

VCSU Goes GL[®]BAL

In a typical day, this VCSU student attends class, participates in campus activities, has meals at the cafeteria in the Student Center, and sleeps in the dorm. In just about every way, she is a normal college student.

She is also a native of Niamey, Niger - a city 6,000 miles (or 9,700 kilometers) away from VCSU.

Her name is Fakira Soumaila, and she is going into her Senior year at VCSU studying Health Science and Biology. Her family actually lives in Rome, Italy, where her father has a job with the United Nations and her mother works for the Nigerien embassy.

So how did a Nigerien living in Rome end up going to college in Valley City? While she was a high-school student in Rome (at a French school, of course), she early on decided that she wanted to study in the United States. According to Fakira, "I picked up a directory of colleges, and there was VCSU. I was impressed that it has a long record as one of the U.S.News Best Colleges."

Fakira's story is becoming less and less unusual. During Fall semester, 2009, VCSU actually had 36 foreign students, 20 of which were from Canada and the rest spanning 11 other countries including China, Colombia, Ghana, India, Japan, Mexico, Mongolia, Nigeria, Uganda and the United Kingdom.

The experience that VCSU provides for international students generally appears to be a positive one. Fakira said, "I am very happy with my decision to come to VCSU. I feel like I am part of the University, and not left behind." Luke Jones, from Basildon, Essex, England, graduated this spring with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Education. He said, "I originally came to play basketball and I always wanted to study in the States. It was a great experience and opportunity. My experience coming here was fantastic. I met so many good people and learned so much."

One source of students from other countries is a program run by the International Doorway for Education and Athletics (IDEA), an organization that provides placement for international students with academic or athletic potential into American higher education institutions.

But the goal of IDEA isn't to populate American universities with students from other countries; rather the goal has more to do with cross-cultural benefit for all students - both the foreign students and American.

This is true at VCSU, too. "Globalization works both ways," according to Glen Schmalz '76, Vice President of Student Affairs. "The main point of recruiting international students is to enhance the experience of our students. Our graduates are going into a world in which they will work with people from other countries. That makes it important that their education include an international experience, and bringing students from other countries to VCSU is one good way to do that."

Of course, another way to do that is to send our students to other countries, and VCSU also has various programs active in that regard, as well.

The program with the greatest longevity is the sister university agreement with the Universidad Autonoma de Baja California Sur (UABCS)

in La Paz, Mexico. This agreement, originally landed in 1994 by Kay Kringlie, professor emeritus of Spanish, has provided dozens of opportunities for student exchange over the years including a few that are in place now. Dina Petherbridge, the present instructor of Spanish at VCSU (and a native of Honduras), has inherited the relationship, and she plans to renew it when she and VCSU president Dr. Steve Shirley travel to La Paz this fall.

Tony Dutton '97, who is presently an instructor in VCSU's Department of Social Science, was one of the first students to travel to La Paz under the program in the Spring semester of 1995. "I received tremendous benefit from the program," said Dutton, "and it really got me interested in the impact an international program can have. My language skills improved tremendously, but as significant was just the fact that I was immersed in a foreign culture. This broadens the student's perspective on the world and our place in it, and provides insight into the way that other people live, think and experience the USA."

Mexico is only one of the Latin American destinations that attract VCSU students. Last year, Cassi Birchem and Sara Henderson spent the summer in Honduras where Henderson taught English and crafts at an orphanage and Birchem taught English to kindergartners (see article in the November, 2009 issue of The Bulletin). Petherbridge said, "As their teacher, I could see how the experience changed them." Among the upcoming trips for students: Senior Jane Petit is heading to Spain during the Fall Semester of 2011.

Nine Students, Three Faculty Head for China

This spring, a group of nine VCSU students spent three weeks studying abroad in China including stops in Shanghai (including a visit to the Shanghai World Expo), Hangzhou, and Beijing. The trip was arranged through VCSU's partnership with Zhejiang Economic & Trade Polytechnic (ZJETP) established by VCSU president, Dr. Steve Shirley. Students can use the trip to meet general education requirements in either intercultural communication or humanities. According to Dr. Shirley, "This is a once in a lifetime opportunity, and I am very pleased that these students are taking advantage of it." Faculty is getting in on the action, as well. Dr. Curt Hill, associate professor of Mathematics,

Excerpts from Student Travel Blogs:

Garrett:

"One thing the professor said that really stuck with me, and that I related to a lot was 'We travel to learn more about the world, and in turn, we learn more about ourselves.' I think that all of us in the room were very impressed by that statement, because it's very true." Mardee:

"Our first day at ZFU was very hot so we asked the group of students if we could jump in the lake. They replied, 'No, it is forbidden.' We asked what happens when you do something that is forbidden and to our amazement they replied, 'I don't know... nothing.' That is one of the major differences with our societies. If something is forbidden, or illegal, in our society and there are no repercussions for that action, people do not care and ignore the fact that it is forbidden."

VCSU students have also spent time studying in Europe. Stephanie Kosman '10 spent the entire 2010 Spring semester of her senior year studying at Skempa Business School in Sophia Antipolis, and is spending the summer working as an intern at the Cannes Film Festival. "This was the best decision I have ever made in my life, and I would honestly recommend it to anyone. It's an amazing opportunity to learn abroad and I feel myself growing as a person every day that I'm here!"

Athletics also gets into the international game. Softball coach Chad Slyter has made three trips overseas with some of his players through USA Athletes International, an organization that provides opportunities for athletic competition for 15 sports in 25 countries throughout the world. This year, he and two of his players are headed to Australia for the Blacktown Softball Invitational and a tour of Sydney and the Gold Coast. "Trips like this are an opportunity for our athletes to immerse themselves in other cultures while they make new friends from around the world," said Slyter.

Another way to provide students with an international experience is to bring faculty from other countries to campus, and by chance or by design, VCSU has a notable concentration of faculty members from overseas. Countries represented include the Netherlands (Dr. Hilde van Gijssel), Colombia (Dina Petherbridge), Poland (Dr. Jerzy Bilski), Japan (Dr. Taka Yamauchi), China (Dr. Shou-ching Chao) and others.

Faculty, too are heading for international destinations to broaden their experience. Petherbridge sees international travel as important

for professors as it is for students. "When professors travel, they see their own country from a different perspective. This changes you as an instructor, and so gets passed along to your students. This way, it changes the whole university." She recently delivered two presentations at the 6th National Conference of Teachers of English held in Tegucigalpa, Honduras, and is planning to add opportunities for faculty exchange to the sister university agreement with UABCS.

Rob Walsh. Communication Arts faculty. worked in South Korea from 2003-2008. He taught communication and English as a foreign language at two of South Korea's top universities, Korea Advanced Institute of Science and Technology (KAIST) - Information Technology Convergence Campus and Kyung Hee University. Last December, Dr. Sara Hagen, associate professor in VCSU's Department of Music, traveled to China as president-elect of the North Dakota Music Educators Association to join a group of over 50 music educators. The trip included several stops at Beijing and Shanghai schools for both concerts and demonstrations of music teaching methods, plus a number of cultural events. "It was a life-changing experience," said Hagen. ""I found that our teaching techniques were not so different from the Chinese music educators: it's careful skill-building and practice!"

Last winter, Dutton spent three weeks in Ulan Baatar, the capital of Mongolia. "Without international travel, it is difficult to understand how different cultures around the world really are. The international experience is very transforspent four weeks in May and June teaching three classes in computer science for ZJETP: Java, Data Structures in Java and C#. Afterwards, he visited Beijing, Shanghai, and Xian. Dr. Joan Aus, and Dr. Shou-ching Chao are also visiting ZJETP this summer, in their case to conduct an ESL (English as a Second Language) summer camp. All faculty members were able to take advantage of various attractions in China including The Great Wall and the World Exposition.◆

Much of this activity began as a result of a strategic initiative kicked-off by Dr. Shirley's 2008 State of the University address in which he outlined plans to both offer more opportunities for our students to study abroad and increase emphasis on attracting students from other countries. In the Fall of 2009, Dr. Shirley convened a group of faculty, staff and students to draft a strategic plan that would set a five-year schedule of goals for the University in several areas leading to 2015. The plan this group produced included an explicit goal of increasing opportunities for VCSU students to experience diverse and multicultural activities on-campus and abroad. Two of the ways that the plan named for achieving this goal, promoting international study abroad opportunities, and supporting Chinese cultural exchange activities, are already well-established. The third, updating the sister university agreements with schools in LaPaz and Oaxaca, is underway.

Though the strategic plan is relatively new, the emphasis on international study is already showing results. According to Dr. Shirley, "One tangible way you can gauge the impact this initiative has had is in the interest we saw from students for the study abroad opportunity in

China this summer. Having nine students from a campus our size seize the opportunity to travel to the other side of the world to broaden their education is phenomenal (see sidebar)."◆

1963 VCSU Grad Still Playing Baseball

Mark Langemo tried out for the Viking baseball team in the spring of 1960 as an 18 year-old freshman. Competing with excellent players such as Don Bauer '63, Duane Baumgartner '63, Larry Schwahn '63, Charley Zick '64, and others, Mark soon learned that he didn't have the skills to earn much playing time. When Viking Coach Dale Lemon offered him the job of being the team's student manager, he jumped at the chance.

That decision led to four seasons as the Viking's student manager from 1960 through 1963. Mark credits Coach Lemon with teaching him baseball, nurturing a love of the game, being a significant mentor, and becoming a lifelong friend. Mark did play for Dale who managed the Valley City Merchants amateur team during the summers of 1961 and 1962. He and Coach Lemon remain in touch today.

After graduating from VCSU in 1963, Mark taught business subjects and was the high school baseball and basketball coach at Hope, North Dakota for two years. He then headed to UND, earned his Masters degree in business education and business administration in 1966, and entered college teaching in Missouri. Two years later, Mark became a business professor for three years at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

Mark earned his Doctor of Education degree at UND in 1972. He was recruited to the UND faculty and was a Professor in the College of Business and Public Administration for 27 years from 1972 until retiring in 1999. His conducting over 600 information management seminars and his consulting led to work in 47 states and 9 countries. Dr. Mark Langemo, CRM, was the 1997 recipient of VCSU's Distinguished Alumni Award.

Mark and his wife Diane, a Grand Forks

native and retired UND Professor of Nursing, live in Grand Forks and have also been "snowbirds" since 2000-owning a townhome in Naples, Florida. They spend much of November and then January to mid-April in Florida each year. Mark had played some amateur baseball, caught fast-pitch softball, and played slow-pitch softball all of his years in Grand Forks while at UND. After moving seasonally to Florida in 2000, he started playing with a 50+ senior softball group in Naples.

A former catcher in the Pittsburgh Pirates organization who winters in Naples spotted Mark playing softball in 2004, and invited him to join a group of senior men

playing baseball each week. A team developed in Naples and was soon playing senior teams from nearby Ft. Myers. Deck Laracy's encouragement led Mark to join him in 2006 to play for the Red Sox in a week-long Legends of Baseball tournament in Cooperstown, New York (the "birthplace of baseball" and home of the National Baseball Hall of Fame).

Mainly a catcher, Mark has now caught for a week each August at Cooperstown the past four years. He caught seven of ten games in 2008 on a team that went 10-0 and won the Legends title. The play at Cooperstown led to an invitation to catch for the New England Red Sox Seniors in the 2006, 2007, 2008, and 2009 Roy Hobbs Worlds Series played each November in Ft. Myers, Florida.

Mark turned 68 years of age in December. This spring, Mark does most of the catching for Naples in the Arnie Owens Southwest Florida Senior Baseball (50+) League in Ft. Myers. Mark and his teammates and opponents-most of them gray-haired, smiley, fired-up grandfathers-play as determined as they were when they were 18! While arm strength, bat speed, and quickness on base paths are less, they all play with a contagious enthusiasm and fire that draws cheers from their grandmother wives, children and grandkids in the stands!

Mark says "I still think about Dale Lemon and VCSU Viking baseball every time I run out behind the plate! He is a great guy and a real coach who was a very positive influence in my life! Today, I'm thankful for each year the Lord-and my wife-allows me to keep playing a game I love." ◆

Starr Continues Planetarium Support

She retired from VCSU eight years ago and now lives in Spokane, Washington, but professor emeritus Eileen Starr continues to support VCSU with her energy, enthusiasm, and now, a new book!

Starr taught in the VCSU Science department from 1992 – 2002, and during that time, she became an important contributor to the early success of the VCSU Planetarium. She founded the "Friends of the Planetarium," a fund now managed by the VCSU Foundation that allows Planetarium programs to be offered to area students and the public free of charge. Starr also created the class in which students write and present scripts for the Planetarium shows that are delivered to groups visiting the Planetarium. That class continues to this day and is now taught by Planetarium director Wes Anderson '97.

Despite the miles and years, Starr is still showing her support for the Planetarium. Using grants received while at Eastern Washington University, Starr consolidated a group of Planetarium scripts she wrote into a series entitled *Humanities and the Stars*, and this series became the basis for her latest book, *Star Myths of Northern Cultures* (Grey Dog Press, 2010). The book describes the astronomical mythology of vari-



In 1993, she wrote two \$15,000 grants for the purchase of STARLAB 1, a portable planetarium made available to area schools through the Valley City Area Teacher Center and the Dickinson Teacher Center. According to Sandy Zahn, the director of the Valley City Teacher Center, the planetarium is popular among area schools, and is used five – ten times per year. Starr also returns to Valley City periodically to conduct workshops to teach area teachers how to "drive" the planetarium.

Starr believes that North Dakota offers tremendous opportunities for astronomy buffs. "The sky in North Dakota is brilliant – no smog, no light pollution – and this makes viewing opportunities that are hard to beat. Best of all, they are free!"◆

EPSCoR selects four VCSU students for GSRA Awards

Four VCSU students have been selected to receive Graduate Student Research Assistantship (GSRA) awards through the North Dakota Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (ND EPSCoR) program. The awards recognize the academic achievement of these students and provide significant financial support as they pursue M.S. and/or Ph.D. degrees in science, engineering, and mathematics at the University of North Dakota (UND) and North Dakota State University (NDSU).

David Givers, ND EPSCoR co-project director, said, "The GSRA awards are very competitive, and only the best students in the state receive them. To have received four awards out of only six given statewide, VCSU should be very proud of both its programs and its students in science, math, and CIS."

EPSCoR was established by the National Science Foundation and is now a family of competitive merit-based programs spanning seven federal research and development agencies: the National Science Foundation: the National Institutes of Health; the Departments of Defense, Energy, and Agriculture; the National Aeronautics and Space Administration; and the **Environmental Protection Agency.**

ND EPSCoR implemented the GSRA program to increase opportunities for graduating seniors from the North Dakota University System baccalaureate universities to obtain M.S. and/ or Ph.D. degrees at NDSU and UND. Each student's award provides an \$18,000 per year stipend for up to 24 months. Students who complete the program can be eligible for a ND **EPSCoR** Doctoral Dissertation Award.

The students receiving the awards:

Jacob Mertes '10 (Omaha, NE) will conduct research with Dr. Vasyl Tkach in the Department of Biology at UND.

Michael Tomlinson '10 (Rolla) will conduct research with Dr. Katherine Sukalski in the Department of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology at UND.

Ryan McCulloch '10 (Valley City) will conduct his research within the Department of Computer Science at NDSU.

Steven Fasching '10 (Mandan) will conduct his research within the Department of Natural Resource Management at NDSU.

Center for Aquatic Education & Research Receives Grant Funding

VCSU has been awarded a five year, \$732,000 grant by the North Dakota Department of Health to fund the operation of the Prairie Waters Education and Research Center (PWERC). The Center will serve as a statewide resource for water education, research and management.

Dr. Steve Shirley, president of VCSU, said, "One of the ways that the educational experience at VCSU is unique is the

opportunities for hands-on research and field experiences we offer to our students, and the Prairie Waters Education and Research Center is an outstanding example of this. In addition, the Center will serve as a valuable resource for area teachers and several state agencies to improve awareness and understanding of issues related to water resources in North Dakota."

The Center will be located in Kathryn and will have four main areas of focus: educational activities for students, teacher workshops, professional workshops, and research on aquatic biological resources.

It will be headed by Dr. Andre DeLorme '79, who has been on the faculty of VCSU since 1996. In addition to teaching classes in biology and zoology, Dr. DeLorme founded the VCSU Macroinvertebrate Lab which conducts research on aquatic geological resources and water quality in North Dakota and provides research opportunities for VCSU's undergradu-

The Center will be housed in the Kathryn School, which is located about 17 miles south of Valley City in the Sheyenne River Valley and within easy access to a variety of aquatic resources including the Sheyenne River, Clausen Springs, Little Yellowstone, and several large wetlands.

ate students. The lab currently serves as the identification resource for the aquatic macroinvertebrate biomonitoring program of the North Dakota Department of Health. Over the last ten years, the lab has generated over \$1 million in grants and contracts to VCSU. Dr. DeLorme will be joined at the facility by Louis Wieland '01, who has been the manager of VCSU's macroinvertebrate lab since July 2004, and Joelle (Hansen) Manlove '00 who was recently hired as the Center's education specialist.

The Center was initially approved by the State Board of Higher Education at its September, 2009 meeting. Though seed funding was provided by the State of North Dakota and the North Dakota Game and Fish Department, the grant from the ND Department of Health is the first major funding the Center has received to allow it to begin operations. The Center is expected to begin operations as soon as updates to the Kathryn School are complete.

VCSU Establishes the Great Plains STEM Education Center

The North Dakota State Board of Higher Education recently approved a request from VCSU to establish the Great Plains STEM Education Center on the VCSU campus. The Center will provide STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education and training opportunities for K-12 students and teachers as an essential step in the process of increasing the technology and engineering capacity of the U.S. workforce.

According to Dr. Steve Shirley, president of VCSU, the Center will help develop more K-12 teachers who can use STEM methodologies in their classrooms. "The State Board's approval for the Great Plains STEM Education Center is a clear sign that they recognize the critical issues that STEM education addresses and VCSU's important role in addressing them. We are very pleased to be taking yet another step in applying our leadership in teacher education to this subject of national importance."

"Congratulations to VCSU on this major accomplishment that will lay the foundation for more science, technology, engineering and

math education in North Dakota," said U.S. Senator Byron Dorgan (ND), who helped to secure \$1.13 million in federal funding for initiatives at the STEM

Center. "This is a long-term strategy to increase North Dakota's high-tech workforce to support the growing employment opportunities in the Red River Valley Research Corridor."

STEM education is an emerging set of interdisciplinary teaching methods and content in which students learn how to apply rigorous academic concepts in science, technology, engi-

neering and mathematics to real-world problems. Its goal is to increase student literacy in the STEM fields and ultimately increase the number and ability of students entering into STEM-related careers. Though interest in STEM may be traced back many years, the 2005 publication of Rising Above the Gathering Storm brought the field to national prominence by documenting the mounting concern that the U.S. educational system is not preparing the level of scientific and engineering talent required to allow the United States to compete in this technological era.

VCSU is a well-established leader in the field of STEM education. In 2000, VCSU launched its online degree program in Technology Education, aimed at providing technological literacy for all students based on content standards published by the International Technology and Engineering Educators Association (ITEEA) and endorsed by the National Academy of Engineering (NAE). In 2005, VCSU launched a concentration in Technology Education for its online Master of Education degree program. In 2008, VCSU signed a memorandum of understanding with the National Center for Technological Literacy of the Museum of Science Boston to bring quality standards-based engineering and technology education to K-12 schools throughout the United States. Since then, VCSU has delivered several workshops for K-12 teachers via funding from or partnerships with LEGO

Education, the U.S. Department of Education, and others.◆

Don Schaack Retiring

After 25 years with VCSU, Don Schaack retired in June. As the University's carpenter, he has had a direct hand in many of the physical changes to the buildings on campus, and can tell stories galore about the history of every nook and cranny on campus.

A native of Valley City, Don graduated from the University of North Dakota in 1965, spent some time in the Peace Corps, then enlisted in the Army where he was stationed mainly in Tehran and Maryland. He returned to Valley City in 1970 and started working in home carpentry and construction. Back then, he drove a white 1964 Porsche 356c, and famously once drove it down a sidewalk just to get the attention of a girl. He still owns the Porsche, which is now a classic nearly 50 years old, and that girl, Sharon Norgaard, became his wife only eight months after the sidewalk incident and has stayed that way for nearly 40 years.

Don came to VCSU in 1986. His first role was a custodian in Robertson Hall, but he knew all along that his real interest was in becoming the campus carpenter. "Every morning after I finished my work, I would run over to the shop, which then was run by O'Neil Oppegaard, and there was always work for me to do. After ten months, the carpenter job opened, and I was it!"

Evidence of Don's work can be seen just about everywhere on campus. One of the most visible is in the 2nd floor of McFarland; Don was on the committee that worked on its renovation to bring it back to its original look in the late 1980's. But even the details around campus have Don's imprint. "I think I've framed over 600 bulletin boards and whiteboards, some twice by now, and I've tried to make each one a little different."

He is particularly proud of the way he has kept the original character of the buildings. "My goal has always been to keep the integrity of these buildings."

Don's work has also been visible at VCSU's annual Scholarship Auction. Each year for the last several, Don has gathered scraps of old furniture lying around the carpentry shop and built them into new pieces of fine furniture. These were then auctioned off, generally raising hundreds of dollars each for scholarships. These items were so popular they became known as "Don Schaack Creations" and were sought after every year.

Other evidence of Don's work around campus is harder to see -- unless you were to look for it. Don signed many of his works with "Don Schaack" and the date. Though generally hidden, his signature is proof-positive of his involvement and a clear sign of the pride he takes in his work.

Though his work took him into every corner of campus, Don spent most of his time in the carpentry shop located in the building behind McFarland



Hall. Demonstrating his knowledge of campus history, Don said, "That building has its own history. It used to be the science building before Rhoades opened in 1973. On the third floor was Home Economics, the second floor was math and science, and the first floor was the chemistry classroom and lab." The carpentry shop is now part of the first floor.

Although over the years, Don has equipped the shop with an impressive array of tools, many of them are old, and have a history of their own. "The table saw is probably 90 years old; it was used when they built the power house. The band saw is just as old. They could be in an antique shop, but they both still work just fine."

In retirement, Don plans to keep busy. "My first project will be to build a shop at my house so I can keep on working with wood. I also plan to go to just about every VCSU football, volleyball and basketball game I can." Sharon will continue to work as a nurse at Mercy Hospital in Valley City for another year and a half, then when she retires, they might do a little traveling. They also plan to spend some time with their three children and four grandchildren.

Arthur Froemke Scholarship Fund

For many years, Valley City State University has offered a scholarship honoring long-time band director Arthur Froemke. The scholarship principal has diminished and no longer earns enough interest to offer continuing awards. The University seeks your support to reestablish this fund: donations of \$5,600 will establish a permanent trust in Art Froemke's name and provide an annual award to a deserving band member.

A native of Marion, North Dakota, Froemke received a Bachelor's degree in music from Concordia College in 1933 and a Master of Arts in 1935 from the MacPhail Center for Music. "Mr. Music," as Art Froemke was known, spent most of his years at VCSU as band director, although for a time he was also responsible for directing the choir and teaching music theory. He served as department chairperson from 1945-1961.

In addition to his VCSU duties, Froemke organized the Sons of America Legion Drum and Bugle Corps and directed the municipal band. When the University participated in a new program to give prospective naval officers the benefits of college education in areas most needed by the Navy, Professor Arthur Froemke directed the battalion band.

A special recognition day, Thirty Years of Music with Art Froemke, sponsored by former students and friends, was celebrated May 27, 1961, at the Valley City Auditorium. In 1964, the recital hall of VCSU's new music building was named the "A.L. Froemke Memorial Auditorium." President R.L. Lokken stated, "Mr. Froemke has established an outstanding reputation at the State College. His reputation as a band man has brought many students from the far corners of the state, as well as from out of state. Students in the music department placed a high value on their experience with Mr. Froemke." The Viking News printed this quote from a student on the occasion of Froemke's retirement: "Anyone who has been one of Art's students will agree that he is a truly great man. He inspired us by his example to become the very best teachers possible." ◆

Students selected for the festival will participate in numerous rehearsals and activities with the challenge of preparing a concert performance in $1\frac{1}{2}$ days. James D. Ployhar, an honored VCSU alumnus, was a prolific composer, arranger, and promoter of music education, with over 800 published compositions and arrangements. He has been the recipient of numerous national awards and was inducted into the VCSU Music Hall of Fame in 2006.


1978 Football Team

The 1978 football team still stands as the last undefeated football team at VCSU and will be inducted into the VCSU Athletics Hall of Fame as part of the Homecoming ceremonies. Under the direction of Head Coach Jim Dew, the team won 8, lost 0 and tied Northern State 7-7. This was before college football had a universal overtime procedure. The team finished 9th in the NAIA Final poll but was denied a spot in the national playoffs (1978 was the first year eight teams qualified for the playoffs up from four in 1977.)

The team started the year with a nonconference win over Bemidji State and opened NDCAC play with a win over Minot State. The next two weeks the Vikings had their lone blemish on a perfect season and their biggest win of the season. Playing at Northern State,

the Wolves had the choice of playing overtime but chose not to, so the game ended in a 7-7 tie.

The following week matched the Vikings with their long time rival with this battle coming on the grounds of the Jimmies. Jamestown came into the game 2-0 and 1-0 in the NDCAC, while the Vikings stood at 2-0-1 and 1-0. Jamestown was ranked 14th in the NAIA Division II poll and the Vikings ranked 13th. To add to the regular excitement, the Jimmies had selected VCSU as their Homecoming opponent. In a game for the ages, VCSU struck for two 4th guarter touchdowns with the last one coming with 3:17 to play and the clutch conversions by Tom Stevenson to defeat Jamestown 14-13. A missed Jamestown PAT wasn't the only kicking excitement, as on the final play of the game, Jamestown attempted a 49yard field goal that came up short.



From there on out, the Vikings blitzed through the NDCAC defeating Dickinson 20-12, Bismarck JC 28-7, Mayville 34-0, and Wahpeton Science 38-21 to win their third straight conference title. The final contest was a non-conference tilt versus Eastern Montana and the Vikings finished out the undefeated season 48-27.

The season ended with streaks that stretched over multiple seasons including 26 straight regular season games without a loss and 18 straight NDCAC wins.

All-Conference team members were Eric Jorgenson '80, Pete Hughes '81, Kyle Stricklin '80, Mike Puetz '79, Lyall Krueger '81, Nate McFadden, Tom Stevenson '79 and Dave Zinke '80. All-District selections were Jorgenson, Puetz and Hughes, Jorgenson was also named First Team NAIA Division II All-American.



Danielle (Olson) Perich is being inducted for her prowess as both a women's basketball player and as a track athlete. A native of Clifford, ND, she lettered four times each in women's basketball, women's indoor track and women's outdoor track. Taking on this challenge, she competed simultaneously in basketball and indoor track for three seasons.

In basketball, from 95-96 to 97-98 she was a three-time All NDCAC performer. As a senior, her cumulative achievements came as she was named not only All-Conference but NDCAC Most Valuable Player and Most Valuable Senior. In her senior year she was also named NAIA All-American.

As the seasons melded, she competed in Indoor Track her 2nd through 5th years on campus. She was a four-time All-American as a triple jumper. Her freshman campaign netted 4th place at the NAIA National Meet. As a sophomore she finished in 5th place with a jump of 37' 8 3/4". Her junior year saw a 4th place finish with 37' 8 1/2" and as a senior she was 6th with

38' 5 ¹/₂". She is the only four time All-American in VCSU women's indoor track history.

Moving outside, she competed during her 1st, 2nd, 4th and 5th years on campus. She excelled in the triple jump outside as well her freshman year with a 7th place finish with a jump of 37' 4" at the NAIA National Meet. As a sophomore, her NAIA National Meet achievement came when she again finished 7th with a school record jump of 38' 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Her junior year performance was her best yet winning the NDCAC with a jump of 39' 1" and then topping that with an NAIA National Meet jump of 39' 7 ¾", good for National Runner-up and breaking her school record. It was her first All-American honor as an outdoor performer. She also placed 7th in the Heptathlon at the National Meet. As a senior, she took on a new event placing 10th at the NAIA National Meet in the High Jump and again going for an All-American performance in the Triple Jump with a 6th place finish on her jump of 38' 11 3/4".

Her 7-time NAIA All-American honors will not likely be duplicated or exceeded.

1969-70 and 70-71 Men's Basketball Teams ►

In the age of Aquarius, the VCSU Men's Basketball teams reigned over the rest of the NDCAC. Led by scoring machine Cavin Andersen '72 both seasons, the teams won the conference and are being inducted as teams into the VCSU Athletics Hall of Fame.


The 1969-70 season marked the first time in 22 seasons that legendary coach Bill Osmon '42 was not leading the Vikings. One Hall of Famer followed another as Jerry Pederson '60 spent two seasons mentoring under Osmon before taking over for the 1969-70 season. He inherited a team playing with only one senior, Don Knauss '70. The Vikings topped the league standings with a 8-2 mark one game better than Minot State and were 17-6 overall. Big wins on the season included a 109-87 thumping of Jamestown College and being the only NDCAC team to top the University of Manitoba. The Vikes had a dramatic clinching of the conference championship with a 77-75 win over Dickinson State in which Cavin Andersen hit a jumper as time expired in front of the home crowd listed at 2,300. Andersen


set a single season scoring mark at the time with 614 points in the 23 contests. He also set a record for highest average in the NDCAC with 31.5 points per game and led the NAIA District 12 in scoring as well. David Lawson set a single game NAIA record with 27 rebounds against Mayville State.

Making the All-Conference First Team were Andersen and Lawson. Both were named to the District 12 team with Andersen making the First Team. In recognition of his outstanding season, Andersen was also named Honorable Mention NAIA All-American.

The 1970-71 team, building upon the experience of the previous season, again topped the NDCAC. This time they tied for the title with nemesis Minot State with 8-2 marks. The Vikings overall mark was 16-7. In his second season at the helm, Jerry Pederson kept alive his perfect streak of winning championships. When he was a player, the Vikings won the NDCAC Title all four years. With this season, he was two for two as a coach.

Going into the season the Vikings were tagged with Dickinson as pre-season favorites in the NDCAC and had an aggressive non-





conference schedule. Big wins came with a revenge thrashing of the Sioux Falls College who had defeated the team twice in the previous year including at the District Tournament.

The team may have had even greater fortunes, but during the later part of the season, Senior David Lawson, a presence in the post, was hospitalized for two weeks in Valley City prior to spending 27 days at St. Luke's Hospital. At the end of the season, Valley City held a community benefit All-Star game to assist with his medical expenses. The evening was called, "A Lift for Lawson" and raised over \$5,000.

For the season, Andersen again wrote stories that hoops historians still rave about. He set a school record of 705 points averaging 30.7 points per game and an NDCAC average of 33.4 ppg. He tallied 46 points (prior to 3-point line) as the only offensive threat in a clash against title sharer Minot. He was named First Team All-NDCAC and District 12 First Team. On a national scale, he was named Honorable Mention All-American for both the NAIA and the NCAA College Division. Del Ray Kessler '71 and Dave Lawson were named 2nd Team All-Conference and Kessler was named to the District 12 2nd Team.

Being inducted to the VCSU Hall of Fame as an individual is Jeff Manley. Manley, came to VCSU from Carrington and earned four letters in cross country and four letters in track over his career stretching from 1982 to 1987.

In cross country, he won the Spirit Award and Most Improved as a Freshman and worked his way to Most Valuable Runner by his junior year. As a Junior he earned All NDCAC Honors and All-District 12 honors. He qualified for the NAIA National Meet in Kenosha, WI, and finished 80th out of 343 runners. As a senior, Manley repeated his Most Valuable honors along with All NDCAC and All-District 12 honors. He won the NDCAC Cross Country meet held at the Valley City Town and Country Club and four of six regular season meets. He again qualified for the national meet.

In track, he continued his team domination. He was selected Most Valuable Performer for his final three years and served as captain his Junior and Senior seasons. He was named Academic All-American for his senior season in 1987 and competed in the NAIA National Meet in the 5,000 and 10,000. He finished 7th in the 5,000 and 9th in the 10,000. Manley was named the District 12 Track Athlete of the Year and won the 1,500 and 5,000 meter races. He also won the NDCAC 1,500 on his home track at Lokken Field in his final season.◆

Vince Olson Memorial Scholarship Fund Established to Commemorate a Remarkable Life



Viking Hall of Fame lineman. Alumni Association Board of Directors. Booster Club Board of Directors. Athletic Club, Century Club and V-500 President. Alumni Service Award. VCSU and Valley City legend Vince Olson passed away in May at the age of 81.

Vince attended Valley City High School where he was named the Most Valuable Player in football in 1947 and graduated in 1948. He went on to Valley City State where he was a four-year letterman in football and a Viking Pilot. He married his high school sweetheart Dorothy Mae Ratzlaff in 1951, and was then called to active duty in the Korean War where he earned several honors. After the war, he completed his education at Valley City State, taught at Eckelson High School and St. Catherine's High school, and coached the offensive line for the 1957-1958 Viking football team. 1955 when he earned his graduate degree and opened the Olson Funeral Home. Later, he went into partnership in the Peterson Olson Funeral Home until his retirement in 1984.

His service to the community was boundless and included serving as a member and leader of many organizations including the Jaycees, the Chamber of Commerce, the VFW, the American Legion, the DAV, the Masonic Lodge, the El Zagel Shrine, the Elks, the Eagles, the Rotary, and the North Dakota Funeral Directors Association. He was a member of the Barnes County Centennial Board and chairman of the Valley City Centennial Parade, and was on the long range planning committee and capital fund drive at the Sheyenne Care Center. He served on the Valley City School Board, the Vocational School Board, and the Valley City Park Board. In 1997, the Chamber of Commerce honored him with the Hi-Line Award in recognition of his outstanding community service.

A lifetime athlete, Vince was a member of the 1949 Viking Hall of Fame football team and the Valley City Bowling Hall of Fame. He was a proud supporter of Valley City High School and VCSU, and was a familiar sight on the sidelines as a member of the "chain gang" at football games for both schools. He spearheaded the renovation of the Valley City High School track and with Bob Beyer, the renovation and building of the Hanna Field athletic stands.

Vince proudly served the people of District 24 for three terms in the North Dakota House of Representatives. He served on the Agriculture and Education committees and was vice chairman of the Political Subdivision Committee. He was chairman of the House Memorial Committee all three terms which gave him the opportunity to bring Valley City's Troubadours to Bismarck. He received the Distinguished Service Award from the North Dakota Optometrist Association for his work in the legislature.

In his memory, the family has established the Vince Olson Memorial Scholarship to be awarded to a VCSU Viking lineman. Contributions may be sent to:
