Growing up I always knew I wanted to be a teacher. Our basement was transformed into a small classroom with chairs of stuffed animals who listened while I read aloud and had to be given spelling tests.

As I grew older and it became time to make a decision on where to attend college, it was never a question. My parents, grandparents, and other relatives had always attended Valley City State, and since I wanted to be a teacher, VCSU was the most

logical choice. Each family member shared with me their fond memories of when they attended, and it is through these stories that I realized just how "my VCSU" has changed over the years.

VCSU has always been known as a teacher's college. When it first opened in 1890, it only had 22 students and was meeting in the local high school. The townspeople raised

money to purchase the campus and secured a leader to guide the college. Its purpose was to "give instruction in the Science and Art of Teaching to prepare teachers."

I found it very interesting that they were able to have a school right on campus for teachers to practice teaching kindergarten through high school at the on-campus Model School. My uncle, Bill Trader, attended "College High," as it was called, and can tell you about the small class sizes and teachers learning alongside their students.

From 2002–06 while I was attending VCSU, we were known for being a laptop university. We were

a leader in the nation as only the second university at the time to implement universal computer access for faculty and students by providing laptops for everyone.

I had little knowledge of the computer before attending VCSU. I enjoyed being able to communicate with professors, students, and research electronically. Campus housing was changing also during this time. With the demand for students desiring to

live on campus, we began remodeling residence halls into suites where men and women could live next door.

Now as I visit the campus not as a student, but as an alumna, I look at all the wonderful changes I see, and I am proud to be a Viking.

We have a beautiful football field to enjoy, a state of the art science building, a gorgeous gazebo for host-

ing events, and an amazing health complex through a partnership with the city.

We no longer are only reaching "College High" students; we are training teachers all over the nation to be leaders. We are expanding our degrees in many areas and continue to guide our students to become master teachers who will grow and succeed, and in turn, send more of their students to VCSU.

Some things change over the years, but great places only get better. Look at all the wonderful improvements we have made over the years. I can't wait to see what the future holds for VCSU. Go Vikings!

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#### **My Will**

I have a will. Two months ago I couldn't say that. It took the death of a close friend to wake me up. Now I am wondering why I procrastinated so long.

Let me tell you about my will. My will reflects my wishes. Instead of the courts appointing an executor (personal representative) of my estate, my

sons will handle this, and without bond. My will makes provisions for my family members in a way that statutes would not do. My will establishes a trust to benefit my spouse and reduce estate taxes. My will lets me disburse money

I now have the peace of mind of knowing exactly what will happen. It took a little time and some money, but it was well worth the effort.

to my children and grandchildren in an orderly and prolonged manner. My will identifies several charities to receive special bequests. In short, my will allocates my assets according to my wishes.

My will is a legal valid document. I went to an attorney who specializes in estate planning. She knew the right questions to ask and the best way to accomplish my goals. I was tempted to take a shortcut and use one of those documents that you can purchase at a stationery store. I even thought of sitting down and writing out my will on a piece of paper, a sort of do-it-yourself project. I am thankful that I did not fall into that trap. After all, why do a will and wonder for the rest of your life if it is a valid document?

My will is up to date. This is because I only recently created it, and it

reflects my current situation. But life never stays the same. Within a few years, new estate laws may come into play. Family members may develop different needs. The composition of my estate may change. As my attorney advised, "An out of date will could be as harmful as no will at all."

My will can be amended. It is not set in concrete. I can change it easily, either by a codicil or by simply having it redrafted. The important thing is


that I have a valid will in place—now.

My will is safely stored in the safety deposit box at my bank. I have a copy of the document at home. I also made certain that my personal representatives know

how to find my will.

Above and beyond all, my will offers me peace of mind. For years, I worried about what would happen if I died without a will. I now have the peace of mind of knowing exactly what will happen. It took a little time and some money, but it was well worth the effort.

## **GAUKLER FAMILY WELLNESS CENTER OPENS**

After much anticipation fueled by construction webcam views, in-progress tours and a prominent location, the Gaukler Family Wellness, Health and Physical Education Center opened its doors to the public Oct. 1.

The Wellness Center—a joint project of partners Valley City Parks and Recreation Department, the Sheyenne Valley Community Foundation and VCSU—offers members of the greater Valley City community an outstanding new facility.

Included in the facility, located on 8th Ave. directly across from W.E. Osmon Fieldhouse, are:

- a cardiovascular fitness area (with ellipticals, treadmills, stepmills, stationary bikes, rowers, and more)
- free-weight area
- · multi-sport courts
- a walking track
- · a swimming pool
- men's, women's and family locker rooms
- · a playground
- a coffee/smoothie bar

Fitness classes are offered, and on-site childcare is available.

The Wellness Center also houses the class-rooms, labs and offices for VCSU's Department of Kinesiology and Human Performance, which includes programs in athletic training, health education, physical education, exercise physiology, sport management, strength and conditioning, and wellness studies.

An added bonus for students—and alumni, too—comes in the form of employment opportunities at the Wellness Center.

Membership for current VCSU students is included in student fees. VCSU faculty and staff, along with all Valley City/Barnes County residents, are eligible for membership.


"Here our students continue to be taught by top-notch instructors,

# Celebrating 20 years as a Laptop University

On Monday, Sept. 12, President Mason hosted a reception in the Student Center lounge recognizing the 20th anniversary of VCSU becoming a laptop campus.

In the fall of 1996, VCSU became the first laptop computer university in the state—and the second in the nation—by issuing notebook computers to all full-time students and faculty. (In fact, faculty had received their machines in the previous spring semester to prepare for the fall student implementation.)

Valley City State University had a strong interest in technology prior to the 1996 laptop initiative—in 1990 the North Dakota State Board of Higher Education gave VCSU a mission designation to be a leader in the application of instructional technology—but that institutional commitment cemented laptops and the requisite technology and training to support them into the framework of the ubiquitous technological culture experienced everyday on campus now.

Below is a timeline featuring a few of the many accomplishments tied to the laptop initiative:

- **1996:** VCSU becomes the first university in North Dakota—as well as the first teacher preparation institution in the United States—to implement a universal laptop initiative.
- 1997: VCSU is recognized by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) as one of the nation's leaders in preparing future teachers for the 21st century classroom.
- 2002: VCSU receives the Distinguished Achievement Award from the International Society for Technology in Education in recognition of exemplary models of integration of National Educational Technology Standards (NETS) into the VCSU elementary education programs.
- 2009: VCSU begins providing Apple MacBooks for education to augment the PC environment because teachers in local school districts are using Macs.
- 2013: The university adopts two platforms—PC and Mac—based on major, with departments selecting either the PC or Mac largely on the basis of industry use in the respective postgraduate fields.

 2015: Faculty begin a concerted effort to replace textbooks with OER (Open Educational Resources)—free online resources—in General Education classes, a task easier done with universal laptops. In two semesters, the effort saves students collectively close to \$290,000 and provides for more engaged teaching and learning.

The first machine in 1996 was an IBM ThinkPad 701CS with 720MB hard drive featuring a 75Mhz processor and 12MB RAM, along with a 1.44MB floppy drive. Its most memorable feature was its unique, fold-out "butterfly" keyboard.

The machine used today is either an HP Elitebook 840 G2 with a 2.7Ghz processor, 8GB RAM and a 256GB solid state drive, or a MacBook Air with a 2.7Ghz processor, 8GB RAM and a 256GB solid state drive.

From 1996 to 2016, data storage available to each user has increased over 1.250 fold.

In 1996, VCSU had eight modernized classrooms with large-screen projection systems. Today on campus, there are 53 classrooms and 9 meeting rooms with permanent audio and video projection equipment; that's nearly all of the university's classrooms, labs and medium-to-large meeting spaces.

According to Joe Tykwinski, chief information officer, the laptop program remains viable 20 years later for three reasons: "Security is better when everyone on a network has professional security tools, the program provides equitable computing access—there are no 'haves' and 'have nots'—and faculty can depend on every student having a functioning laptop with the right software."

The laptop program is reviewed every six years. A recent survey of students, faculty and staff overwhelmingly affirmed the program as it stands; the next review is scheduled in 2018 for possible changes in 2019.

"We are very proud of our laptop initiative," says President Tisa Mason. "The use of technology has transformed the traditional classroom into a vibrant multi-sensory learning environment through use of on-demand internet resources, rich audio-visual presentations, threaded discussions, and much more."



#### King '86 named CIO of NDUS

This interview with Darin King '86 was first published on the North Dakota University System (NDUS) blog, blog.ndus.edu, as "Q & A with CIO Darin King" in July 2016. It was written by Chris Erickson, NDUS public affairs manager, and is reprinted here with permission.

This summer Darin King '86 was named chief information officer (CIO) for the North Dakota University System. Previously, King had served as deputy CIO since November 2013. In that role, he was responsible for the day-to-day operational leadership of the enterprise systems and services delivered to the 11 institutions of the NDUS.

King began his career in educational technology as a high school mathematics and computer science teacher in Minot and Grand Forks. In 1995, he was hired as the first network services coordinator for the Grand Forks Public Schools (GFPS) and led the effort to bring internet access into the classrooms of the district. King became the GFPS district technology director in 1997 and led the district through a rapid expansion of educational technology resources and systems. In 2012, he became the director of the North Dakota Educational Technology Council and provided leadership for all North Dakota K-12 educational technology, including EduTech and the North Dakota Center for Distance Education.

King is a graduate of Valley City State University and the University of North Dakota (UND). He is a Valley City native and a 20-plus year resident of Grand Forks with a wife and two children. His wife, Deb, is the program director of the radiologic technology program at Northland College in East Grand Forks. His son, Sam, coaches football at UND; his daughter-in-law Chelsea is a teacher for the Grand Forks Public Schools; and his daughter, McKenna, is a senior at UND.

## How long have you been with IT and what brought you here to NDUS CTS?

I have been working in IT for over 20 years. I thought the opportunity to work for the NDUS would be fun and challenging.

## How do you plan on approaching your responsibilities within the position?

After serving as the Deputy CIO for the past few years, I have had the opportunity to work daily with Lisa Feldner [former NDUS CIO, now NDUS chief of staff and vice chancellor for information technology and institutional research]. This has prepared me to understand the position, get to know the people and the processes involved with the CIO position.

#### Describe your leadership style.

It is impossible for a single person to know everything, so it is important to be collaborative and open to discussion and input. I believe that good leaders need to use different leadership styles based on the situation. Collaborative, democratic, authoritarian, etc. are all styles that might be needed based on the situation.

## What do you feel are some of your greatest accomplishments?

Staying married for 30 years (and counting) and raising my kids to be good adults. Professionally, I would have to say helping the Grand Forks Public Schools during the crazy five years of recovery after the Grand Forks flood of 1997.



#### What are the goals that you have while here?

We have many opportunities and challenges ahead based on the priorities of the SBHE and legislative mandates. It is critical that we focus our energy and resources on the priorities that directly support the strategic objectives of the SBHE.

## What do you feel are your greatest strengths and experiences that you bring to this role?

I am grateful that I have had the opportunity to work with many great people in both IT and executive leadership positions over the past 20-plus years. These experiences and relationships help me every day both personally and professionally. I am a pretty good communicator and like working with people to solve problems and get things done.

#### What are you most excited about?

Everything! I am excited to continue working with the smart and capable people in CTS and NDUS institutions.

#### Are there any changes you aim to seek to implement?

Change is constant in IT. We have made some changes in the past few years, and it is likely that we will continue to make changes as new opportunities arise.

## VCSU hosts Envision 2030 Pillar Discussion on liberal arts

President Tisa Mason hosted the NDUS Envision 2030 Pillar Discussion: Liberal Arts and the Humanities on Thursday, Oct. 6, in the VCSU Student Center.

The event continued the discussion that began as a breakout session at



the North Dakota University System's Envision 2030 education summit held in Bismarck on May 23, 2016.

The future of liberal arts and humanities education in North Dakota was discussed. Tom Isern, professor of history and university distinguished professor of history at North Dakota State University, helped define the liberal arts for the assemblage, and VCSU's Lee Kruger, associate professor of language and literature, and Anthony Dutton, associate professor and social science department chair, provided comments from their experience as educators.

A document, "Employer Priorities for Most Important College Learning Outcomes," from the LEAP project of the Association of American Colleges and Universities, was distributed and figured into the discussion.

About 30 individuals attended the discussion in person or via call-in technology. Other participants included state senators Carolyn Nelson and Larry Robinson; NDUS chancellor Mark Hagerott, NDSU president Dean Bresciani, University of Jamestown president Robert Badal; Mike Jacobs of the Grand Forks Herald; and representatives from UND, Mayville State, VCSU and Valley City Public Schools.

#### Zander researches dragonfly distribution

Hayden Zander, a Valley City State University junior from Killdeer, N.D., spent the summer conducting research with VCSU biology professor Andre DeLorme, Ph.D.

Zander's research involved documenting the distribution of dragonfly species in North Dakota in an attempt to determine the impact of climate change.

One of the main concerns about global climate change is its impact on the geographic distribution of species. Dragonfly species distributions have been shown to be especially sensitive to climate change. It is predicted that southern species may expand northward and northern species may have their distributions greatly decreased by warming temperatures.

Since current distributions of dragonflies in North Dakota are not well known, Zander traveled throughout the state collecting and documenting species to help benchmark their distribution.

Zander conducted his research under the auspices of the Center for Regional Climate Studies (CRCS) at the University of North Dakota. VCSU is an associated institution of the CRCS.

His research was funded by a grant award from the Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) pilot program of the North Dakota Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR). Zander was one of five North Dakota university students selected for an



REU grant this summer.

North Dakota EPSCoR is a federal- and state-funded program designed to improve the ability of university and college researchers to compete more effectively for federal, regional and private research grants in the sciences, technology, engineering and mathematics.

#### Squash harvest benefits food bank

VCSU students and area volunteers harvested more than 65,000 pounds of produce on a farm owned by Dan Faust on Thursday, Sept. 29, in the sixth year of an annual community service project.

The efforts of about 215 VCSU students—freshmen enrolled in the Learning to Live, Living to Learn (L2L) class, along with their upper-class mentors—will benefit those in North Dakota served by the Great Plains Food Bank.

According to Nancy Carriveau, food resource manager for Great Plains Food Bank, the squash, corn, tomatoes and cucumbers harvested that day—almost two double-stacked semi-loads—will provide the equivalent of 54,343 meals.

The students, along with community volunteers organized by Faust, picked produce and loaded it onto semi-trailers for the Great Plains Food Bank, which transports the produce to food shelters and community pantries for use by those in need throughout the state.



## VCSU named No. 1 public regional college in Midwest again



Valley City State University has retained its No. 1 ranking among public regional colleges in the Midwest according to the 2017 U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges rankings.

VCSU was the No. 1 ranked public regional college in the Midwest in the 2016 rankings, and also in the 2012 and 2013 rankings. The university

was ranked No. 2 in the 2010, 2011, 2014 and 2015 rankings.

This marks the 19th consecutive year that VCSU has been ranked a U.S. News "Best College."

"The No. 1 ranking among our peer institutions is a reflection of the good things we have going at Valley City State," said VCSU President Tisa Mason. "The tenet that a VCSU education is special runs strong and deep throughout the history of the university, and the consistent top rankings we've received over the years affirm that belief. Our faculty and staff strive for excellence on a daily basis, and the high quality and great value our students and their families receive here is a direct result of that hard work."

The U.S. News rankings are based on a number of criteria, including graduation rate performance, first-year student retention, class sizes, academic profiles of entering freshmen, admission acceptance rates, faculty resources, financial resources and support, graduation rate performance, alumni giving rates, and academic excellence assessments by administrators at peer institutions.

The "Regional Colleges in the Midwest" rankings include 80 colleges and universities, with 14 public institutions, in 12 states: North Dakota, Minnesota, South Dakota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Nebraska, Kansas and Missouri.

## Strength and conditioning receives NSCA recognition

VCSU's strength and conditioning concentration in the Exercise Science and Sport Management program has been named an Education Recognition Program by the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA).

The NSCA Education Recognition Program (ERP) recognizes regionally accredited academic institutions for their educational programs that have met, and continue to meet, educational guidelines recommended by the NSCA.

ERP recognitions are good for three years and schools are eligible for renewal following this three-year period. To meet the requirements, VCSU must provide required content in courses such as Human Anatomy and Physiology, Exercise Physiology, Kinesiology/Biomechanics, Sports Nutrition, Scientific Principles of Strength and Conditioning, Resistance Training and Conditioning, Exercise Technique/Exercise Prescription, and Program Design as Related to Strength and Conditioning.

The strength and conditioning concentration in the Exercise Science and Sport Management program at VCSU is one of several majors available in the Department of Kinesiology and Human Performance. The department moved to its new home in the Gaukler Family Wellness, Health and Physical Education Center in October.



#### **VCSU** sets enrollment record

Valley City State University has set an enrollment record with a headcount of 1,452 students for Fall 2016, surpassing the previous high mark of 1,422 set in Fall 2015.

VCSU's Fall 2016 graduate enrollment headcount of 157 ties the record set in Fall 2011.

"We're proud to see our numbers increase," said VCSU President Tisa Mason. "More and more students are choosing to pursue a VCSU education because they recognize the quality of our academic offerings and the value we provide for their investment. I commend our faculty and staff for the work they do to make us a top choice for students and their families."

Part of VCSU's growth is due to increases in its first-to-second-year retention rate each of the last four years. In addition, a Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) degree program has been added to the VCSU graduate offerings to complement a Master's in Education degree program.

The university has also begun offering three-year bachelor's degree programs in business administration, elementary education, English education, mathematics education and professional communication. To help keep college affordable, VCSU faculty are increasingly using free OER (Open Educational Resources) in place of textbooks in many of their courses.

#### Gazebo named for Pedersen '40

VCSU hosted a ribbon-cutting for its new gazebo on Saturday morning, Sept. 17. Remarks were presented by President Tisa Mason; Larry Robinson, executive director of the VCSU Foundation; Katelyn Willer, Student Senate secretary; and alumnus Allen Pedersen '40, the 100-year-old lead donor for the project.

Hulda Pearce of Valley City, who served as VCSU librarian in 1963–64, added a significant gift and her support to the construction effort, and the VCSU Student Senate also contributed toward the gazebo.

Pearce was represented at the ceremony by her daughter, Margaret Dahlberg, VCSU vice president for academic affairs, and her family.


It was announced at the ribbon-cutting that the structure would be named the "Allen Pedersen Gazebo." Pedersen, who grew up south of Valley City, now lives in an assisted-living facility in Crookston, Minn.

The structure—28 feet in diameter and 23 feet high, with a 9-foot ceiling—was built in Arthur, III., by an Amish construction crew. The crew reassembled the prefabricated components in Valley City in July.

Valley City firms Hi-Line Electric, Wick Construction and Pine Country Nursery also contributed to the project.

Complete with Wi-Fi, the gazebo has already become a popular community gathering spot on campus.





#### New heat plant taking shape


Construction on the new VCSU heat plant continues on a site east of Rhoades Science Center. Funded by an appropriation received from the North Dakota Legislature in its 2015 session, the \$13.9 million steam plant facility will replace an outdated facility, constructed in 1910, which houses three antiquated boilers.

The new plant will feature two boilers, one coal-fired and the other natural gas. Much of the large equipment has been set, including the boilers, the coal storage hopper and the baghouse, the air pollution control device on the coal-fired boiler.

Construction of the building around the equipment began in late October and should be complete in about two months, with finish work to follow.

Crossover from the old plant to the new will be accomplished by mid to late winter, with the plant fully operational for the 2017–18 heating season. Demolition of the old plant will be done over the summer.

The new plant was designed by JLG Architects and Obermiller Nelson Engineering, with McGough Construction serving as general contractor.

#### MAT provides a master's degree and a path to teaching

Valley City State University has begun a Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) program as way to meet the teacher shortage and provide graduates with higher salary.

The MAT program complements VCSU's 10-year-old Master of Education (M.Ed.) degree program with concentrations that focus on providing current teachers an advanced education with a technology focus.

The university has also been offering undergraduate, postbaccalaureate teacher preparation for a number of years through clinical practice/transition to teaching programs. Recently, the State Board of Higher Education approved the new MAT program at VCSU to prepare new teachers while earning their advanced degree.

The number of people making the transition to teaching from other career fields is increasing, and the MAT program provides an entry-level, professional degree that

will move them more quickly into a higher pay scale. Individuals can earn a teaching degree and a license to teach in one of 12 secondary education majors through the MAT program.

In many cases, graduates in non-teaching fields already have the required content coursework and can complete the master's degree with very few, if any, additional requirements within their major. The core MAT coursework is offered year-round and completely online to make it accessible for candidates.

One alumnus pursuing an MAT degree at VCSU is Josue Hernandez '15 of Northwood, N.D.

Josue earned a B.S. in fisheries and wildlife (with a fisheries focus) in his undergraduate career and has experience working with the North Dakota Game and Fish Department. But a year working as an ELL

paraprofessional at Red River High School in Grand Forks, N.D., convinced him that he wanted to teach.

Knowing that his wife, Karlie (Thompson) Hernandez '15, had received stellar teacher preparation as an elementary education major at VCSU—coupled with his own positive experience and relationships with VCSU faculty and staff—helped motivate Josue to enroll in VCSU's new MAT program this fall.

"I already knew that VCSU provides a firstrate education," says Josue, "and the MAT offers me the opportunity to earn a teaching degree in two years while working full-time."

#### **Gonzalez leads XC campaign**

Valley City State junior Dennis Gonzalez ended the season with an all-conference finish at the NSAA Championships, highlighting the 2016 cross country campaign at VCSU.

A native of Riverside, Calif., Gonzalez quickly became the top Viking runner this season. He ran a career-best race on Oct. 22 at the Mt. Marty Invite, finishing fourth of 103 runners and recording the fastest time at VCSU since the cross country program was reinstated in 2010.

At the NSAA championships, Gonzalez placed 10th overall in the men's 8K race, nabbing all-conference honors with a time of 27:00.97.

The VCSU men and women both finished sixth of six teams at the meet. Orin Rambow finished in 19th place for the Viking men, and Daniel Machado placed 35th in the 54-person field.

The Viking women were led by junior Geneva Espinoza, who finished in 23rd place overall in the women's 5K race. Kauna Hansen was 34th in the 41-person women's field.

VCSU head coach Chris Johnson was pleased with the progress his squad made throughout the season, which was marked with consistent personal records by VCSU runners.

"Although a few setbacks caused us to not fulfill our potential at the conference meet," he said, "the future is bright for this program."

#### Volleyball finishes season strong

The Valley City State volleyball team finished the 2016 season strong as they won five of the last eight matches—including three straight by sweep—to finish in fourth place in the North Star Athletic Association.

The Vikings finished the season with a 12-22 overall record and a 7-9 mark in conference play. VCSU was seeded No. 4 for the NSAA Conference Tournament and defeated No. 5 Dickinson State in dramatic fashion during the quarterfinal round. VCSU trailed 14-9 in the decisive fifth set, but scored seven straight points to rally for victory.

The Vikings' season came to an end in the semifinals where they lost to Viterbo University, which was the No. 3-ranked team in the country.

Highlights from the season included the postseason victory, sweeping a pair of matches against Mayville State University, and posting a 3-1 record during the Clarke University Tournament in September. The Vikings swept Mayville State in Mayville, the first road victory over the Comets since 2011.

Valley City State's season was also marked by several close losses. VCSU was a frustrating 2-8 in matches that went to five games, and six of those eight losses in the fifth set came by just two points.

Freshman Taylor Sharp made an immediate impact for the Vikings as she led the team in kills and points. Another newcomer, junior transfer Megan Johnson, was a key contribu-

tor as an outside hitter. Sophomore Clarissa Olson, a native of Valley City, took a big step forward this season as she became one of the Vikings' top hitters and led the team in hitting percentage.

While VCSU is set to return many key players next season, the Vikings will say good-bye to four seniors who played big roles on this year's squad: libero Jaycee George, who led the team in digs; setter Taylor Balkan, who led the team in assists; middle blocker Nicolette Bloomer, who led the team in blocks; and defensive specialist Darrien Cantelo, one of the emotional leaders on the team.



## Heinitz, Rall, Wiebe garner titles in fall golf

A pair of team titles and three individual titles highlighted VCSU's 2016 fall golf season.

The Viking men won both the Blue Hawk Invite on Sept. 8 in Dickinson, N.D., and the Cougar Invite on Sept. 22 in Morris, Minn. Kyle Wiebe, Cameron Rall and Nicole Heinitz all won individual titles throughout the season as well.

VCSU's men's team shot a modern-day school record with a team score of 291 during the first round of the Blue Hawk Invite. It was the lowest team round at VCSU since the golf program was reinstated in 2009.

That tournament in Dickinson also produced a pair of individual champions. Kyle Wiebe won the men's title with a 36-hole score of 143—just one over par. Nicole Heinitz won the women's

title in Dickinson with a 36-hole total of 172, two shots better than second place.

On Sept. 22, the Viking men topped a field of 11 teams to win the 18-hole Cougar Invite for the third consecutive year. Individually, VCSU freshman Cameron Rall shot a 1-under par round of 70 to win the medalist honors.

VCSU played six tournaments during the fall season, including the NSAA Fall Championships in Albert Lea, Minn. The NSAA Conference Championships consists of 36 holes played in the fall and 36 holes played in the spring. Through the first 36 holes. the VCSU men are in third place and the women are in fifth.

VCSU will likely play two or three more tournaments in the spring along with the NSAA Spring Championships.

#### Basketball previews: Returning squad for women, new coaches for men

The 2016-17 basketball season is shaping up to a season of change for the Viking men and a season of consistency for the Viking women.

On the men's side, VCSU features a completely brand new coaching staff while the Viking women added just two new faces to a host of returning players this season.

#### VCSU Women's Preview

The Viking women enter the 2016–17 season with high expectations after finishing 18-10 last year and graduating just two seniors.

Last season the Viking roster was full of new faces, but that is far from the case this year. The Vikings have a roster of 12, which consists of 10 returners and only two newcomers.

"We are further ahead at this point in the season on both sides of the ball," said head coach Jill DeVries. "The girls came back ready which has allowed us to move along quicker."

Upperclass leadership will be provided by senior guards Georgia Williams, Nisja Bass, and Sara Schwanke, along with junior guard Lexi Lennon. All three seniors joined the VCSU roster as transfers, whereas Lennon has been a part of the team for four years, including one redshirt season.

"They've all done a good job of leading in different ways," said DeVries. "Some lead vocally and others by example. They are all great at teaching their teammates and good at being models on and off the court."

Sophomore Alli Vandal has played a big role for the Vikings in the early season as well, and the Vikings will feature good depth inside with sophomore centers Mackenzie Huber, Kaitlin Connor and Nya Chakin all returning. Guards Paige Meyer and Hannah Schlecht are back as well, adding depth in the back court.

Along with the Viking returners there are two new faces on the VCSU bench this season: junior Kennedy Henningsgard and freshman Annie Swenson. Henningsgard is a transfer from Lake Region State College, where she was an NJCAA Division I All-American.

VCSU opened the season Oct. 21 with a home game against Brandon University. The Vikings begin their 16-game conference schedule on Dec. 2. VCSU was picked to finish third in the North Star Athletic Association Preseason Coaches' Poll.

#### VCSU Men's Preview

For the first time in more than 10 years, Valley City State's bench has a new look with Ryan Montgomery taking over as head coach of the Vikings. Montgomery was announced as the 21st head coach in program history on Aug. 4, 2016. Montgomery previously served as assistant

coach at Bemidji State University in Bemidji, Minn., since 2010. He replaces Jeff Kaminsky, who coached VCSU for the past 11 seasons.

Montgomery filled out his coaching staff with the addition of Karl Sorby as assistant coach. Sorby, a VCSU alumnus and a former student coach for the Vikings, most recently worked as a graduate assistant coach for the University of Mary in Bismarck, N.D.

On the court, VCSU will have a familiar but different feel than last year. The Vikings will be led by a pair of upperclass returning starters from its 2015–16 national tournament team.

Headlining the returners is 6'5" forward Jayden Ferguson, back for his junior season at VCSU after putting up sparkling numbers his first two seasons. Ferguson was named honorable mention All-American and first-team all-conference last season after scoring 16.9 points per game and shooting 51 percent from the field. Ferguson has reached 1,000 career points in his first two seasons.

Also returning after starting 32 games last season is 6'8" center Ellwood Ellenson. The senior will anchor the Vikings inside this season after averaging 4.8 points, 5.4 rebounds and 1.0 blocks per game last year.

A handful of other returners on this year's squad saw time last year as well: junior guard Rashad Satahoo (5.2 ppg, 30 made threes), junior guard Alex Quist (1.2 ppg), junior forward Chase Carpenter (1.5 ppg) and sophomore forward Jason Ralph.

The Vikings have also added several new faces, including two who are seeing significant minutes early in the season: 6'5" junior forward Austin Dunbar and 6'4" freshman forward Denzel Kennedy.

VCSU went 22-11 last season, won a share of the North Star Athletic Association regular season championships and advanced to the second round of the national tournament for just the second time in school history.

The Vikings lost several key players from that squad and are picked to finish fifth in the North Star Athletic Association Preseason Coaches' Poll.

VCSU opened the 2016–17 season on Oct. 15, one of five home games the Vikings played in October. Conference play begins Dec. 2 at Mayville State.

#### **Grid highlights include career marks**

The 2016 football season was one of milestone achievements for Valley City State University. Viking head coach Dennis McCulloch, senior linebacker Nicholas McBeain and senior quarterback Kurtis Walls all set new career records during the season.

VCSU's 41-22 win over No. 19-ranked Dakota State University on Oct. 15 was the 117th win in McCulloch's Viking career, making him the all-time winningest coach in program history. The victory moved him past legendary VCSU coach Jim Dew who compiled a 116-65-2 record from 1974-93.

"The end zone celebration was a little sweeter that day for a lot of reasons," said McCulloch. "To be able to celebrate the record with a

bunch of guys that mean a lot to me was very special. Reaching a milestone like this takes more than just one guy. I've been blessed with a lot of great coaches, players and alumni who have helped support this program. This gives me another chance to say 'thank you' to all the players, coaches and alumni who have been involved with our program and helped us through the years."

McCulloch is in his 20th season leading the Vikings and has now posted 119 career wins. He has led VCSU to six conference championships, has been voted conference Coach of the Year six times and has guided the Vikings to four NAIA play-off appearances. McCulloch's staff has featured great coaching continuity

with linebackers coach Dave Rausch in his 30th season and assistant head coach Gregg Horner in his 23rd season.

Between Dew, Steve Le-Grand and McCulloch, Viking football has needed just three head coaches since 1974—a span of 43 seasons. During that time, the Vikings have excelled with a .606 winning percentage, 15 conference championships and eight national playoff appearances.

"Coach Dew truly established the foundation of Viking football and allowed us to continue to build a strong program," said McCulloch. "When you look back at the things that he did with very limited resources, and still found a way to develop a tradition of winning, it is hard to compare my success with his."

Between the sidelines, Viking football seniors Nicholas McBeain and Kurtis Walls have also rewritten the school record book.

McBeain became the school's all-time tackling leader on Oct. 15 after recording his 377th career tackle, breaking the record of 376 held by Kevin Strang, who played from 2007–10. McBeain finishes his career with 446 tackles—becoming the first Viking ever to top 400 career tackles—and also broke the VCSU single-season record with 188 tackles in 2016. The previous season record of 167 tackles was set by Ivan Thorpe in 1980.

At the quarterback position, Walls has broken almost every major career passing record in school history. Walls set new school records with 692 completions, 1,229 attempts, 8,675 passing yards and 87 passing touchdowns. Those top the old records of 563 completions (Jeremy Peschel, 1998–2001), 1,027 attempts (Jason Beilke, 2004–08), 7,751 yards (Peschel) and 70 touchdowns (Peschel).

Valley City State University posted a 4-2 record in the North Star Athletic Association this season and finished with a 6-4 overall record. VCSU ended the season on a high note Nov. 10, rallying to score the final 17 points in

a 17-13 road victory over No. 14-ranked Southeastern University (Fla.).

Godel recently responded to the following questions about his time as a student at VCSU.

#### What was your most memorable class?

Astronomy, with Dr. Stickler. He was such a fun teacher, and I've always been intrigued by the stars. I also really enjoyed the Science-Fiction/Fantasy Literature class with Julee Russell. I'd already read all of the books, but it was great to discuss a beloved form of literature with other fans.

#### Which professor do you remember most, and why?

Dr. Kelly. He encouraged me to act and be on stage, and now I can't imagine life without performing in some way or another.

## How is the campus different from when you were here?

A lot of physical changes and improvements. I lived in Kolstoe when it was an all-male dorm. I miss the trees by the parking lot though.

### How are the students different from when you were here?

Phones and technology have become a larger part of everybody's life. It's interesting how you could be in a room now with a lot of students and nobody is talking to anybody because they are so engrossed in their phones.

## How are the professors different from when you were here?

Not much different, but technology has become an even more prevalent tool now than it was when I was a student, especially with Blackboard and so much stuff online.

#### What was your first job after graduation?

I was already working for the Open Door Center, so I became full-time with them, but I also started substitute teaching that fall.

## What would your current self tell your former self about how to succeed as a student on campus?

Probably to make sure to get enough sleep. You gotta recharge that battery to help you focus and learn. That and invest some money in Apple... it'll help with student loans in the future.

## What would you like other young alumni to know about campus and opportunities as alumni?

It is actually quite fun to be back and to work in the same area where I spent so much time as a student. Even if you don't get involved or get a job at VCSU, come visit now and again and see how things have changed and how much has stayed the same.

## What would you like other alumni to know about you?

I feel extremely blessed to be able to enjoy what I do. Although I'm constantly busy, most of the time my work doesn't feel like work. It's important to enjoy what you do, even if you aren't going to make a lot of money doing it.



## Students, faculty exhibit at NDUS visual arts exhibition


