wagar was born Aug. 31, 1936 at home in rural Inkster, N.D. to Raymond and Myrtle (Toppin) Wagar. He graduated from Inkster High School in 1954 as valedictorian. From 1955-1957 Willis was in the service as a civilian officer and served in the Civilian Work Program at the Grafton State Hospital. Willis was actively involved in the ministry at the Southwest Bible Chapel in Valley City. He was

a member of Kiwanis, Gideon's International, a 4-H leader and Toastmaster's.


Department of Computer Systems and Software Engineering from 1998 until her retirement in 2019.
