

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Season of Blizzards and Budgets

The winter weather has not loosened its grip as of late! Despite the continued longevity and persistence of this weather,



the business and work of the institution continue.

I have made the trip to the State Capitol in Bismarck for the 68th Legislative Assembly a few times this year to present our achievements and budget request to the Education and Environment Divisions of the House and Senate Appropriations Committees.

Our budget request is included in House Bill 1003. A significant part of that bill received approval from the House on a 78-16 vote, including our \$11.5 million in state funds to renovate McCarthy Hall, and a system-wide initiative (\$236 thousand) supporting student behavioral health needs.

This one-time funding will transform McCarthy Hall into the home for our nationally-recognized School of Education.

It is no secret that the VCSU education program leads the state

and nation in producing high-quality teachers. With a critical shortage of teachers across North Dakota, we believe we are uniquely positioned to continue meeting this important workforce need.

Did you know that 1,514 VCSU alumni are serving as teachers and administrators in 359 schools in 151 communities across North Dakota?

The request for McCarthy Hall funding will be combined with \$2 million in private support raised in our capital campaign. These efforts to update and modernize the facility will provide classroom, labs and learning spaces to support pedagogy and continue the training of the teaching workforce for the next generation of North Dakotans.

In addition to our one-time requests, HB1003 also includes the request from the North Dakota University System office.


Valley City State will see a slight increase in our funding due to the enrollment increases during the past two years. We support the system request aligning with the Governor's recommendation of a 6% and 4% raise for our faculty and staff for the next biennium.

Attracting qualified and outstanding employees is a challenge for employers in all sectors, but especially significant for higher education.

There is a positive correlation between a high quality and stable workforce providing excellent preparation and service for our students, and our ability to continue attracting outstanding students. Increased competition from surrounding states for students and workforce continues to be a factor in this success.

This success is also impacted by scholarship support. A significant part of keeping a VCSU education affordable and attainable is the outstanding scholarship support for our students. Last year we were fortunate to be able to provide nearly \$1.9 million in scholarship assistance for our students. This was made possible through the generous support of our alumni and friends who continue to support student scholarships in such a significant manner. Combined with the current capital campaign efforts, we are especially grateful to see our scholarship support continue in such a strong fashion.



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Valley City State University Ranked by U.S. News and World Report for Offering Best Online Programs



Top Regional School in North Dakota for online Bachelor's degrees and online Master's Education degree

Valley City State University (VCSU) has been ranked by U.S. News and World Report as having one of the best online Bachelor's programs and one of the best online Master's Education programs in the nation.

The U.S. News and World Report Best Online Programs report was released today.

Overall, VCSU had the second-highest score among all schools in North Dakota for online bachelor's degree programs. VCSU was also one of only two North Dakota universities ranked for having the best online Master's Education program.

"We are proud to offer a high-quality education in multiple formats at VCSU," President Alan LaFave said. "Our faculty and academic affairs team prioritize ensuring every student has an excellent experience, regardless of classroom location or delivery method." Faculty at VCSU have participated in multiple Quality Matters workshops to ensure online courses are of the highest quality possible.

"We are happy to see that external sources recognize the efforts we have made to provide a great education in person and online," Larry Brooks, Vice President for Academic Affairs, said. "We have a dynamic team of faculty that take the extra time and effort to ensure courses help students succeed in school and beyond."

The U.S. News and World Report utilizes multiple data points when compiling the rankings, including how well the program promotes participation and engagement. The utilization of services and technology also weigh heavily in the report. Faculty credentials and peer assessments are factored into the ranking.



Jacob Knapek: The Plant Guy

As a high school student in St. Cloud, Minn., Jacob Knapek '22 had no idea he'd spend his future days thinking about grass.

Not just any grass — specifically, native prairie grasses. Though Minnesota is the Midwest's most forested state, there's more to their terrain than trees. Prairie once covered one-third of Minnesota's 86,000 square miles. Today, less than 1% of that landscape remains.

When Knapek learned this during a high school Minnesota Ecology class, it changed the course of his future. A seed of interest in natural science sprouted in him that eventually lead to Valley City State University.

"That fact opened my eyes and made me think of how much we've changed the natural world," Knapek said. "I became passionate about native plants, and I learned about ecological restoration, which is the process of using native plants to restore the environment to what it once was."

Knapek graduated in December with a degree in Fisheries and Wildlife Science. Knapek's passion for native and prairie plant life has only grown stronger as he's seized opportunities at VCSU and beyond.

In his academic department at the Rhoades Science Center on campus, others unofficially refer to Jacob as "the plant guy." He welcomes the title.

"Everyone has to nerd out about something," Knapek said with a laugh. "For me, it's plants. I'm fascinated by how they operate, their ecosystems, their niches."

SUSTAINABLE LANDSCAPING

Knapek started his college journey in the fall of 2019, and knew how important gaining seasonal work and field experience were for his future. Possessing hands-on abilities and technical skills separated students from the crowd. Knapek found ways to gain both.

In the fall of 2020, Valley City was adding two more pollinator gardens to the orchard on 5th Avenue Northeast. Dr. Casey Williams, a professor in the Fisheries and Wildlife Department, had noticed Knapek's interest in plants and sustainable landscaping. Williams mentioned the

gardens project to him, and Knapek eagerly agreed to take it on.

"I got to choose the species to plant, design the layout, and make all of the purchasing decisions," Knapek said. The gardens have thrived. Knapek said kiosks will soon display information he's gathered, to educate orchard visitors about sustainable landscaping with native plants.

RESEARCH EXPERIENCE

In the spring of 2022, Knapek decided to continue studying and working with plants at a graduate level. He reached out to schools about their graduate programs. Dr. Kathryn Yurkonis, a professor of Biology at the University of North Dakota, answered his call and specifically expressed interest in Knapek's previous work.

Yurkonis and UND had been enlisted to help study the benefits of the federally funded Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), a national undertaking.

"If you can restore the soil a little bit, then farming is going to be better," Knapek said.

The project specifically measures soil health benefits of the CRP on a large scale.

"It is easy to envision a pristine speciesrich grassland after seeding a bare field, like a painter hopes for a masterpiece while looking at a blank canvas, but that vision is likely unattainable. This latest experience taught me that there is no 'perfect restoration' as I originally perceived, because there will always be an ongoing battle with invasive species and other environmental factors."

For Knapek, it's absolutely a battle worth fighting.

"Grasslands provide services like reducing soil erosion and improving the soil health. They provide a lot of wildlife habitat. They increase biodiversity. They help to purify water. They decrease flooding," Knapek explains.

Ultimately, Knapek hopes to do his part for the prairie — and all of plantkind.

"I just want to be able to make important, sustainable decisions in conservation, and manage our ecosystems and their plant aspects to make sure they survive for the future."



VCSU lauded by National Council on Teacher Quality

NCTQ highlights VCSU for equity and excellence for aspiring teachers of color; education majors hold a 95.5% pass rate for the Praxis II exam

Recent data released by the National Council on Teacher Quality (NCTQ) shows that Valley City State University (VCSU) continues to be a leader in preparing the next generation of teachers, including helping students of color achieve success.

The NCTQ lauded VCSU for helping students of color achieve success on licensure tests. A critical component to that success is VCSU's Student Academic Services and Resource Center which helps teacher candidates prepare for difficult content areas that appear on standardized tests.

Teacher Education candidates are required to complete and pass content and pedagogy examinations for graduation and teacher licensure, such as the Praxis II test. Since Praxis II testing requirements for licensure began in 2006, 95% of all VCSU education graduates have passed the content exams and 96% have passed the pedagogy exams.

As one of VCSU's flagship programs, education has long since been a powerful program that has adapted to incorporate changes in the educational landscape. These changes help students transition into successful teachers.

Professor Alan Olson explained, "Our curriculum and field experiences are designed to

prepare teacher candidates with the knowledge, skills, and dispositions to enter the profession and become effective teachers. VCSU has dedicated faculty and staff working with teacher candidates and we are fortunate to have excellent cooperating teachers in partnering schools."

VCSU has a long-standing goal of providing inclusive and diverse learning experiences for all students. The institution is moderately selective and exceeds the state's average first-attempt pass rate.

Using information and data gathered from faculty, first-year teachers, employers, cooperating teachers, teacher candidates and Praxis II data, VCSU works to improve the program and develop an effective curriculum.

Currently, VCSU has 1,514 education alumni in the field working across North Dakota in 359 different schools. Those relationships and networks help newly graduated teachers find a home in a classroom of their own.

"It's not only what we do in our program but also within our university," Dean of the School of Education Allen Burgad said. "The culture within our university has the greatest impact."

Alumni Anecdotes



Dr. Ryan Lorenz PT, DPT '07

Dr. Ryan Lorenz PT, DPT was prepared for grad school after receiving his health science degree from VCSU. Upon completing his Doctorate of Physical Therapy, Lorenz decided to head back to his hometown of Valley City where he now not only practices, but owns Mobility Plus Rehabilitation. Lorenz provides physical therapy to patients full time in addition to helping the Mobility Plus management team lead staff for their five locations in the region. During Lorenz's undergraduate time, he wanted to catch up on credits after taking a year off for military service and sought an exception to take 18-21 credits per semester. This heavy case load prepared Lorenz for the study habits required and intensity of graduate school. Lorenz's hardwork also enabled him to graduate from VCSU in three years.



Teaching more than music through Music Education

Pursuing a music degree requires artistic talent and skills in math, science, languages and artistic expression. Hear from alumni and future teachers how their musical education at VCSU prepared them for success in the classroom and beyond.

Tedi Dimmer remembers the day her life's trajectory changed. The clarinet player from West Fargo, N.D., was sitting in band when she had an epiphany.

"That day it hit me," Dimmer said. "I want to keep coming to band every day. I love this that much."

Dimmer set her course to pursue musical training and become a music educator. Now, as a junior at Valley City State University, she is taking courses in theory, mastering multiple instruments and preparing to join Vikings in the field making music in classrooms across the nation. We caught up with a few music educators to see how they think their time at VCSU prepared them for the classroom and why they think music is one of the most important areas of a well-rounded educational experience.

Skills for all ages

VCSU alumni John Monilaws, '87, taught music for 31 years. In that time he worked with groups on countless performances, and brought a group to perform in California for Disneyland's 50th anniversary parade.

Beyond the performances, Monilaws said music helped him teach many important life lessons

including how to dress professionally to starting a conversation with a stranger.

"We would perform at the veteran's home and each student had to go say hello to a resident," he explained. "It's not about going to the veteran's home, it wasn't about performing, but it's about learning to visit with an older generation. Those skills are still helping my students today."

This approach was something he learned at VCSU through Associate Professor of music Gloria Peterson. Monilaws, a trombone player, was also a tenor in the Valley Troubadours which was led by Peterson at that time.

"She was one of the best professors I ever had," Monilaws said. As a student, Monilaws was required to call an alumni every quarter and ask them questions for a questionnaire. The cross-generational approach to music education made it a valuable and memorable experience.

"There are many ways for music to open doors for communication," Monilaws said. "Music is something you can do together and build confidence and skills."

Now, Monilaws is retired from teaching, conducts The Valley Troubadours and works for a music company introducing instruments to young musicians and supporting music educators across the eastern part of North Dakota.



Although the role is different, the thrill is the same.

"When a student puts a horn up and gets their first sound, and their eyes get big, I don't know if it's the grandpa in me, but that's really special to me," he explained. "It builds self-esteem right away."

Learning how to learn

Like Monilaws, Brian Bubach, '97, studied music at VCSU. Although he didn't start as a music major, a professor



encouraged him to switch his major and join others in Foss hall. He quickly realized he had some important courses to master and skills to hone to catch up with other music majors who declared as freshmen.

"Pretty much everybody in the music department was better than I was and that has been a core tenant of my teaching philosophy," Bubach said. "I believe that everyone I came across teaching was better

at music than I was, but most didn't realize it yet."

Bubach graduated and taught music in Maddock, N.D., served as a school administrator and eventually joined the North Dakota High School Activities Association. As an associate director, Bubach leads official contests for music, debate, plays, speech and tennis.

While musical competitions do not get the same television coverage as athletic counterparts, they are still a huge part of many high school experiences.

"Overall, general participation numbers in schools is around the 10,000 mark," Bubach said. "There are 171 member schools participating in 32 regional and state music festivals in North Dakota alone. In those events, there are 244 secondary music education teachers bringing students to perform."

Students practice for months to master difficult pieces and techniques.

"When you take kids to music festivals, it is real-time learning in citizenship, communication and problem-solving," Bubach said. Students must work together to fix things, manage deadlines or find solutions, for example, if something critical was forgotten.

Bubach is committed to the idea that music education broadens individuals' overall ability to learn.

"We go to school to learn important things like reading and math, but I honestly believe the most important thing we go to school for is to learn how to learn," he said. "Music is a language. Good music instruction broadens your learning capacity. It increases your ability to learn how to learn."

Teaching skills and musical expression

Like Bubach, Eric Bergstedt, '05, wasn't sure what he wanted

to do with his career when he landed at Valley City State. Bergstedt had always participated in music and thought it might be the key for his success.

When he came to Valley City State he jumped into musical groups including concert choir, hand bells, band, university singers and participated in several musicals.

After graduation he landed a job in Enderlin and still teaches music there today.

"I came in as the program was moving in the right direction," he explained. As a program develops, so do the bright moments.

Bergstedt recalled a particular large group music contest with his students. "That day, they were all getting into the song we were singing. Thee kids were so excited about what they had done and the music they performed," he said.

"It's a group expression, which is so unique," he said. "Bringing that expression to the wider community through support of music education means a great deal."

That support helps a music program teach musical concepts, artistic expression and many other real-world skills like practicing, meeting deadlines, performing in public and working as a team.

Having conversations in the community and with administrators about the importance of music education can help sustain programs, Bergstedt said.

"So many decisions can impact music education. Scheduling, the school calendar and other little things can have a major impact on a music program," Bergstedt said. "Stakeholders and community members can have conversations with leaders about the value of music education.



Music is critical for an education and Bergstedt said it has to be a continuing focus for schools.

"Music is daily. Some of what we do is a daily job of reminding people in your school why what you do is important," he said.

A rigorous, ideal group project

Tedi Dimmer started her music studies at VCSU in Foss Hall like her predecessors.

Foss Hall was taken down as part of flood mitigation efforts after the new Center for the Arts opened in the spring of 2022. From the state-of-the-art performance hall, to specially designed practice rooms, the entire building is designed to help students study and perform music of the highest quality. Dimmer said the new facilities also allow for students to gather in a much brighter and comfortable way.

"I feel like our community has bonded even more in this new building," she said. "Band is such a community builder. The people I come to school with every day are my best friends. We sit and make music together every day for an hour or two. It's the most ideal group project you could think of because we all want to be here and contribute. We all want to do our best every day."

Dimmer was a high school and college student when the pandemic affected music programs everywhere. She recalls how hard it was to hear other members of the band when everyone was sitting six feet apart.

With that experience clearly in the review mirror, Dimmer said one of the best things about the new facility is the fact that there are always friends around.

"We enjoy each others company and at all times of the day I find people down in the lobby or upstairs to talk with," she said. "We really have a family feeling here."

Dimmer has been taking theory classes and mastering different musical instruments from strings to brass, woodwinds and percussion, and developing her skills as a teacher.

"You go to math and can learn formulas or English and build sentences but music teaches you how to meet people," she said. "You build a sense of community in large ensembles and you are all working for a common goal. Every moving part has to fit just right."

Incredible experiences

"There are so many opportunities in the Music Department at Valley City State," Director of Bands and Professor of Music Jerrold Heide said. "We have a 21st century approach that trains students if they are

interested in being a performer, audio production specialist or a music educator."



In addition to the curriculum, the physical space in the new Center for the Arts has enhanced the student experience, he said. The building was designed to help students develop their craft. The choir hall, performance hall and practice rooms make it easier than ever before for students to work closely with faculty in developing their musical skills.

Faculty, Heide said, are committed to helping

students become the best educators, performers and leaders possible.

"As director of bands, I get the opportunity to help build future music educators and develop their leadership capabilities, but also to teach them to inspire others through instrumental music," Heide said. "I get to watch students grow from freshmen to seniors and help them to develop as they start their own careers. It is an incredible experience."



Catching up with Student Teacher Rachel Baker

How has VCSU helped prepare you for being a music educator?

VCSU has prepared me to be a music educator by providing a variety of opportunities to gain teaching experience. Whether it's helping with sectionals in band and choir or conducting VCSU's Athletic Band or spending over 70 hours in the classroom working with students, I have been able to build confidence in my teaching and feel ready to start my teaching career.

What parts of student teaching have helped prepare you to have a music classroom of your own?

Student teaching has exposed me to a variety of teaching methods through observation, my own teaching, and conversations with my cooperating teachers. This has shown me that there isn't one right way to teach something. I have to be willing to try different techniques and be able to adapt based on feedback I get from my students. I have been encouraged throughout my student teaching experience to reflect on each day to try and improve and to think of different ways to instruct students.

Why is it important for communities to support a strong music program in their schools?

Strong school music programs teach much more than music to their students. Students learn leadership skills, such as communication and organization, gain confidence, and make connections with those around them. By supporting the school's music program, community members are supporting the development of these valuable skills that students will use no matter what career they choose.

Excitement, Progress – Moving Forward Together

VCSU is in the midst of our first ever Capital Campaign, Forward Together. The campaign has brought excitement to campus! Our priorities for the

campaign include a major addition to the W.E. Osmon Field House and a complete renovation of McCarthy Hall. These long overdue improvements will enhance these two important facilities.

The campaign will transform the McCarthy Hall facility into VCSU's School of Education and Graduate Studies. The need for this transformation is without question. McCarthy Hall was constructed in 1930. The proposed improvements will create the classrooms of today and tomorrow for our education students. These classrooms will feature interactive video labs, collaborative student study areas,

and the latest in instructional technology equipment.

Although W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse (The Bubble) continues to be a popular facility, we have outgrown the space due to the significant increase in the number of programs and athletes since it first opened in 1960. The proposed addition of an indoor turf practice facility will be a major attraction to our beautiful campus. Among the benefits to our student athletes will be additional locker rooms and increased practice space, so some of our athletes can spend their time practicing - not traveling to other facilities to practice. Approximately 90 out of 280 athletes do not have locker space in our current facilities. These improvements will benefit and retain current studentathletes, as well as make VCSU a competitive force in the NAIA conference.

As the Capital Campaign Director, I would characterize our campaign as one of excitement and steady progress. However, we have had our share of challenges. Soon after we kicked off the campaign, we were faced with the pandemic. Then came significant increases in construction and labor costs reaching 35%. Despite these challenges, we continue to move Forward Together! We have worked hard to revise the initial building designs and to do value engineering. A special effort has been made to control costs and to use construction materials that are available.

At the end of this campaign, we are confident that we will have facilities that will serve the students of Valley City State University for many years to come. We are building the future today!



Tom Sandhei, '64, and Tricia Velure, '95, share the inspiring story of Muriel, a quintessential Norwegian American farmgirl.

VCSU Alumni Tom Sandhei and Tricia Velure share many things in common. They grew up 20 minutes from each other, granted a few decades apart. They both graduated from VCSU and eventually settled in the Twin Cities area.

As parallel as their paths ran, they didn't come across each other until 2019.

"I wanted my grandchildren and their children to know about my mother," Sandhei explained. He started writing Muriel's story for a decade when family health issues took priority and the book was shelved.

After Sandhei, a former school administrator, lost his wife to Parkinson's disease, he was ready to pick the project back up, but wanted it to be a readable story.

Then a friend, also from North Dakota, told him about an article she read about Velure and her work to help families tell their stories. Sandhei made the call and he and Velure hit it off.

"Right away we got to work," Velure said. "He would share chapters with me and I would create a narrative around it." At first, the project was only intended for family members, but after putting together Muriel's story, the pair realized it may be of interest to a wider audience.

"It started as Tom's mom's biography, and ended as that," Velure explained, "but it is so much more. It's

the history of his family, a farm story, a story about the community and there was so much history happening all around them."

After the events of the book, Muriel went on to serve as the pastry chef at VCSU for more than 20 years. She retired in 1983 and passed away in 2004. But her story lives on in her children, her community, and now, in

printed paperback form.

"It became very emotional for me," Sandhei said. "Even now for me to go back and read the story, it's difficult because of events that occurred during my lifetime."

Velure said working on the

story with Sandhei was inspiring.

"What was especially inspiring is how Muriel responded to situations. She rose to the occasion in a way that was pretty remarkable," she said.

"His leadership promotes engagement, perseverance and advocacy for self and others," the release said.



Men's Basketball

The Valley City State men's basketball team advanced to the conference tournament semifinal round for the third straight season this year.

The Vikings finished the 2022-23 season with a 16-14 overall record and an 8-6 mark in conference play. VCSU earned the #4 seed for the North Star Athletic Association postseason tournament and opened it with an impressive 72-54 win over #5 Bellevue University. VCSU's season came to an end at the NSAA Final Four in Watertown, S.D., losing 102-82 to eventual conference champion Mayville State.

Senior guard Daevonte
Munson was named 1st
Team All-Conference after an
impressive season as one of
VCSU's go-to options. He led
the team in scoring at 14 points
per game and was even better
down the stretch, averaging 18
points and six rebounds per
game over the second half of
the conference season.

Sophomore guard Cayden Rickard was named Honorable Mention All-Conference after averaging 11 points, two assists and two steals per game. Senior guard Duoth Gach was named to the All-Defense Team – which recognized five players throughout the conference. Gach excelled at the top of VCSU's zone defense, which forced teams into almost 19 turnovers per game this season – best in the NSAA. Gach led the Vikings with 56 steals during the regular season and averaged 11.4 points per game.

Senior Hunter Sand was named VCSU's Champions of Character representative, a student-athlete who best represents the NAIA's five core values of integrity, respect, responsibility, sportsmanship, and servant leadership.

Sand, Munson and Gach are among eight seniors who will graduate the program this season. Other seniors include Edmon Paul Oyet, Tate Hebrink, Will Tinjum, Keaton Kvilvang and Matthew Schlottman.

Over the past three seasons, that group of seniors helped the Vikings to a 53-32 overall record (.624 win pct) and a 25-17 record in conference play.

The Vikings were exceptionally good at home during the 2022-23 season, going 11-3 overall in home games and 7-1 against conference opponents. •

Women's Basketball

The Valley City State women's basketball team concluded the 2022-23 season with two All-Conference selections and a .500 overall record. In head coach Vanessa Johnson's sixth season leading the Viking squad, VCSU went 14-14 on the season and finished with a 7-7 record in conference play. The Vikings earned a No. 5 seed in the postseason, falling to No. 4 Dickinson State in the NSAA Quarterfinals.

Ashlyn Diemert earned Second Team All-Conference after leading the Vikings in scoring this season, averaging 11.3 points per game overall and 14 points per game in conference play. The West Fargo, N.D. native provided the highlight of the season, scoring the game-winning basket at the buzzer as part of a career-best 23-point effort at Viterbo on Feb. 4.

Taryn Dieterle was named Honorable Mention All-Conference for the second straight season. Dieterle averaged 11.1 points per game while shooting 44 percent from the field for the Vikings. The Valley City native grabbed 6.3 rebounds per game and added 33 total assists this season. She scored a season-high 21 points in a nonconference victory over Presentation College on Nov. 19.

Emma Nielsen was named VCSU's Champion of Character, awarded to a student-athlete who best represents the NAIA's five core values of integrity, respect, responsibility, sportsmanship, and servant leadership.

The Vikings graduate five seniors with this year's team: Dieterle, Nielsen, Meredith Dumas, Allie Critchley and Bayli Heap. ◆


Valley City State University will induct five individuals and one team into the VCSU Athletics Hall of Fame during Homecoming weekend this fall.

2005 Football Team

The 2005 VCSU football team was Co-Conference Champion with Dickinson State, finishing with a 7-3 overall record and a 6-1 mark in the Dakota Athletic Conference. The Vikings recorded two shutouts and held opponents to just 14 points per game. VCSU's defense forced a school-record 38 turnovers (23 fumbles and 15 interceptions) as the team led the entire NAIA with a +2.1



turnover margin. The Vikings were 6th in the nation in points allowed (14/game) and 10th in yards allowed (284/game). Travis Lester (OL), Barrett Sczepanski (TE), Joe Maresh (DE) and B.J. Ingram (DE) were named 1st Team All-Conference. Earning 2nd Team All-Conference were: Rochenel Absolu (WR), Chad Lueck (QB), Bryce Kilmer (OL), Chauncey Calhoun (DB) and Jeremy Payne (LB). Maresh and Lester were named Honorable Mention All-American.

Joe Maresh '07

Glencoe, Minn. Football. 2002-06

Joe Maresh came to VCSU an

undersized defensive lineman and left as a two-time All-American, shredding offensive linemen with his speed and wreaking havoc in the offensive backfield. He tallied 20.5 sacks and 41 tackles for loss (TFL) over his final two dominant seasons. Maresh was named 1st Team All-Conference and Honorable Mention All-American as a junior in 2005, helping the Vikings to a conference title with 22 TFL and 9.5 sacks. As a senior in 2006, Maresh totaled 11 sacks and 19 TFL, earning 1st Team All-American and 1st Team All-Conference honors. For his career, Maresh finished with 148 tackles, 46.5 TFL and 23.5 sacks. Maresh holds the school records for both single-season TFL (22) and career TFL (46.5).



Travis Lester '07

Milbank, S.D. Football, 2002-05

Travis Lester made his mark as a

dominant offensive lineman on the Valley City State football team in the 2000s. A native of Milbank, S.D., Lester played for the Vikings from 2002-05, earning two All-Conference selections and one All-American honor. He was named 1st Team All-Conference as junior in 2004. During his senior season of 2005, Lester helped the Vikings to a conference championship and earned 1st Team All-Conference and Honorable Mention All-American.



Aaron Kramlich

Kulm, N.D. Football, 1983, 85-87

Aaron Kramlich excelled as an

elusive and efficient running back for the Vikings in the 1980s, taking full advantage of his touches. Kramlich averaged more than 7 yards per carry over his Viking career, ranking second in VCSU history. He scored 23 total touchdowns (8th in VCSU history) and ranks 6th all-time with 19 rushing TDs. His 1987 season was one for the record books as he averaged 103 all-purpose yards per game and scored 15 total touchdowns in nine games. Kramlich was named 1st Team All-Conference and earned the team's Top Offensive Player Award after his senior season in 1987. He finished his career with 1.205 rushing yards on just 168 carries (7.17 yds/carry).



Heidi (Larson) Backstrom '10

Grand Rapids, Minn.
Volleyball/Women's Basketball, 2005-10

Heidi (Larson) Backstrom was a dualsport athlete at VCSU, earning most

of her accolades as one of the best hitters in Viking volleyball history. A native of Grand Rapids, Minn., Heidi was the DAC Freshman of the Year in 2005 and went on to be named All-Conference each of her four seasons on the volleyball court – topping 400 kills in each of her final three seasons. As a senior, Heidi totaled 545 kills (4.78/set) and was named DAC Player of the Year, Northwest Region Player of the Year and 1st Team All-American. She holds the school career record for kills per set (4.09) and ranks second in school history with 1,698 total kills. Heidi was also a key role player for women's basketball and as a senior she averaged 6.3 points, 4.1 rebounds and 1 block per game.



Megan (Floerke) Jacob '10

Inver Grove Heights, Minn. Volleyball, 2005-08

Megan (Floerke) Jacob finished her Viking career as the school's all-time

assist leader, leaving her mark as one of the best setters in Viking volleyball history. A native of Inver Grove Heights, Minn., Megan has three of the Top 10 assist seasons by Viking setters. She is the only Viking setter to top 4,000 career assists, finishing with 4,217. Her 245 service aces also rank her second in Viking history. Megan earned All-Conference honors each of her four seasons, collecting two 2nd Team honors and two Honorable Mention honors. She was a 5-time conference setter of the week and twice earned the Region Setter of the Week award.

INDOOR TRACK AND FIELD





Jaiden Peraza and Taylor Sargent both qualified for the NAIA National Championship as the Viking Track & Field teams put together a largely successful indoor season this winter.

Peraza qualified for nationals in the men's high jump, where he placed 12th in the entire NAIA by clearing 2.01 meters at the national meet. Peraza had a top mark of 2.03 meters during the season.

Sargent qualified for the national meet in the women's 60-meter hurdles. She placed 29th out of 46 competitors at nationals with her prelim race time of 9.05 seconds. Sargent set a new school record with her best time of 9.02 seconds earlier in the season.

Viking athletes had five All-Conference performances at the NSAA Indoor Conference Championships on Feb. 19. Jaiden Peraza led the way on the men's side with a pair of All-Conference finishes. Peraza tied for second in the men's high jump, clearing 1.96 meters, and set a new personal record in the long jump (6.74 meters, 22-1.5) to place second as well.

Valley City State's women had three third-place finishes for their All-Conference honors. Taylor Sargent lowered her own school record in the 60-meter hurdles, placing third with a time of 9.02 seconds. Jasmine Barnes ran three races at the meet and had three Top 8 finishes in the distance events. Barnes earned All-Conference and took third in the 5000 meters with a personal-best time of 19:36.19.

In the shot put, Sadie Hansen placed third to earn All-Conference as well. She recorded a top mark of 11.91 meters (39 feet, 1 inches).

The top three individuals in each event earned All-Conference, and the top eight finishers scored team points. Valley City State's women totaled 47 team points as they finished in fourth place out of seven teams at the conference meet. The Viking men scored 31 points to finish seventh.

VCSU begins the outdoor season in late March. The NSAA Outdoor Conference Championships are scheduled for May 11-12 in Dickinson.
