Greetings Vikings!

The printing of this edition of the Bulletin coincides nicely with our presentations made to the two North Dakota legislative appropriations committees from the Senate on Jan. 19 and House on March 10. Joining me in our presentations were Student Senate President Angeline Gannon, Vice President for Business Affairs Wesley Wintch, and VCSU Foundation Executive Director Larry Robinson.

Our budget presentation focused on the past, present and future of VCSU, with particular attention on student academic success, student applied research and accolades, outstanding faculty and staff contributions, continued enrollment growth, cooperation and collaboration with community agencies in Valley City and Barnes County, and our plans for the future.

Our growth at VCSU continues to be a collaborative effort and there is no one singular action or strategic enrollment focus that has resulted in our success. Rather, the combination of several initiatives continues to propel us forward.

Allow me to share some of the highlights of the presentations:

- VCSU has been ranked as one of the "Best Colleges" by U.S. News for 23 consecutive years and was named the "Most Beautiful Campus in North Dakota" by Buzzfeed.
- Initially created as a "normal" school, we have a 130-year record of providing highly qualified educators to the state of North Dakota with 1,438 alumni currently teaching in 157 North Dakota communities.
- We have added academic programs in the areas of sound production and digital design, and we have other high demand programs in various stages of development and approval.
- We've created new initiatives such as the Rural School Partner Benefit Program, which helps North Dakota rural schools attract and retain their teacher workforce.
- Our reputation and success as innovators with technology strengthened our position and ability to respond to the demand for online instruction during the Covid pandemic.
- Our athletic conference was one of only a few conferences in the nation to move forward with a full slate of fall and spring athletics.

- Almost 70 percent of our students are from North Dakota.
- In 2019, VCSU had the highest retention rate (73%) of all the 4-year regional institutions in North Dakota. This is so very important for enrollment stability.
- VCSU remains one of the most affordable universities in North
 Dakota and the Midwest, and we continuously look for opportunities
 to keep the cost of a university education attainable. We decreased
 the student technology fee by 10 percent in 2019 and haven't
 incurred any additional increases since then, and our room rates
 were kept even for Fall 2020.
- With the use of Open Educational Resources, VCSU students have saved more than \$1.5 million in textbook costs since 2016.
- Collaboration with the community and the Valley City/Barnes
 County Economic Development Corporation continues in the area
 of providing salesforce training and emerging educational needs to
 help efforts in job creation and workforce needs.
- Our highly active and supportive VCSU Foundation provided a record \$1.86 million in student scholarship support in 2020-21.
- During our presentation, we shared several high impact practice success stories of our students and programs in fisheries and wildlife, computer science and software engineering, recording technology, 2020 emergency substitute teacher program, and internships and career readiness.
- Finally, our Forward Together campaign to raise \$25 million in private donations is underway and will address current and future capital needs for our campus and students.

As you can see, the success of the university is a direct result of strategic planning and the collective efforts of many. We are incredibly grateful to our faculty and staff for their commitment to our students and mission, and to our students and their families for choosing VCSU as the place to pursue their dreams and aspirations. Our deep gratitude extends to you, our alumni, supporters and patrons who provide greatly needed financial support for our students. This is, indeed, the best time to be a Viking! Go Vikings!

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Forward Together: This is Our Day and this is Our Time

In February of 2020, the VCSU Foundation Board of Directors voted unanimously to proceed with the first ever Capital Campaign in the history of Valley City State University. After years of planning and discussion about the Capital needs of the institution, the board elected to move forward with this bold initiative. The university had previously identified a number of high priorities for the campaign, which we've titled: **Forward Together**.

- Priority 1 includes a major addition to the W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse, adding approximately 93,000 square feet, including a large indoor turf practice area, a 200-meter indoor track, locker rooms, a Viking Hall of Fame and much more.
- Priority 2 is to raise a total of \$1 million to enhance the Foundation's scholarship program.
- Priority 3 is to raise \$1 million for enhancements to the Memorial Student Center.
- Priority 4 is to raise \$2 million to make important renovations to McCarthy Hall, the former lab school. This facility will soon become the dedicated home for VCSU's School of Education.

The priorities in the Capital Campaign are necessitated for a number of reasons. The advent of women's sports and the growth of our athletic program in general has created significant challenges in the Osmon Fieldhouse. When the facility was built in 1960 there were 111 Viking athletes and seven coaches. Today, there are 285 athletes and 28 coaches, and over 100 athletes have no locker space. Scheduling has become a major issue. Although the arena in the "Bubble" is still a very popular and competitive playing surface for basketball, the needs for the facility are far greater than basketball.

The need for additional scholarship funding is ongoing. With all-time record enrollment, the demand for scholarship support is greater than ever. We

place a high priority on awarding scholarships to minimize student debt, and we allocated a record \$1.86 millon to VCSU students this year.

Like the Osmon fieldhouse, the Memorial Student Center was constructed in the early 1960's and expanded in 1969. The building is maintained in excellent condition, but our enrollment growth has placed real pressure on this facility as well. Additional space would allow for expanded student activities, Alumni events and community engagement.

McCarthy Hall served for many years as our Laboratory School. Countless VCSU students received their first taste of teacher education training in this facility. The years have taken their toll on McCarthy, and the need for a major renovation has come. The plan is to convert this facility into the VCSU School of Education. Fitting indeed!


I can assure you that the priorities included in the Capital Campaign are indeed "Needs" and not "Wants." The total campaign costs amount to \$25 million. George Gaukler '62, has graciously agreed to serve as the Chairperson of our Capital Campaign.

"We want to thank all of our alumni and friends for their past support," said Gaukler. "We invite you to join us in this exciting effort to enhance the educational opportunities at VCSU even further. The projects included in this campaign are critical for the university to respond to the significant increase in enrollment and to compete in a globalized society. Please answer our calls, respond to meeting requests, and engage in this conversation about the future of Valley City State University. We need you to invest in our campaign so we can move Forward Together."



Ray Braun's impact on Valley City State University has been years in the making. From monetary gifts to volunteer work, Braun has continually shown strong commitment to VCSU since making the Valley City community his home.

After 60 years of ongoing support, Braun recently gifted a \$1 million life estate to VCSU in support of the university's first ever capital campaign. It is the first major gift of the \$25 million capital campaign – titled *Forward Together* – which includes expansion of VCSU's athletic facilities, renovations of campus buildings, and increased scholarship support.

Braun's gift will directly support student scholarships for years to come, says Larry Robinson, the VCSU Foundation's Executive Director for Advancement.

"Ray's commitment to VCSU has been exemplary," Robinson said. "He has given of his time, talent and treasure for more than 60 years. His generosity speaks volumes of his desire to constantly give back and advocate for our university. We are most appreciative and thankful for his support. He has clearly impacted generations of students."

Braun was a key player in the establishment of the VCSU Foundation in 1996, and he has been central to its success over the subsequent 25 years. This year, the Foundation allocated a record \$1.86 million in student scholarships.

"This community and this university mean a lot to me," Braun said when asked about his contributions over the years. "It is a great feeling to be able to give something back."

Along with playing a major role in establishing the VCSU Foundation Board of Directors, Braun also helped create the Foundation Investment

Committee. He has been a long-term member of the Viking Century Club and is a regular in the stands at VCSU football and basketball games, cheering on the Vikings.

In 2011, Braun was recognized with the VCSU President's Distinguished Service Award – the highest honor that the President can bestow – for his exemplary contributions and ongoing support of Valley City State University. He is one of just 25 individuals to receive the honor.

Braun spent his working career as a managing partner of Ludvigson Braun and Company, a CPA firm in Valley City. The business provided a variety of accounting and financial services, including tax preparation, audit representation and payroll reporting. The firm was recently transferred to new ownership, and for the last several years Braun has served in an advisory capacity.

Born and raised at Strasburg, N.D., Braun attended Dakota Business College and the University of North Dakota. After making his home in Valley City, he became actively involved in the Valley City community, including Saint Catherine's Church, Reach (Religious Educators Advancing Christian Heritage), the Chamber of Commerce and the Valley City-Barnes County Development Corporation.

Braun is a director with TRI W-G Inc., a medical equipment manufacturing firm in Valley City. He also serves as a board member of the Sheyenne Valley Foundation and a director of the Dakota Real Estate Investment Trust in Fargo, N.D. With various other commercial real estate interests in the community, Braun's roots in Valley City continue to run deep.

He is the proud father of three children, John (VCSU '94), Chris, and Rae Marie, and has eight grandchildren.

VCSU Alumni Hold Leadership Positions in the N.D. Legislature

Two Valley City State University alumni are holding leadership positions in the current session of the North Dakota Legislature. Joan (Leichtman) Heckaman '67 is the Senate Minority Leader while Chet Pollert '77 is the House Majority Leader. The two both credit their years at Valley City State University for helping prepare them for the many demands of their respective positions.

Pollert has served in the House of Representatives since 1999 while Heckaman has served in the North Dakota Senate since 2006. They have both held roles on different legislative committees during their tenure. Heckaman has served on the Administrative Rules Committee; Budget Section; Information Technology Committee; and Legislative Management. Pollert has served on the Budget Section; Legislative Management; and Human Services.

Rep. Pollert noted that his experience as a small business owner helped him prepare for the legislature. Going back home after each session, he could see first-hand how his decisions impacted the constituents in his district. As House Majority Leader, Pollert noted that one of the biggest challenges is creating a consensus within the caucus and having a vision everyone can share for a common goal. Another big challenge is balancing your time between work, family and being a legislator. Pollert is also quick to point out the tremendous learning experience that the legislature provides.

At VCSU, Pollert remembers his time in the Sigma Nu Fraternity and living in Robertson Hall. He made many life-long friends at Valley City State and was appreciative of the one-on-one relationships with faculty and the low student-to-faculty ratios. Pollert stresses the benefits of a college education, encouraging everyone to consider attending a higher education institution.

"The experience helps you mature, and you soon realize that your successes and failures are your own," he said. "You learn independence."

At VCSU, Pollert majored in business administration and minored in economics and political science. He and his wife Jo have three grown children. They recently sold their business in New Rockford – G&R Grain & Feed – and currently reside in Carrington, N.D. Chet and Jo are members of Trinity Lutheran Church.

Senator Heckaman has many memories of her days at Valley City State. She recalls basketball games at the "Bubble", ping pong in the game room, Homecoming festivities and having professors who enjoyed teaching. As a kid, she attended a one-room rural school but her fears of going to college soon disappeared when she found the faculty and staff so helpful at Valley City State. She was a member of the Viking Marching Band, under Dr. Loren Waa, and the Atheneum Society. Heckaman is a firm believer that alumni need to be ambassadors for their alma mater, and she encourages others to tell the story of their experiences at their university and why their

alma mater is so special. In her words, "VCSU is such a "close knit" school and alumni are often recognized wearing VCSU clothing." She is proud of having attended VCSU and takes her responsibility as an alumna seriously.


Sen. Heckaman is a retired educator, graduating from Valley City State with one of the university's signature teaching degrees. She is the first woman to serve as Senate Minority Leader in the state of North Dakota. Joan and her husband Dewey currently reside in New Rockford, N.D. She has been recognized as the North Dakota Early Childhood Advocate (2013); North Dakota Career and Technical Education Legislator of the Year (2015); and the North Dakota Autism Spectrum Legislator of the Year (2015). Sen. Heckaman is quick to point out the great working relationship she has with Senate Majority Leader Rich Wardner of Dickinson, and House Majority Leader Chet Pollert. Joan and Dewey are members of First Lutheran Church. They have four grown children and 10 grandchildren.

Larry Robinson, a former longtime State Senator representing District 24, and Executive Director of University Advancement at VCSU, believes Rep. Pollert and Sen. Heckaman have served their districts with distinction.

"To be elected to a leadership position by your caucus, speaks volumes of the respect you have earned from your peers," Robinson said. "During my time in the legislature, I have enjoyed working with both of them. They are professionals and passionate about their district and our state."

Alaska Native Making His Mark in North Dakota

Alaska and North Dakota alike boast freezing winters, beautiful scenery, and abundant natural wildlife, but Dr. David Woods noticed a difference all the same.

Born and raised in Anchorage, Alaska, Woods flew into North Dakota for the first time in August 1998 to attend fall football practice at Valley City State University.

"I wore a nice, black Adidas tracksuit when I came to North Dakota," he recalls. "When I came out of the Fargo airport it was 98 degrees, and I'd never been in heat like that. I quickly ran in, stripped off all of my clothes, and came out in shorts and a tank top. Much better."

Now, 23 years later, Woods is calling North Dakota his home; the place he met his wife and raised his family, joined communities, and come to appreciate for its many opportunities. Woods currently coaches and teaches English at Wahpeton High School, but that's not the only place he's making a difference.

"What you put into your community is what you get out of it," he says. "That's the number one lesson Valley City taught me." This belief led Woods to run for Wahpeton's City Council, becoming the first African American to hold a seat as of June 2020. He also authors his own parenting blog and has served as a teacher and coach for hundreds of

students since graduating from VCSU.

Woods' parents always encouraged him to "strive for the best," pushing him to go to college and represent himself well. He tried his best to do exactly that – playing football, running track, and studying English education. At VCSU, Woods' professors emphasized how much representation matters, everywhere.

"I've always wanted a doctorate," he says. "I don't see a lot of Black doctors in education in North Dakota. I needed it so my children and their friends, not just of color, but everyone, sees that here's this guy, happens to be Black, and that's Dr. Woods."

Woods graduated from VCSU in 2002 with a bachelor's degree in English education. He later earned his master's in education from VCSU in 2012 and then became Dr. Woods in December of 2020, completing his PhD in educational leadership from the University of North Dakota. These degrees, along with his council position, coaching activities, personal training, and non-profit involvement, mark some of the highlights of Woods' career since his days at VCSU.

Cory Anderson, now the director of development and major gifts at VCSU, then the offensive coordinator who directly oversaw Woods on the football field, isn't surprised by his achievements.

"He's taken everything on headfirst, just like he did when he was on the football field," Anderson says. "He'll create his own role if there isn't one there for him. He's somebody that the whole Valley City community and the campus can be proud of."

Alongside his professional achievements, Woods considers becoming a father one of his greatest joys. Woods and his wife Heather – also a VCSU alumni and fellow English teacher at Wahpeton High School – met while working together at the VCSU student newspaper. Together, they've raised four children, Scout, 13, Claire, 10, Trey, 7, and Reese, 4. Woods suspects his kids will also be busy, as his girls both play basketball and Trey begins soccer.

Woods' own athletic career came to a climax as a running back at VCSU, but in his last year of high school he wasn't sure he'd even play in college. He injured himself during the first practice of his senior season and worried he'd derailed his chance at playing college football.

"Because I got injured, the offers went away," he says, "but Coach Mac (VCSU head coach Dennis McCulloch) was hounding me, and he called at the right time."

Thanks to the determination of the VCSU coaching staff, Woods committed to VCSU site unseen.

Once he arrived, things weren't exactly easy. The culture shock was hard to overcome. During high school, with his class of 500 students at a school of over 2,000, Woods had grown used to playing for larger crowds. He'd also grown used to playing inside during the winter months, which wasn't the case at Valley City State. During his freshman year at VCSU, the football team went 0-10, not winning a single game.

Then, tragedy struck. Four VCSU students, Woods' teammates on

the football team, died in a car accident on January 17, 1999. The entire university went into mourning. "That was really the last straw," Woods says. "I pretty much decided Valley probably wasn't the place for me."

It would have taken a miracle to convince him to stay. That miracle came in the form of his teammates and now lifelong friends, Mark Rerick, Brent Miller, Darin Walters and Steve Battle.

The four Vikings worked to persuade their friend, promising the team would not only be strong, but successful, if he stayed. Battle suggested they give it one more season and dedicate it to the four lost in the crash. Reluctantly, Woods agreed.

That decision proved to be the right one. Woods scored a total of 19 touchdowns during the 2000 and 2001 football seasons, helping the Vikings to an 18-4 record, a conference title and two national playoff berths. Both those teams were inducted into the Vikings Hall of Fame in 2017.

These successes proved something to Woods. "Everyone has that Division I dream, they see it on TV or whatever, but a lot of good things happen in other divisions, outside of Division I. You can go to Division I, never play, or go to NAIA, play all 4 years, and be the big man on campus. NAIA has more of that community side, while if you don't produce in upper Division I level, you're forgotten."

Aside from football at VCSU, Woods came to know more about the community. Cultural adjustments like waving when a car drove by, instead of fearing a drive-by, came easier to him. He excelled in the classroom as well as on the field. Professors like Dave Bass, who Woods called a mentor to him and many others in the education department, were influences on his education career.

"I think many people on campus didn't know about David's commitment to academic achievement until they had him in class," said Bass. "He became more extroverted, more communicative when he entered the classroom."

Woods' takeaways from college aren't only limited to athletics and academics. He acted as Marcellus in the theater department's production of Hamlet, participated in Mr. VCSU, and joined the student newspaper. It was there, in the Viking Newsroom, he met his future wife Heather Schmit.

Woods hopes everyone feels the same community sense of support as he felt at VCSU and uses it to thrive. "It's a place where if you wanted to create something, you're

going to get the support to create it," he says. "It's a place where you can create a community and do whatever you want to improve it."

At VCSU, Woods developed connections with people who became part of a lifelong group of friends. At VCSU, he became involved with student-run organizations that broadened his interests. At VCSU, he had staff and faculty to lean on while he earned his first degree. Woods is a true believer – and a living example – that whether it's personal, professional, or educational, success can be found at VCSU.

VCSU establishing a Coaches Hall of Fame

Inductees will receive the 'Osmon Icon Award'

VCSU sets spring enrollment record for 6th consecutive year

Valley City State University has set spring enrollment records for the sixth consecutive year, according to official spring term 2021 numbers released Feb. 9 by the university.

VCSU reports a total headcount of 1,632 students this spring, including 1,501 undergraduates and 131 graduate students. Both the total headcount and undergraduate headcount are spring enrollment records, surpassing the previous highs of 1,622 and 1,491 set last year.

The full-time equivalent (FTE) of 1,119 students announced on Feb. 9 is also a new record for the spring.

"This is absolutely tremendous news," said VCSU President Alan LaFave. "Our entire campus community has played a role in achieving this milestone. We are very excited that students, together with their families, continue to trust Valley City State University for their education. This is validation for the work our campus continues to do in providing an outstanding college experience."

Over the past decade, VCSU's total headcount in the spring semester has increased by 25 percent, growing from 1,306 students in 2012 to 1,632 students this spring. Likewise, VCSU has set fall enrollment records for the past six years.

VCSU Holds Virtual Winter Commencement

Valley City State University held a virtual commencement ceremony on Dec. 17, 2020, to honor its graduating class during the 2020 fall semester. VCSU recognized 95 graduates – 81 who received bachelor's degrees and 14 who received master's degrees.

Graduating senior Brady Matheny delivered the undergraduate reflection, and the faculty reflection was presented by Lee Kruger, associate professor of English.

A native of Lisbon, N.D., Matheny earned a bachelor's degree in history education. He was a member of the VCSU football and track and field teams, while also participating in the Native American Culture club, the history club and the National Society of Leadership and Success. Matheny was tabbed a Viking Pilot in 2019, was elected to the 2018 Homecoming Court and has also served as a Viking Ambassador.

During his reflection, he touched on the ways a small campus like VCSU allows students to become involved.

"Football, VCAB, track and many other activities at VCSU have presented me with great opportunities," he said. "They have allowed me to meet so many great people on this campus. You have all made VCSU more than just a school, but a family."

She is also heavily involved on campus as a resident assistant, Viking Ambassador and Learning to Live Mentor, along with being a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Council and the history club. Through it all, she's established tremendous bonds with her teammates and others on campus – leading to memories she won't soon forget.

"At the conference cross country meet my freshman year, we had three athletes qualify for nationals and the rest of my teammates had great races," recalled Angeline. "I personally had a horrible race, but I did not care because I was so happy for and proud of my teammates. The energy and the celebration from our little cross country team was unmatched to anything I have felt before. It was a truly amazing and memorable moment to be a Viking."

Angeline is planning to graduate from VCSU in the fall of 2022 with a degree in history education. She is also pursuing a minor in political science and a certificate in coaching. After graduation, Angeline intends to work as a high school teacher and eventually plans to earn her master's degree and pursue a career as a school administrator.



VCSU named in U.S. News and World Report Best Online Program rankings

Valley City State University's online master's in education and bachelor's programs have been recognized by U.S. News and World Report in its Best Online Programs rankings.

In the 2021 national rankings of degree-granting online programs, Valley City State's online master's programs in education were ranked 142nd of 296 schools, and the online bachelor's programs at VCSU were ranked 189th out of 337 schools.

Factors considered in the rankings include student engagement, services and technologies available to students, faculty credentials and training, as well as expert opinion on the academic quality of programs. Student excellence is also considered for schools offering online master's degree programs.


The VCSU master of education (M.Ed.) program offers six concentrations: elementary education, English education, library and information technologies, teaching English language learners, teaching and technology, and technology education. The university also offers a master of arts in teaching (M.A.T.) program, designed to help individuals with degrees in non-teaching fields earn teaching licenses.

Online bachelor's programs at VCSU include business education, business process integration management, career and technical education, communication, elementary education, English, English education, history, history education, management, music, social science, social science education, and technology education.

Winter Sports Recaps

Women's Basketball finishes 5th in NSAA

The Valley City State women's basketball team concluded the 2020-21 season with an 8-13 record overall and 6-8 conference record. The Vikings finished in fifth place in the NSAA standings and faced fourth-ranked Mayville State in the quarterfinals of the NSAA Tournament. Valley City State lost 56-53 in a solid team effort and set a new school record with 12 blocked shots in the game.

Senior Macey Kvilvang was awarded NSAA Defensive Player of the Year and Honorable Mention All-Conference after posting 12.5 points per game, 8.5 rebounds per game, and 2.7 blocks per game in just 13 games played. She set a new school record with seven blocked shots against Mayville State in the first round of the NSAA Tournament.

Senior Maara Nelson was named Second Team All-Conference after leading the Vikings in scoring with 12.8 points per game, shooting 45.5 percent from the field and 76.2 percent from the free throw line. She recorded 36 assists, 22 steals, and 11 blocks this season. Nelson was also named an NSAA Champion of Character.

Sophomore Adriana Torres averaged 10.4 points and 5.5 rebounds per game, and junior Dani Schwanke averaged 10.1 points per game this season as other top scorers for the Vikings.

Viking Men Rise Towards The Top

The Valley City State University men's basketball program took another step forward this year. For the last four seasons, the Vikings have consistently been in the middle of the North Star Athletic Association standings. This season, the Vikings rose towards the top as they finished second in the NSAA regular season standings, received votes for several weeks in the NAIA Top 25 Poll and finished the season with a 19-7 overall record and a 9-5 mark in conference play.

Although VCSU's season ended in the semifinals of the NSAA Conference Tournament, the Vikings put on a display of passion, intensity and entertaining basketball to record the program's first winning record since 2015-16.

This was the program's fifth season under head coach Ryan Montgomery, who was hired shortly before the 2016-17 season. With a shift in coaching staff, new players and a new overall program atmosphere, the Vikings have gone through the steps to rebuild the program. Despite some frustrations over the year, Montgomery maintained belief and trust in their vision for the program.

"We never strayed in believing what our staff believed when we got here," he said. "We wanted

to run a student-first, talented basketball program. Things had to be changed and certain stigmas needed to be eliminated. Those tough times were the cost of change and there was no way around that. We are not all the way there yet. We need to take the last step, but we are on the path."

Building a program takes time, and sometimes the success is not immediate. With their current roster and culture, the Vikings believed this was the year that things would take off. They were right.

After losing the season opener on the road, the Vikings won nine straight games to inject themselves into the national conversations – receiving votes in the NAIA Top 25 Coaches' Poll. That stretch included wins over nationally-ranked teams Dakota Wesleyan University and University of Jamestown.

This year's squad had a wide range of talent and personality, but all of the players worked together to create a strong team. The Vikings were deep and fun to watch, employing an up-tempo style that went 11-12 players deep each game and created havoc for opposing teams with a high-pressure, full-court defense.

There was not one specific shining star on the team – everyone had their own talents and knew how to use them effectively on the court. Five players averaged nine or more points per game, and often it was a different player stepping up in a big role each night.

"We're a good basketball team," said Montgomery. "We have the talent needed to win at a high level, and we have the experience. We play intense and fast. We create mayhem all game and we pride ourselves in that."

The Vikings averaged 83 points per game and shot 49 percent from the field and 38 percent on 3-pointers. VCSU's pressure defense averaged 10 steals and forced opponents into 18 turnovers per game while the Vikings committed just 11.5 turnovers.

VCSU's Chris Thompson was named NSAA Defensive Player of the Year. Kevin Schramm earned 1st Team All-Conference; Jalen Addison earned 2nd Team All-Conference; and Connor Entzi received All-Conference Honorable Mention.

Off the court, the Vikings put together a team GPA above 3.0 during the fall semester proving their dedication to both basketball and their education. With only one senior on this year's roster, fans can expect to see a very similar team – and hopefully even more success – next season.









Indoor Track & Field

Zachary Co earned All-American honors for the second straight season, and the VCSU track and field team broke seven school records during the 2021 indoor season.

Co, a senior from El Paso, Texas, placed fourth in shot put at the NAIA National Championships in early March. He unleashed a career-best throw of 17.13 meters (56', 2.5") at the national meet. The fourth-place finish was his second straight All-American performance after he placed sixth in 2020

Senior high jumper Alex Otto also qualified for the NAIA National

Meet and tied for 11th in the nation. Otto qualified for nationals with a jump of 2.03 meters (6'8") during the season, and later won the NSAA Conference Championship.

The Vikings finished the NSAA conference meet with three individual titles, including Otto, Co and senior Allyssa Weitkum, who won the women's 3,000 meters with a time of 11:23.55.

Both the VCSU men and women took fourth place in the NSAA team competition. The Vikings finished with 12 All-Conference performances, including three champions, five second-place finishers and four third-place finishers.

The women's 4x200 meter relay team broke a 19-year-old school record during the season, recording a time of 1:51.29. VCSU's record-breaking relay team included Taylor Sargent, Keolani Sayles, Ashanti Guertin and Brooke Malsom.

Other records set during the season included Taylor Sargent in the women's 60 meter hurdles (9.37 seconds) and pentathlon (2,476 points); Brooke Malsom in the women's 60 meters (8.08 seconds) and the 300 meters (43.68 seconds); Brooke Tibke in women's pole vault (2.75 meters); and Clay Kummer in the men's 55 meter hurdles (8.41 seconds).



2020 Viking Athletic Hall of Fame inductees announced

Valley City State University has announced that six individuals and two teams are being inducted in the Viking Athletic Hall of Fame this year. The induction ceremony will take place Friday, Oct. 1, during Homecoming. There was no Hall of Fame Class in 2020 due to the ceremony being canceled because of COVID-19. Many of this year's inductees had previously been announced as inductees for 2020.

Individuals receiving the honor in 2021 include Jeff Pederson '83, Teri (Loe) Cresap '86, Kyle Bauer '93, Matt Johnson '94, Mike Tenuto '76 and Tom Klapp '05. Teams being inducted to the Hall of Fame this year include the 1990 and 1991 men's golf teams.

JEFF PEDERSON '83

Grafton, N.D. Football • 1979-82

A native of Grafton, N.D., Pederson excelled as a kicker and punter for the Valley City State football team from 1979-82. He made 25 field goals and 72 extra points during his Viking career. Pederson's best individual year came during VCSU's conference title season in 1980, when he made 21 extra points and the current school record of 11 field goals. He helped the Vikings win conference titles in both 1980 and 1982. Pederson set a school record with 25 career field goals – a

record which stood for more than 30 years before being broken in 2014. Pederson also holds the record for longest field goal, making a 62-yarder in 1981 against Moorhead State.



TERI (LOE) CRESAP '86

McVille, N.D.

Softball, Women's Basketball • 1983-86

Cresap was a two-sport standout for the Vikings in the 1980s, starring on the softball diamond as a smooth all-around shortstop and on the basketball court as a steady guard. A native of McVille, N.D., she earned four all-conference honors in her Viking career, picking up the recognition in 1983, 1985 and 1986 in softball and during the 1984-85 season in basketball. Cresap helped the Viking softball team capture conference championships in 1983, 1984 and 1986.



KYLE BAUER '93


Valley City, N.D. Golf • 1989-92

A two-time all-conference honoree, Bauer helped the VCSU men's golf team to back-to-back conference championships during his career. A native of Valley City, Bauer was named all-conference in both 1990 and 1991, helping the Vikings win conference championships both seasons. As a junior in 1991, he finished second at the conference meet with a 5-over par score of 149. Bauer was also named NAIA Academic All-American as a senior in 1992.



MATT JOHNSON '94 Valley City, N.D. Golf • 1991-93

A Valley City native, Johnson was a three-time all-district and all-conference golfer for the Vikings from 1991-93. As a freshman in 1991, Johnson won the individual conference championship, shooting a 3-over par score of 147. His individual title helped the Vikings to their second straight team conference championship. As a sophomore and junior, Johnson earned both all-conference and all-district honors. He was also named NAIA Academic All-American as a junior. VCSU's golf program was discontinued before his senior season.



MIKE TENUTO '76 Philadelphia, Pa. Football • 1972-75

Mike Tenuto was a three-time All-Conference player for the Valley City State football team in the 1970's. Tenuto excelled in disrupting the opposing team's offense as a defensive tackle. He was named All-Conference in 1973, 1974 and 1975, and was named the team's Most Improved Player during the conference championship season of 1972. He received Honorable Mention All-District in 1974 and was named the team's Top Defensive Player. In 1975, Tenuto received All-District and Honorable Mention All-American as a senior.



TOM KLAPP '05Elkford, British Columbia Baseball • 2001-04

Tom Klapp was a three-time All-American for the Viking baseball team in the 2000's, excelling as a pitcher and infielder. Klapp finished his Viking career with a 23-9 record on the mound, posting a 3.69 career ERA with 200 strikeouts in 227 innings. He had 20 complete games and pitched eight shutouts. As a batter, Klapp hit .315 for his career with 13 home runs, 22 doubles and 77 RBIs in 122 games. During his junior season in 2003 Klapp had team-highs of eight home runs and 40 RBIs while also

posting a 9-2 record as a pitcher. As a senior, Klapp recorded a career-best 2.57 ERA with six complete games and three saves. At the plate, Klapp hit .349 as a senior with nine doubles, four home runs and 27 RBIs. Klapp was named All-American in 2002, 2003 and 2004, and was named the conference's Most Valuable Graduating Senior in 2004. He was also an NAIA Scholar-Athlete during his junior and senior seasons.

1990 & 1991 MEN'S GOLF TEAMS

The 1990 and 1991 men's golf teams won back-to-back conference championships in the North Dakota College Athletic Conference. The 1990 team edged Minot State University to win the NDCAC meet, and won individual medalist honors at four of the season's six meets. Mike Ford won three straight medalist honors to open the season, and Kevin Gietz won the fourth tournament for Valley City. Gietz and Kyle Bauer both earned all-conference honors at the NDCAC meet. Team members included Bauer, Ford, Gietz, Jim Dew, Jared Manley, Todd Pederson, Kirk Baeth and Greg Paiement. Monte Johnson was head coach.

VCSU freshman Matt Johnson won the individual conference title, shooting a 3-over par 147, while junior Kyle Bauer finished second with a 149. The Vikings finished third at the NAIA District 12 Meet. Johnson, Bauer and Kevin Gietz were named all-conference, and Johnson earned all-district honors. Team members included Bauer, Gietz, Johnson, Kirk Baeth and Todd Pederson. Head coach was Darrell Anderson.

Viking Athletics Quick Hits

The 2020-21 collegiate athletic seasons have varied wildly over the country, with many schools delaying sports or electing to cancel seasons entirely. Valley City State University has played a fairly normal season, with some adjustments. Let's catch up with how things have gone so far for the Vikings.

Football

The Valley City State football team was able to play seven games during the fall, posting a 5-2 record. All games were against conference opponents. The Vikings had two scheduled games canceled due to COVID quarantines. VCSU did not qualify for the NAIA playoffs – which are being played in the spring this season – but will convene for a couple weeks of spring practice.



Cross Country

The Vikings cross country teams were able to compete at four meets this season. Junior Angeline Gannon earned All-Conference honors with her seventh-place finish at the NSAA Conference Championships. Both of VCSU's teams placed fifth at the

conference meet.

Volleyball

The Viking volleyball season was split between the fall and spring this year. VCSU posted a 4-9 overall record and a 3-3 mark in conference play during the fall. Through March 18, the Vikings are now 4-16 overall. The season will wrap up with the NSAA Tournament in early April.

Men's Basketball

The men's basketball team put together a very strong season, winning nine games in a row early on and finishing with a 19-7 overall record. The Vikings tied for second in the conference standings with a 9-5 record. VCSU's season ended in the semifinals of the NSAA Conference Tournament.

Women's Basketball

The start of VCSU's women's basketball season began about three weeks later than planned due to COVID quarantines. At the end of the season, the Vikings were still able to play 21 games. VCSU had an 8-13 overall record and was fifth in the NSAA standings with a 6-8 conference record.

Track & Field

Viking track and field was able to compete at five small meets during the indoor season. Due to COVID, most meets were limited to just a few teams. Zachary Co (shot put) and Alex Otto (high jump) qualified for the national meet, and Co earned All-American honors after placing fourth in the nation. Co, Otto and Allyssa Weitkum (women's

3000 meters) all won individual conference titles. The outdoor season is scheduled to start in late March.

Golf

The Viking golf teams played at six small meets during the fall season. The Vikings are set to resume their season in early April. The NSAA Conference Championships will be held April 26-27.


Softball

Hubert Thoreson '50 went on to receive his Masters from UND in 1955 and also his doctorate from UND in 1972. He retired in 1990.



In 2014, she became involved with a summer reading program in the inner city Cleveland. She went back every summer and worked tirelessly until nearly the end of her life trying to help instill that love of reading in even more kids.

Loree was very creative and took great joy in fabric and paper crafting. In her final years, she knit something special for each grandchild, praying for them with each stitch. Another passion of hers was hospitality. A holiday never went by without our family table being opened to someone with nowhere else to go. She was constantly making cookies for college students, taking meals and paper products

to someone recently out of the hospital or bereaved, or in other ways taking care of people and inviting them to share her life.

Her very most favorite thing was spending time with her grandchildren. Whether it be at her house or theirs, she loved being with all of them and reading to the younger ones.

Eileen, originally from Lakewood, Ohio, graduated from Lakewood High School where she received the Selzer Award for Biology. She earned a B.S. and A.M. from the University of Michigan in Science Education and a Ph.D. from Washington State University. Eileen credits her tenure as a University of Michigan Museum of Natural History student docent for directing her life

course, which included working as either a planetarium director or a teacher of Earth Science classes in cities across the country.


Sidney "Sid" Bingaman
