A new journey begins

President Tisa Mason, Ed.D., CAE

As you many of you may know, my time in Valley City has come to a close as I return to Kansas to begin a new journey as the 10th president of Fort Hays State University. I would like to share with the greater Valley City State community some of the thoughts that I shared with campus in November.

"It is with a heavy heart I write this note to share with you that I have accepted the presidency of Fort Hays State University. This was an extremely difficult decision for me.

"The search process began in the summer. I was approached by the search firm, the past president, and many colleagues. I consistently and without hesitation turned everyone down as I have been very committed to and happy at VCSU. I began working with and supporting other candidates.

"Then, just a couple of weeks ago, I received a compelling call urging me to submit my credentials. Something felt different about this call. I searched my heart and I prayed. I began to believe that perhaps my journey was supposed to be different than my plans. I allowed my credentials to be considered, and today I was named the next president of Fort Hays State University."

That happened November 3, and I have since submitted my letter of resignation to the State Board of Higher Education and the Chancellor, effective December 15. In planning my departure, most important to me was being here for our graduates and community at Winter Commencement on December 14.

Based on the recommendation of the VCSU Cabinet and the nomination of NDUS Chancellor Mark Hagerott, Dr. Margaret Dahlberg, our vice president for academic affairs, was appointed VCSU interim president by the State Board of Higher Education at the board's Nov. 30 meeting.

Dr. Dahlberg is certainly well qualified for the interim position, having successfully fulfilled that same role following former President Shir-

ley's departure to Minot State University and before my arrival at VCSU.

On behalf of the State Board of Higher Education, the Chancellor will appoint a search committee per NDUS procedure. Faculty, staff, student, alumni, and community representatives will be appointed to the committee as outlined in the procedure.

My time at Valley City State University, and as a member of the North Dakota University System, has been among the best years of my professional life. I will miss my job and the incredible people with whom I have had the pleasure of working during these past three years. I will especially miss our students.

I am indebted to Valley City State University and my colleagues for the opportunities and experiences that shaped my leadership, the university, the community, the system, and the state. It has been an honor to serve with such dedicated, talented, and caring individuals.

I am deeply grateful for the support, encouragement, and professional growth I experienced from members of the State Board of

Higher Education, the Chancellor, the NDUS presidents and senior staff, and legislators.

Bill and I have especially enjoyed being residents and engaged members of this wonderful Valley City community. We will cherish our memories of this special place and the many people who have touched our hearts. Thank you.

I know the strength of Valley City State University and the tremendous support we receive from the local community. VCSU will continue to thrive. Thank for you for all you do for our students, faculty and staff. Never forget the impact you make in our lives and the collective impact we all make in this world.

Thank you for believing in me, for embracing Bill and I, and for working with us to build upon this strong and effective university. It has been a privilege to work and live with you, knowing every day is a great day to be a Viking!

There are several ways you can impact your tax billing if you act prior to December 31. The list below provides you with some ideas on how you can save on your 2017 tax liability:

- Make an IRA Charitable Rollover gift. By doing so, you will lower the income and taxes from your required minimum distribution this year.

PRESIDENT MASON LEAVES HER MARK

On December 15, 2017, three years after she began her service at Valley City State University, President Tisa Mason departed campus to assume the presidency of Fort Hays State University in Hays, Kan. Mason had come to Valley City from Fort Hays State, where she had previously served as vice president for student affairs.

Those three years went by quickly, but in her tenure at VCSU, Mason fostered a collegial, inclusive spirit that helped the university navigate through budget cuts stemming from the economic downturn in North Dakota, and her structured approach to strategic initiatives helped set the course for continued success in the future. In Mason's parlance, every day was a great day to be a Viking, and she brought her flair for personable interaction to all that she touched.

Mason's administrative style was characterized by the principle of shared governancemeeting regularly with campus and community leaders, delegating authority and relying on the expertise of her Cabinet and the counsel of faculty, staff and student senate leaders. She led enthusiastically, and she earned respect and admiration from students, employees and townspeople alike, while bringing credit to Valley City State University through her positive interactions with North Dakota University System administrators and North Dakota legislators.

President Mason fostered support and encouragement through recognition and celebration, and there was much to celebrate. She put her October 2015 inauguration ceremony to use as the capstone event of the university's 125th anniversary celebration, focusing not on herself but rather on VCSU's rich history, the positive energy of the present, and hopeful aspirations for the future.

Record enrollments, national recognition,

successful reaccreditation efforts, the achievement of strategic planning goals, and student academic accomplishments were celebrated.

A prime example from this September was Mason leading the pep band, students, faculty and staff as they snaked their way from Foss Hall through the hallways of Rhoades, McCarthy and Vangstad, and on to the Student Center in celebration of an all-time record enrollment, 20 years as a U.S. News and World Report "Best College" and three consecutive years as the "No. 1 Public Regional College in the Midwest" in the U.S. News rankings. Even faculty and staff birthdays were celebrated with goodie bags from the president, who embraced the role of head cheerleader on campus.

Fond of the phrase "warmed by a fire I did not build," Mason also recognized the efforts of her predecessors, celebrating the completion of initiatives begun before she arrived in Valley City

but completed or occurring on her watch. The ribbon was cut on a newly renovated Vangstad Auditorium in May 2016; the first phase of Valley City's flood protection to protect campus was completed in summer 2016; the 20th anniversary of the start of the laptop program was celebrated in September 2016; and the Gaukler Family Wellness Center opened in November 2016.

There were also plenty of new initiatives during the Mason era. The Master of Arts in Teaching program was added in fall 2016, and in its second year has already surpassed its three-year enrollment goals. A data-driven analysis produced methods to more effectively leverage student financial aid packages and enhance enrollment numbers, and strategic initiatives to capitalize on academic growth areas

and enhance retention and completion were begun. Pathways to three-year degree programs were identified and strengthened, and the implementation of free OER (Open Educational Resources) in place of textbooks in the last four semesters has saved VCSU students more than \$720,000.

Two K-12 Student Success Summits with area principals and superintendents were held to share innovative practices and data related to pre-college preparation and student success on campus. The town-gown relationship was strengthened with formal meetings between key community leaders and university personnel. An opening picnic for faculty, staff and families was added, as was the "Back to the City" orientation event to introduce new VCSU students to downtown Valley City. "Her spirit is infectious and that positive leadership enhanced loyalty to Valley City State University across campus. She always says she is VCSU's biggest cheerleader, and my response is that I'm her biggest cheerleader."

President Mason has also been a leader in the community, serving on the board of the Valley City–Barnes County Development Corporation, and as an active member of Kiwanis and Epworth United Methodist Church.

Tisa was just half of the Mason family that came to Valley City. Her husband, Bill, a bastion of domestic support for Tisa in her presidential role, was always willing to help out at Booster Board events and others as needed. He will be remembered in Valley City for his prolific performance in selling tickets to the annual Kiwanis pancake feed, along with his contributions to the baked treats Tisa frequently shared on campus.

The couple now return to Kansas with Tisa assuming the top spot at Fort Hays State. She has left her mark on Valley City State University and Valley City, and we thank her for service to the institution and the community.

VP Dahlberg to serve as VCSU interim president



Margaret Dahlberg, Ph.D., vice president for academic affairs at Valley City State University, has been appointed interim president of VCSU by the North Dakota State Board of Higher Education, effective Dec. 16, 2017. Dahlberg is returning

to a familiar role as interim president. She served in that same capacity from July– December 2014, between the departure of former president Steve Shirley to Minot State University and the arrival of Mason.

Formerly professor of English and chair of the communication arts department, Dahlberg was appointed interim vice president for academic affairs in April 2009. In January 2010, she was named vice president for academic affairs (VPAA). As VPAA, Dahlberg directs all facets of the VCSU academic program and has led the university's accreditation efforts. She has also taken the lead role in the VCSU strategic planning process.

Dahlberg holds three degrees in English: a doctorate and a master's degree, both from the University of North Dakota, along with a bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin–Platteville.

As a child, she attended the Model School of Valley City State Teachers College when her father, H.O. Pearce, served as school superintendent. The Pearce family moved to Platteville, Wis., during Dahlberg's childhood, but she returned to Valley City State as an English professor in 1996.

She and her husband, Paul Dahlberg, make their home in Valley City. The couple has three adult sons, who all attended VCSU.

Bryan J. Niewind received a Bachelor of Science in Human Services from Valley City State University in 2000 and continued his education by

graduating from The Traffic Institute, Northwestern University School of Police Staff and Command in 2008 and from the FBI National Academy in 2012.

Niewind is employed as a captain with the North Dakota Highway Patrol and is commander of the Southeast Region.

Awards and honors received by Niewind include the Distinguished Service Medal Award (2009), the Colonel's Award for Excellence (2014), North Dakota Peace Officers Association Life Saving Award and Outstanding Efforts in Public Safety Award. He is also a member of the 2012 Viking Hall of Fame.

During his Jan. 3, 2017, State of the State Address, Governor Doug Burgum recognized three citizens for their outstanding commitment to the safety and security of our state. Governor Burgum stated, "Captain Niewind currently serves as our Highway Patrol's Emergency Response Team Commander. In this role he's been working tirelessly to reach

Lemnus began his coaching career in 1962. Like Buck, he, too, touched


the lives of many. His impact on all of us will live forever.



Watne '09 leads North Dakota Farmers Union

Mark Watne took a nontraditional approach to earning his four-year degree in university studies from VCSU in 2009. A husband and father of three children, Watne held an associate's degree from NDSU and a full-time job at North Dakota Farmers Union in Jamestown. He recognized the value of a bachelor's degree and knew he wanted to earn one, but he wondered how that could happen while he continued to work and while he and his wife raised their family.

After looking at a variety of online options, Watne found a different route available at VCSU—the Prior Learning Assessment (PLA) program—that allowed him to apply his learning from life and work experience toward college credit.

With the help of Marcia Foss, now retired but then the VCSU Career Services director, Watne forged a plan that allowed him to relatively quickly complete his degree with the PLA cred-

its and additional coursework. Although a capable businessperson, Watne didn't necessarily find the role of a nontraditional student easy. "It was tough—even my P.E. credits were rigorous—but I had good support," says Watne.

"I'm very thankful to VCSU for that option," he adds. "I feel a connection to the university because I don't know where else I could have found that opportunity."

Since completing his degree, Watne has gone on to become president of North Dakota Farmers Union, and he and his wife, Michelle, an employee with the Jamestown public schools, have taken pride in seeing their children pursue their own educations and careers. Daughter Meghan is in the second year of her medical residency in Olympia, Wash., while elder son Eric works at Farm Credit Services in Jamestown, and younger son Nick is a senior at NDSU majoring in agricultural economics. The Watnes also very much enjoy their granddaughter, Adley.

To say farming is in Mark Watne's blood is not an exaggeration—he grew up on a fourthgeneration family farm, and his family still farms the original homestead quarter outside Velva, N.D. And when you listen to him speak about his work, the passion he has for family farms and ranches comes through loud and clear.

As president of North Dakota Farmers Union (NDFU), the largest general farm organization in North Dakota with more than 47,500 member families, Watne works hard to make sure that NDFU fulfills its mission of providing "a network of educational programs, services and events that benefit farmers, ranchers and rural communities."

> After high school, Watne attended North Dakota State University, earning an associate's degree in agricultural mechanization. He continued to farm while attending school on a slightly less than full-time basis; thanks to the quarter system employed then, he was able to study in Fargo during much of the year but return to his family's grain and oil seed farm for spring planting and summer work on the farm. In 1984, he began full-time farming with his father, Gene (who served four terms as a representative in the North Dakota Legislature), and his brother, Lynn.

> Watne understands the challenges of farming, and it was one of those challenges—a drought year—that led him to become active in farm organizations. In the mid-1980s, he was elected to the board of the McHenry County Farm Union and served on the state Farmers Union policy and action committee, where he discovered a group of like-minded thinkers who felt the same way he did about the primacy of farming and ranching. In 1990, at age 27, Watne was elected to the NDFU State Board of Directors. The proverbial new kid on the block, he served six years on the board, including a term as NDFU state treasurer.

> His Farmers Union work at the time involved making connections with suppliers and market

ing co-ops, lobbying and looking for valueadded projects to support the Farmers Union mission—ways to provide needed services that would add an additional income stream for the organization. Watne began doing contract work for the NDFU, using his connections to reach out to young farmers and ranchers, encouraging them to get involved and add to the collective power of an organization of producers with common interests and goals.

Watne and his family moved to Jamestown when he joined the NDFU staff in 1998, serving the organization as a development specialist and agricultural strategist. Watne continued his work developing co-ops in state, and he also worked at the national level, with representatives from other states, alongside the National Farmers Union in seeking federal support and legislation.

Much of his energy went into conceptualizing and bringing a key value-added project to frui-

> tion: the creation of a restaurant to serve diners foods that are "grown, raised and harvested on American family farms" to reinforce the importance of family farms and ranches in the U.S. culture and economy, in the American way of life.

Owned by NDFU and its members, the first Founding Farmers restaurant opened in the Washington, D.C., area in

2006. Since then, the operation has grown to a total of six restaurants in the greater D.C. area; the newest, in King of Prussia, Pa., opened just this fall on November 1, and a seventh, in Reston, Va., will be added in January 2018. The restaurants are popular with customers; collectively they serve more than 50,000 meals a week; reservations through the OpenTable service indicate that one of the restaurants has been the highest requested and reserved for six years running.

The success of the restaurants is a credit to the business savvy of Watne and the restaurant experts he brought in to help, but it's the concept—showcasing a complete food system from production to consumer while highlighting the value and values of family farming and ranching—that continues to excite and motivate him in his work at NDFU.

In 2012, Watne was named staff executive director, supervising more than 20 NDFU staff working out of the home office in Jamestown, and in November 2013, he was elected president of the organization. (The NDFU president is elected annually, and he will be up for election to his fifth term this December.)

Watne gives credits to former NDFU presidents Alan Bergman and Robert Carlson for their great commitment to family farmers and ranchers, and the mentorship and support they gave him in his career. Emphasizing the strength of the organization and effectively modeling servant leadership, his two predecessors have greatly impacted the way Watne views his role at NDFU.

In addition to serving as NDFU president, Watne also serves as president of Farmers Union Mutual Insurance Company and Farmers Union Service Association. He also serves on the boards of the National Farmers Union board, Farmers Union Enterprises, Midwest Regional Agency, First Community Credit Union and a host of other organizations.

Watne firmly believes that a strong rural America is—and will continue to be—vested in family farming and ranching. He takes great pride in the tremendous U.S. food production system, and having traveled overseas a number of times, he has seen firsthand the disparities between the bounty we enjoy stateside and the food situation in other countries. "Don't take that for granted," he says. "We can't let people forget how good we have it here with our grocery stores full, and full of choice."

The recent downturn in commodity prices has Watne concerned; he continues to advocate for the producers of raw crops, produce and livestock, wanting to make sure agriculture programs at the national and state levels benefit farmers and ranchers, too, and not just the "middlemen"—actually large multi-national corporations—that convert the raw products to food.

But Watne harbors a concern that goes beyond economics and politics in looking at current food systems and gets at the human issue at stake. "We need to address the challenges involved in feeding the world," he says. "Despite ever-increasing production and efficiencies, we're not connecting our tremendous production to the people. Over one billion of the world's population suffers from hunger, and we need to do a better job of distribution and prepare for new and ever-increasing demand."

As for the future of family farms and ranches, Watne is optimistic despite the challenges. "Young men and women want to farm, and as long as there's a profit margin, they'll keep coming back to farm. The demand for renewable fuels will continue to help in that regard." But in Watne's eyes, it's more than profit margin—it's that almost sacred commitment to family and the land that keeps farming and ranching so vital for the state and for the nation. That's why Watne does what he does in leading the North Dakota Farmers Union.

The Gauklers were recognized for their long history of philanthropy in Valley City and across North Dakota. Their personal giving to Valley City State University alone exceeds \$1 million. Additionally, they have contributed to the university from several business interests they have in the community. They have also supported the Abused Persons Outreach Center, daycare programs, Valley City Public Schools, and a host of other charitable causes in the local community.

The Gauklers have also established their own family foundation. The foundation supports areas causes, including support for the Valley City Public School System. In addition, George worked to put in place the Sheyenne Valley Community Foundation two years ago. The foundation works to support a host of entities in the greater Sheyenne Valley area.

George also led the charge to establish a community foundation in Williston, N.D., where he has a significant real estate investment. The foundation was established to respond to a host of community needs.

Most recently George and Audrey were major contributors to the new community wellness center in Valley City, which bears their name. Here again the Gauklers led the charge, working with the Valley City Park District, the City of Valley City and Valley City State University to make the Gaukler Family Wellness Health and Physical Education Center a reality. Following his honorable discharge, Dean has proven to be an active and positive member of society. He is a lifetime member of all veterans organizations and has held numerous offices and received a host of awards from these organizations.

Dean and his wife, Betty, are active members of United Congregational Church of Christ in Valley City, where Dean serves on the Board of Trustees.

Dean has also been recognized by a number of organizations and has served on a long list of committees. He served on the Mayor's Committee for the Employment of the Handicapped. He has served on the Governor's Committee for the Employment of the Handicapped and the North Dakota Private Sector Job Council. Dean was named the North Dakota Outstanding Vietnam Veteran, Valley City Outstanding Handicapped Citizen, and North Dakota Outstanding Handicapped Citizen. He served as chair to host the Vietnam Moving Wall in Valley City and received the President's Outstanding Community Achievement as a Vietnam Veteran, the This Old House Reader Remodel Moxie Award, the Valley City Education Association Friend of Education Award, the VCSU Alumni Service Award, and the VCSU V-500 Scholarship Program Volunteer of the Year Award.

Betty and Dean live in Valley City, as do their children, Matthew Pedersen (and wife Jen), and Sarah (Pedersen) Lerud '00 (and husband Mike and son Jack). Matt serves as vice chair of the VCSU Foundation Board of Directors.

VCSU sets enrollment records

Valley City State University has set enrollment records with a total headcount of 1,522 and an undergraduate headcount of 1,372, according to official numbers released by the university for Fall Term 2017.

The total enrollment figure of 1,522 surpasses the previous record of 1,452 set in Fall 2016, while the undergraduate mark of 1,372 exceeds the previous record of 1,369 from 1970.

"Our record enrollment is an indicator of the robust learning environment that students, faculty and staff have created together at VCSU," said President Tisa Mason.

"Part of our enrollment story is that our freshman retention rate—the percentage of students who return for their second year has increased each of the last five years," added President Mason. "The efforts we have focused on student success and support are making a difference."

VCSU also set enrollment records this past summer with 633 students registered for Summer Term 2017 in undergraduate and graduate programs. That figure surpassed the previous high of 613 students in 2014.

Full-time equivalent (FTE) summer enrollment also set an institutional record, with a 226 FTE figure.

The summer enrollment numbers were bolstered by record enrollment in VCSU's graduate programs, which established a summer record of 166 students and an FTE record of 62. The university offers two online master's programs: a Master of Education (M.Ed.) degree and a Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) degree.

According to James Boe, Ph.D., VCSU director for graduate studies, the online offerings are becoming increasingly popular. "Offering our graduate programs online allows our students to advance their educations in a manner that's convenient for them while maintaining academic rigor," said Boe. "Individuals who want to add a master's degree to their credentials are able to do that while continuing their day jobs, and the summer sessions are attractive to teachers who can pursue professional development more freely in the summer."

The Master of Arts in Teaching prepares those with non-teaching bachelor's degrees to become teachers.

The M.Ed. program is designed for practicing teachers and offers six different concentrations: Elementary Education, English Education, Library and Information Technologies, Teaching and Technology, Teaching English Language Learners and Technology Education.



VCSU garners No. 1 ranking among public regional colleges in Midwest

Valley City State University has garnered the No. 1 ranking among public regional colleges in the Midwest in the 2018 U.S. News and World Report Best College rankings.

VCSU tied the University of Minnesota Crookston for the top position in the 2018 rankings. VCSU was also the No. 1 ranked public regional college in the Midwest in the 2017, 2016, 2013 and 2012 rankings. The university ranked second in 2015, 2014, 2011 and 2010. VCSU has now been ranked a U.S. News "Best College" for 20

consecutive years.

"We're understandably proud of our No. 1 ranking," said VCSU President Tisa Mason. "We've been able to achieve and maintain the top spot over the last several years. Two decades as a 'Best College' is also important. That distinction reflects the quality—and the consistent effort it takes to deliver it—that we've sustained over time. That doesn't mean that we've rested on our laurels, however; we've continued to adapt, adjust and innovate to put the best practices in teaching and learning to work for our students' success."

U.S. News ranks colleges and universities according to their mission and, in some categories, by location. Schools are evaluated on a variety of criteria, including first-year retention rate, six-year graduation rates, educational spending per student, admissions selectivity, student-faculty ratio, class sizes, faculty resources, proportion of full-time faculty, alumni-giving rate and qualitative assessments by administrators at peer institutions.

The "Regional Colleges in the Midwest" category includes 80 ranked colleges and universities, including 13 public institutions, in 12 states: North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska and South Dakota.

Longtime coach DeVries named VCSU athletic director



Valley City State University women's basketball coach Jill DeVries has been named the school's next athletic director, President Tisa Mason announced Aug. 17.

DeVries, who was set to begin her 18th season coaching at VCSU, officially began her athletic director duties on Aug. 21. She is responsible for the development, administration, vision and leadership of the men's and women's athletic programs at VCSU. DeVries is the first female athletic director in school history. She has worked as an assistant athletic director since 2007.

"Jill's unquestioned dedication to VCSU and prior experi-

ence as assistant athletic director are great assets as she steps into her new role," said President Mason. "We're excited for the stability she will provide, but also the great ideas she has to advance our athletic department and our university. Throughout her 17 years on campus Jill has demonstrated a commitment to the total student-athlete experience and graduating high-quality students. Her teams have consistently achieved high levels of success on the court but have also been among the top academic women's basketball teams in the nation. Jill's insistence on student success and achieving the right balance between academics and athletics makes her the right fit for Viking athletics."

DeVries replaces Nate Stewart who left VCSU to join Centre College (Ky.) as the school's associate athletic director for advancement and external relations.

"I am excited and thankful for the opportunity to serve as the next director of athletics at VCSU," said DeVries. "I appreciate the confidence that President Mason and the VCSU administration have in me to take our program to the next level of success. I firmly believe in and am committed to the values of academic and athletic excellence. We have outstanding coaches and student-athletes at VCSU, and I'm proud to be a Viking."

A Glyndon, Minn., native, DeVries is a graduate of North Dakota State University, where she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education (1992) and a Master of Education (1997). While at NDSU, DeVries starred on the basketball court and helped lead the team to a national championship in 1991. She was inducted into the NDSU Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007.

DeVries began her coaching career at the University of Wisconsin– Green Bay and had stops at NDSU and the University of Nebraska– Kearney before she was hired as Valley City State University's head women's coach in 1999. DeVries is the only coach to lead the Viking women to the NAIA National Tournament, guiding them there four times in the past seven seasons. She is the all-time winningest coach in VCSU women's basketball history with a career record of 283-258.

DeVries and her wife, Holly, live in Valley City.

Valley City State University is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) and a conference member of the North Star Athletic Association. VCSU sponsors 14 intercollegiate sports, including basketball, baseball, football, volleyball, softball, track and field, cross country and golf.



Bass named NAIA Faculty Athletics Rep of Year

Dave Bass, assistant professor in the VCSU School of Education and Graduate Studies, has been named the 2017 National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Wally Schwartz Faculty Athletics Representative of the Year, the NAIA announced Sept. 15.

Bass has served as VCSU's FAR for more than 20 years, acting as a liaison between the athletic department and the institution as

well as handling eligibility and academic questions. Bass will be presented with the national award at the NAIA Convention next April in Kansas City.

"Dave is dedicated to the success of the student-athletes at VCSU and in the NSAA," said VCSU athletic director Jill DeVries. "He is without a doubt the 'go-to guy' for eligibility questions and compliance at Valley City State and many other NAIA institutions."

Bass is also the NSAA eligibility chair and the FAR liaison to the NSAA Board of Directors. He has served 10 years as the eligibility chair for three difference conferences. At the national level, Dave has served four years on the NAIA Council of FARs and five years on the Learning Disability Advisory Committee. Prior to taking over as VCSU's FAR, Bass coached Viking track and field and cross country from 1981-91.

At VCSU, Bass consistently goes above and beyond his official duties as FAR to help Viking coaches and student-athletes succeed.

"He is instrumental to our success during the recruiting process and one of the biggest supporters of all the programs and student-athletes at Valley City State," said DeVries. "We are proud that he is a Viking."

Bass was previously named the North Star Athletic Association FAR of the Year in 2015 and 2016. This is the first time he has received the national award.

L2L students pick squash for food bank

Two-hundred Valley City State University first-year students and their mentors harvested more than 50,000 pounds of produce on a farm northwest of Valley City on Thursday, Sept. 28, for distribution by the Great Plains Food Bank.

Mostly squash, the 25 tons of produce also included corn, tomatoes, peppers and onions. The VCSU students picked the produce as a community service project stemming from their Learning to Live, Living to Learn (L2L) course.

The squash and vegetables had been raised by Dan Faust, a retired Lutheran pastor in Valley City, on his family farm. Faust donates his harvest to the Great Plains Food Bank in Fargo, which then distributes the produce to more than 215 feeding programs run by community partners throughout North Dakota and Clay County, Minn.

VCSU's participation in the harvest dates back seven years. "It's something we can do to help," says Stephanie Roelfsema, director of VCSU's L2L course. "Some of our students have never been on a farm, much less participated in a service project. Picking the squash gives them an opportunity to make the connections in regard to where food comes from, their comparative bounty, and their ability to impact the lives of others in a positive way through their own sweat and labor. It's a win-win for our students, Pastor Dan and the Great Plains Food Bank, and those who ultimately benefit from this food."

Artists participate in print exchange

Nine VCSU art students, along with assistant professor Karri Dieken, put their printmaking skills to use and participated in a print exchange with other artists from regional colleges and universities.

Work from the exchange is featured in the exhibit "Printober" at the Plains Art Museum in Fargo. The exhibit opened Oct. 8 and runs through Jan. 7. Featured works represent the efforts of artists from VCSU, Concordia College, Minnesota State University Moorhead, Minot State University, North Dakota State University and the University of Manitoba.



We believe that creating connections between our learning in and around the classroom and our engagement in the process allows us to grow as leaders and difference makers at Valley City State University.

Our success, determined by more than wins and losses, is also determined by the experience of our student-athletes and often goes beyond the results on the field. We are committed to fostering an inclusive, positive and winning culture built on respect for oneself and others.

For the 15th year, VCSU has been named an NAIA Champions of Character Five Star institution for 2016-17. VCSU earned the honor at the "silver" level for 2016-17, improving upon its "bronze" level from previous years. Institutions are measured on a demonstrated commitment to the Champions of Character program and earn points in character training, conduct in competition, academic focus, character recognition and character promotion. Institutions also earn points based on exceptional student-athlete grade point averages and by having minimal to no ejections during competition throughout the course of the academic year.

On Nov. 18, 2017, Valley City State University was selected to receive the Special Olympics of North Dakota Outstanding School Award. VCSU athletics has cultivated a relationship with the North Dakota Special Olympians and Valley City Open Door Center. This fall our men's basketball team and our softball team have held clinics/fun nights for Special Olympians in our local area. In addition, Viking football has welcomed Matt Thorson to its staff as a manager the last two seasons. We encourage our outstanding student-athletes to be engaged, to educate, and to actively elevate the Viking family and community. As a former VCSU coach and competitor myself, I understand that success in athletics is most often measured by wins and losses. I'm excited to share with you some of the highlights of our seasons so far.

- In cross country, junior Grace Miller (St. Cloud, Fla.) qualified for the NAIA Championships and placed 113th out of 338 runners. Both Viking teams saw dramatic turnarounds after finishing sixth at the NSAA Championships in 2016. The 2017 season saw VCSU's men place second and the women place third.
- The Viking volleyball team posted the program's first winning record since 2006, finishing 15-13 overall. VCSU went 9-7 in conference play, taking fourth in the NSAA regular season standings.
- Our Viking football team defeated rival University of Jamestown twice this season by a combined score of 83-27. VCSU finished the season 5-5 overall and 4-4 in conference play, going 3-1 over the last four games.
- Viking baseball played an eight-game schedule in the fall and went 3-5 overall, which included two victories over rival Mayville State University and a walk-off home run by junior Nate Soulis.
- The Viking golf team won two meets this fall and Jared Lentz took first place individually at the Dickinson State Invite.
- The winter seasons have started and the upper-class laden women's basketball team, under the direction of first year head coach Vanessa Keeler-Johnson, is off to a 10-0 start. Lexi Lennon, senior from West Fargo, N.D., scored her 1,000th point during the home opener Oct. 28. The senior-heavy men's basketball team opened the season receiving votes in the NAIA Top 25 Poll and has faced a tough early-season schedule en route to a 4-9 record.


The Valley City State women's basketball team is off to a 10-0 start to the season, the program's best start since the 2005-06 season.


Senior guard Lexi Lennon scored her 1,000th career point during VCSU's season opener against College of Saint Mary.

Men's basketball features six seniors

Expectations are high this season for the Viking men's basketball team which features six seniors. Valley City State returned four starters and its top three scorers from last year's team that went 16-15 overall.

Second-year head coach Ryan Montgomery has tested his team early with an aggressive schedule that includes upper-division teams and nationallyranked NAIA teams. The Vikings were off to a 4-9 start, including a thrilling 85-82 win over Dordt College.

Valley City State was picked to finish second in the NSAA Preseason Coaches' Poll, trailing only last year's national runner-up Bellevue University.

The Valley City State University track and field program continues to grow under head coach Chris Johnson. In his third season leading the program, Johnson has expanded the team to about 70 participants this year, including more than 40 new additions to the roster.

The Vikings opened the indoor season early this year, competing at a Dec. 2 meet in Brookings, S.D. Valley City State is scheduled to compete at seven indoor meets this season, including the NSAA Indoor Championships on Feb. 17 in Brookings, S.D.

Fall Sport Recaps

Football

A young Valley City State University football team had its ups and downs during the 2017 season before finishing with a 5-5 overall record. The Vikings went 4-4 in the North Star Athletic Association, taking fourth place in the standings.

Despite finishing fourth in the standings, the Vikings feel they were just a few plays away from finishing at or near the top of the conference. Turnovers hurt the Vikings in two losses to eventual conference champion and nationallyranked Dickinson State University. VCSU's other two conference losses came when Waldorf University and Dakota State scored touchdowns in the final seconds of the game.

The Vikings began to click down the stretch, going 3-1 over their last four games. VCSU averaged 48 points per game in those contests, including a 58-0 win against Mayville State, a 66-27 win against Presentation College and a 40-14 win at rival University of Jamestown to close the season.

"I said this a lot this year, but we have a really talented group of guys," said McCulloch. "If we can keep this group together, they can do something special."

Valley City State University went 2-0 against rival University of Jamestown, outscoring the Jimmies 83-27 for the season and ensuring the Paint Bucket Trophy stays in Valley City for the offseason.



The Vikings will graduate nine seniors from this year's team, including seven starters. The list includes linebacker Nicholas McBeain, who leaves VCSU as the all-time leading tackler with 522 stops in his Viking career. It also includes

offensive linemen PJ Peterson and Avery Lock, both of whom won multiple All Conference awards during their career.

The Vikings were extremely young at the offensive "skill" positions, but showed huge talent and even more potential. Sophomore running back Louis Quinones averaged 104 yards per game, finishing the season with 13 touchdowns and a 5.7 yards per carry average.

Redshirt freshman Jalen Pfeifer won the starting quarterback job out of fall camp and impressed throughout the season with both his arm and legs. Pfeifer completed 59 percent of his passes with 19 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He averaged 217 yards passing per game.

The Vikings were also extremely young on defense starting just two seniors – McBeain and Jesus Munoz – while starting three freshmen and three sophomores for most of the year. Despite playing just five games due to injury,

nes due to injury, McBeain led the Vikings with 76 tackles. Sophomore Riley Fredrickson was second on the team with 75 tackles, while freshman Kendrick Lenzen was third with 62 stops. Sophomore defensive end Austin Erickson led the team in sacks (5.0) and

Despite posting a 5-5 record, the Vikings actually only played nine games. Finlandia University backed out of a scheduled contest and forfeited to the Vikings.

VCSU had 11 players honored

as All Conference. Sophomore running back Louis Quinones picked up two honors, being named First Team All Conference as both a running back and a kick returner. VCSU's other First Team Offense selections included lineman Avery Lock, tight end Tayler Lentz and receiver Jake Peterson. First Team Defense honors went to defensive end Darius Graves, linebacker Nicholas McBeain and defensive back Travon Smith.

Second Team All Conference honors went to offensive lineman PJ Peterson, defensive lineman Tyler Masat, linebacker Jesus Munuz and kicker Landon Arredondo.

The Vikings had seven players earn the Daktronics-NAIA Scholar-Athlete award, which recognized juniors or seniors who have a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or higher in their careers. Earning the award for VCSU were: Dakota Johnson, Cole Kelly, Tyler Masat, Jake Peterson, PJ Peterson, Tyler Ukestad and Marc Wagner.





Volleyball

The 2017 Valley City State University volleyball team posted the program's first winning record since 2006, finishing with a 15-13 overall mark.

The Vikings started the season 0-4, but went 15-9 over their final 24 matches to finish above .500 for the first time since going 16-15 in 2006. VCSU finished 9-7 in the North Star Athletic Association, taking fourth in the NSAA regular season standings. The Viking season came to an end in the quarterfinals of the NSAA Tournament.

Head coach Adam Longmore's squad went 6-3 on their home floor, creating an exciting volleyball atmosphere inside Graichen Gymnasium. The home schedule was highlighted by a sweep of Concordia-Moorhead that featured a standing-room-only crowd.

Junior middle Clarissa Olson, a Valley City native, was named 1st Team All Conference for the second straight season by the NSAA coaches. Olson led the Vikings in kills (237), hitting percentage (.324), blocks (59) and total points (289). She ranked third in the conference

in hitting percentage and was named the NSAA Attacker of the Week on Oct. 23. Olson was also named Honorable Mention All-American by the NAIA and All-Region by the American Volleyball Coaches Association.

Valley City State featured eight freshman on this year's team and will graduate just two seniors from the squad, albeit significant contributors. Senior Megan Johnson was second on the team with 209 kills and tied Olson with 59 blocks. Senior Polette Medina was an all-around player for VCSU – filling multiple roles throughout the season – as she racked up 107 kills, 35 aces and 247 digs.

Paige Benson from Hankinson, N.D., was one of several freshmen who made immediate impacts as she was third on the team with 172 kills.

Medina and Olson, along with juniors Autumn Johnson and Mikayla Mellem, were all recognized as Daktronics NAIA Scholar-Athletes for demonstrating success in the classroom.

Cross Country

The 2017 cross country season at Valley City State was highlighted by a complete turnaround for both the mens' and women's teams. After both teams took last place in the conference in 2016, a revamped and expanded roster led the Viking men to a second-place finish and the VCSU women to a thirdplace finish at the North Star Athletic Association Championships .

Viking junior Grace Miller qualified for the NAIA National Championships on Nov. 18 in Vancouver, Wash. She ran a time of 19:10 at nationals as she placed 113th out of 338 runners. Earlier in the season, Miller ran the fourthfastest time in VCSU history when she crossed the line in 19:02 during a race at Jamestown.

The majority of VCSU's runners wrapped their season at the NSAA Championships in Jamestown on Nov. 3. Conditions were far from ideal with teams facing falling snow, temps near 25 degrees and a wind of about 15 miles per hour. On the men's side, Valley City State's top five runners all finished in the Top 17 as they improved from last place in 2016 to second place in 2017.

Valley City State senior Dennis Gonzalez was the top Viking, taking 8th place and earning All Conference with a time of 25:45. Louis Leon ran a personal record of 26:31 as he placed 12th. Dylan Olson took 13th in 26:33. Orin Rambow (26:37) and Joe Celis (27:04) both ran season-best times and placed 16th and 17th, respectively.

For the Viking women, Miller ran a strong race as she placed third and earned All Conference. She anchored an overall strong performance by the VCSU women's team, which took third out of six teams. It was a huge oneyear improvement for the Vikings, who finished last in the conference last season. The Vikings had four female runners in the Top 20: Julianne Wilson finished 15th (20:42); Allyssa Weitkum placed 17th (20:46); and Kristina Fricke took 20th overall (21:03). Peyton Halverson rounded out VCSU's team score of 85 by placing 30th. Both Wilson and Fricke ran collegiate-best times at the conference meet.

VCSU's men had consistent team success throughout the season. Over the final three meets against a variety of NCAA and NAIA competition, the Vikings finished in third place, second place and second place. Junior Orin Rambow was named a Daktronics-NAIA Scholar-Athlete at the conclusion of the season, recognizing his consistent success in the classroom.
